



Sir Robert Borden would have comed larger in statesmanship had the record of the last fifteen months of Union Government never been written. Following the conclusion of the world conflits and the consummation of peace, the Canadian Premier-had an exceptional opportunity to win a noteworthy place in history. The war work of himself and his Government was done. The task for which they were given an emphatic mandate was accomplished. The Government ought to have followed the manly and straightforward course of rendering account of its stewardship and submitting itself to the electors for a renewal of confidence.

Instead it elected to cling to office The Premier talked from time to time of retiring, but as often was persuaded, many believed, against his own better judgment, to remain. The Chicago Housing Corporation, whic his formed of a number of capitalists of the Windy City, is building 2.000 houses for workers to help ge some of the toilers out of the tenements. The houses are sold for \$4000 each on payments of only \$33 a month which also takes care of the interest and provides fire, health, life and accident insurance for the head of the house. Of course it takes quite a while for a man to acquire a substantial interest in the home, but he car call it is own the moment he moves in, and if he has a steady job he can finally pay out on as easy a basis as paying rent. The company does not expect to make any profit, and the revenues will be used to extend the home building programme. Standing out in bold relief is the story of Tessie McNamara, an operator at New Jersey, munition plant, who saved several thousand lives by her Namara happened to glance out of a window which overlooked a long avenue of concrete and iron one-story buildings of the munition plant, and noted a wish of smoke curling from the eaves of a building stored with two hundred gallons of gasoline. Right close to this building were six cars stored full of TNT in bulk. In a shed just next to the tracks over seventyfive thousand shells were packed ready to be shipped to the Russian army.

All of these buildings were only few yards apart. Miss McNamara galvanized to action: she full well knew that she still had time to reach safety; she knew what was going to happen when the fire reached the TNT and loaded shells; but she didn't hesitate; her nimble fingers flew up and down the switchboard notifying the workmen in the various sheds to get all the men

This brave operator saw the fire leap from the gasoline shed toward shed 28, and it required all the nerve she could summon to stick to her post, because she knew what would happen. Nearly ten minutes had passed since she saw the smoke curling from the gasoline shed. In that ten minutes her fidelity and courage had got warning to every building of the 36 in the

twenty-acre plant. Nearly Four Thousand Saved. Nearly four thousand men had either reached or gone through the gates to the open roads and meadows -then shed 28 let go. As Miss Mc-Namara sent in her final calls red-hot fragments of steel ripped from the air, descended on the roof of the headhead. One just grazed her, and then she fainted. They carried her out to safety. It was all over in a few ninutes, yet during that time she had saved four thousand lives.



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
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
