Local and Other Items.

The first shipment of Canadian salt to
the United States is said to have been
made last week from Seaford.

The Dominion Telegraph Co. has ex-
tended its line on the T. G. & B. Railway
to Mount Forest.

BASE BALL MATCH—In a game of base
ball, played at Ferris on Friday between
the Athletics of Elora and the Victorias
of Ferris, the former were victorious by
three runs. Score—37 to 31.

The *Waterloo Herald* says that not-
withstanding the late opening of the
season, the grass is more advanced al-
ready than it was on the 24th of May last
year.

The rails on the Wellington, Grey and
Bruce are laid to the neighborhood of
Dunkeld. The work of graveling is
being pushed forward with vigor. Two
engines are at work upon the road.

GUELPH TURF CLUB—We would re-
mind those interested in the success of
this club operating for the coming season to
remember the meeting to-night at 8
o'clock sharp, at the Royal Hotel. As
business of importance is likely to come
up, a large attendance is desired.

RALPH FEATHERSTONE, an ex-Reeve of
West Zorra, cut his hand a few days ago
while pruning trees. Shortly after he
skinned a cow that had died, and it is
thought some poisonous matter from the
carcase entered the wound, causing death
in the course of a few hours.

The *Drayton Enterprise* says:—The
fall wheat in Peel and Maryborough, so
far as we have been able to ascertain,
looks as well and promising as could be
wished, and we learn that in Wallace,
where it was feared that it was winter
killed, it has improved wonderfully during
the past few days.

The men in Waterford & Co.'s foundry
Brantford, struck on Friday. They were
asked to sign a circular forbidding them
to agitate or support any reduction of
the hours of labor. The men would not
sign, but promised to work at the existing
terms till the nine hours movement be-
come general. So they struck.

The *Mr. Forest Examiner* says that the
contract for the ballasting of the line of
the Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railway
between Mount Forest and Arthur has
been awarded to Messrs. Gibson and
Pickson. Operations were commenced
on Wednesday, and will be prosecuted
thoroughly until the whole is completed.
It is not known precisely when the work
may be finished, but it is presumed that
in July everything will be in a shape to

permit the running of two passenger
trains daily from Toronto. The tracklay-
ing on the Grey extension will be com-
menced early in July.

THE SOUTHERN EXTENSION—The South-
ern branch of the W. G. & B. Railway is
being rapidly pushed forward; consid-
erable chipping and clearing having been
done during the winter; ties and timber,
are on the ground from Palmerston to
Listowel, the bridge over McDermott's
mill pond is nearly finished, whilst cut-
tings and crossings are in progress. Be-
yond Listowel Mr. Hendrie has 150 men
at work, which will be largely added to
shortly. The *Banner* expects the road to
be open to Listowel by the 1st of October,
and to Wingham within two months
afterwards. The survey from the latter
place is now actively progressing.

FOUNDRY IN ERIN VILLAGE—Messrs.
John Henry and Wm. Roof, with Mr.
Donald McMillan, have entered into a
partnership at Erin Village in the foundry
and agricultural implement manu-
facturing business, having put in a large
amount of capital for the purpose. They
have in course of erection a building for
the casting department, which is 90 x 30
feet, and a blacksmith shop adjoining,
which will be superintended by Mr. Mc-
Millan. The firm will manufacture
stoves, reapers, threshing machines, and
all the various kinds of latest improved
farming implements, etc., for which there
is certainly a large demand in the sur-
rounding country.

SEVERE ACCIDENT—The *Orangeville
Advertiser* gives the following serious ac-
cident, which happened in that village
on Tuesday the 7th. Mr. W. J.
Middleton, of the "Gordon House," left
a lamp burning in his bed-room at night
so that he could get up at any time to
attend a horse that was ailing. About
three o'clock, a.m., the lamp exploded
scattering the oil over the bed room which
immediately broke out in flames. Mr.
Middleton, in his efforts to extinguish
the fire and save his wife and children
was terribly burned. Mrs. Middleton had
a leg broken and one of the children was
slightly injured. Medical attendance was
at once procured, and everything possible
was done to aid the sufferers. Mr. Mid-
dleton was delirious for some time on
Wednesday and has been in a very critical
state ever since. Mrs. Middleton is doing
as well as could be expected and the
child is safe.

**Municipal Aid to Manufacturing
Enterprise**.
We are informed that a delegation
from Elora had an interview on Saturday
with Messrs. Hirsch & McKinnon, of this
town, relative to the establishment of a
sewing machine factory in that village.
The inducements held out for this pur-
pose were very liberal, namely, a bonus
of \$5,000, the entire block of stone
buildings opposite Bain's Hotel and
exemption from taxation for 10
years. Messrs. Hirsch & McKin-
non have, likewise, a most handsome offer
from Oshawa with the same object in
view, namely, \$6,000 of a bonus, a free
site whereon to build the factory, and in
addition Messrs. F. W. Glen and Co. offer
to present the necessary machinery. An
offer of \$10,000 has also been received
from the village of Aylmer, distant from
St. Thomas 14 miles, and with a popula-
tion of 800, but the absence of railway
accommodation and banking facilities are
considered more than counterbalancing
the enterprise. Mr. McKinnon, who has
prompted the offer of \$10,000, and
Messrs. Hirsch & McKinnon expect to come
to a final decision as to location in a few
days. It is much to be regretted that
they do not see their way clear to the
establishment of their factory in Guelph.
The machine they intend manufacturing is
one patented by Mr. McKinnon, and it
realizes the advantages its proprietors
allege it to possess, it cannot fail to se-
cure a speedy and permanent place in
public favour.

The Lock-out in Hamilton.
The *Hamilton Times* of Saturday says:
This morning all the foundries in the
city are closed. Some days ago the pro-
prietors determined that if the men in
any one establishment struck, the rest
should also close up. Yesterday morn-
ing those in the employ of Messrs. L. P.
Sawyer & Co. left work, and the other
proprietors set about the fulfilment of
the agreement. Accordingly, during the
afternoon, or towards the close of the
day's work, the men in Messrs. J. Ste-
wart & Co's, Turnbull & Co's, Gurney &
Ware's, E. & C. Gurney's, Burrows,
Stewart & Co's, and the other places
mentioned will close this evening.
We are informed that their services were
no longer required for the present, and
that they were discharged. No reason
was given. This morning the em-
ployers paid off their men, and then
told them that if they would sign the
following agreement, that they would be
taken on again during the course of next
week. The paper reads:—
"I, the undersigned, agree to work
for—, of—, at my usual calling or trade of
—, and will not in any way agitate for,
or support the agitation for the reduction
of a day's labor to less hours than now
constitutes it."
(—, signature.)
A number signed this, but the majority,
belonging to Unions, declined to do so.
The employers state that they will
not stand it. A large number of
men out of work as a consequence thrown out
of employment.

A despatch from the city on Saturday
night says:—At six o'clock this evening,
the masons, upholsters, carpenters and
joiners, together with nearly all the
trades in the city, shut down. It is sup-
posed that, owing to this, the number
of men out of work has been increased
to two or three thousand. At present
all is quiet, with the exception of rumour
of threats towards those who have com-
plied with their employer's wishes, and
also great complaints of the action of the
City Council in refusing the Crystal
Palace grounds for the demonstration on
Wednesday next.

THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES

THE WASHINGTON TREATY

A New Phase of the Question.

A New Treaty to be Formed.

London, May 11.—1.30 p. m.—The
Post this morning confirms the rumour
which was current yesterday that nego-
tiations between the United States and
England relative to the indirect claims
have been broken off, and states posi-
tively that the British Government has
withdrawn from the arbitration provided
for under the Treaty of Washington.

London, May 13.—The *Times* and other
London papers this morning are of the
opinion that the announcement of Friday
that the negotiation between Great Britain
and the United States, with regard to the
indirect claims, had broken off was pre-
mature. The *Times* says positively that
all will yet be righted. It maintains that
the American Government has agreed in
principle to withdraw the claims for
indirect damages, and advises for forebear-
ance on the part of both Houses of Parlia-
ment.

New York, May 13.—A Washington
special says that since the negotiation so
suddenly terminated in London on Fri-
day last over the consequential claims
between the United States and Great
Britain the important correspondence,
which was investigated by Gen. Schenck,
has transpired, by which the Washington
Treaty is to be suspended for the present
or until the two Governments can nego-
tiate and ratify a new or supplemental
treaty covering the disputed question
raised by the presentation of indirect
claims. The British Ministry expressed
their willingness to resume the nego-
tiations on that basis which was telegraphed
here yesterday afternoon. Last night the
President convened a special Cabinet
meeting at the White House, at which this
new and important phase of the situation
was thoroughly and earnestly discussed.
The result was that it was decided, rather
than let the Washington Treaty fail,
to enter upon the work of framing a new
treaty to include the point, that for here-
after neither nation shall make any
claim upon the other for consequential
damages, because of any failure on the
part of either to observe strict neutrality
whenever the other is belligerent. Arrangements
are in progress between Gen. Schenck
and Lord Granville to secure for the present
a suspension of the Geneva Conference. It
will merely meet on 15th June and again
adjourn. The new Treaty will at once
be negotiated in London and forwarded
here for ratification by United States
Senate. If Congress adjourn before the
Treaty is received here the President will
convene the Senate in order to discuss
and ratify it.

THE LASH IN GUELPH.
**TWO PRISONERS WHIPPED IN THE
GAOL YARD**.

To-day (Monday) at noon two of the
prisoners convicted for assault with in-
tent, at the late Assizes, received a por-
tion of their sentence. One, Theophilus
Coats, for assault with intent on the
little Indian girl, near Helli, received
20 lashes, and the other, Levi Gillies, for
assault with intent on Mrs. Hinson, near
Elora, received 30 lashes. The prisoners
were whipped in presence of the Sheriff,
Gaol Surgeon, the representatives of the
Press, about half a dozen other parties,
and in presence of the other prisoners in
the gaol, who were taken into the yard.
The culprits were strapped and fastened
to a triangle made for the purpose and
stripped to the waist. The implements
of punishment were small canes or
switches, which were vigorously applied
by an old soldier, who was induced to
undertake the work, and who wielded his
tools with dexterity and to some effect.

Coats was first strapped to the triangle,
after which the cane was applied to his
shoulders with stinging effect. The first
blow made him howl, and as each suc-
ceeding one was applied he roared bas-
tardly, but otherwise stood his punishment
with considerable nerve and power
of endurance. Every application
of the switch left its mark
on his back and shoulders, which by
the time he received the 20 lashes,
was seamed or with long and ugly
wedges of blue and red. The cane
cuts cleaner than the cat—so old sol-
diers say—but the after effects of a caning
are far worse than the blows inflicted
by the old fashioned cat. When Coats
had received his punishment he said
something about being used like a dog,
walked off the triangle himself, took his
clothes and marched into gaol.

Gillies was then brought out and
strapped up. On the first blow he winced
he twisted and tried to relieve himself,
all the time roaring out that he could
not stand it. Still the blows fell with
telling effect until the thirtieth one was
given, when his back was pretty well
gridironed. He did not stand his punish-
ment so well as Coats, and at the end
remarked in a plaintive tone that he did
not know how he could stand the rest
of his sentence. He appeared at first to
be fainting but after a little came to him-
self, walked to the pump, took a drink of
water and then walked into the gaol.

The other prisoners seemed to be im-
pressed with the whole affair, and no
doubt thanked their stars that they had
not to undergo the same punishment. It
is a savage work, but for crimes of this
description, it is not too severe, and may
deter others from committing them.

GREAT FIRE IN TORONTO.

Balance of the Iron Block Burned
Down!

On Sunday morning about 5 o'clock,
the portion of the Iron Block in Toron-
to, which was saved from the fire which
occurred last February, was burned down.
It started in the Room Paper Factory of
Messrs. Staunton & Son, which was soon
in a blaze. The engines were speedily
got to work, but not before the flames
had obtained such headway as to render
all chance of saving the manufactory
proper, with its valuable machinery,
blocks, stock, &c., hopeless. The wind
at this time was blowing nearly a gale
from the north-west, and the flames were
fanned into an intensity, rendering the
heat something terrific. Sometime after
the fire broke out, the boiler in the en-
gine room burst, and the walls of
that portion of the factory facing south
were blown on to the Esplanade. The
flames spread rapidly through the whole
length of the building, backing up against
the wind, and soon the lumber in Mr.
Smith's yard was made the prey of the
fire, which seemed to leap from one lum-
ber pile to another in a perfect chain
from the office of the first named gentleman.

The roof of Messrs. Milloy's storehouse
was on fire three times, and it was only
by dint of the greatest exertions, on the
part of some of the employees of the firm,
that some serious damage did not ensue.
The Harbor Commissioners' office was
the next to go, but Mr. Harris, seeing the
danger, managed to remove his books
and the greater part of his household
furniture. Mr. Smith's office and the
last named building, burnt up like tinder,
and all the efforts of the firemen to arrest
the progress of the flames were quite
fruitless.

All the premises between Staunton's
store and the Esplanade resembled one
vast furnace, the lumber and chips which
strewn Mr. Smith's premises, while
blazing, offering the greatest resistance
to the firemen. By seven o'clock all the
upper stories of Messrs. Staunton & Son's
and Messrs. Staunton's stores, were ir-
retrievably gone, the metal of the sills on
the roof commenced to melt and drop
down in a manner which rendered it
dangerous for the firemen to venture in
close proximity to the buildings; pres-
ently the roof fell in with a concen-
trated, filling the air for a moment with
a cloud of dense black smoke, combined
with dust and a shower of ashes.

The origin of the fire is a mystery. The
Chief of the Fire Brigade is of opinion
that it commenced in the engine room of
Staunton's factory, which is reported to
have been left in a perfectly safe state on
Saturday afternoon, at three o'clock, when
the men left work.

It is difficult to estimate the total value
of the property destroyed, but it is com-
puted to be about \$150,000.

A Marine Novelty.
The following from the *Glasgow Daily
Mail* of the 11th ult., is a description of
the trial trip of the new dredge built for
the Canadian Government, a marine
novelty, to which we have before re-
ferred.

As most of our readers interested in
such matters will remember, we gave the
other day a description of a new iron
vessel, of novel design and arrangement,
designed and constructed by Messrs. W.
Simons & Co., of the Lamb Works at
Renfrew. It has been built to the order
of the Canadian Government, and com-
bining in the functions or properties of a
powerful steam dredger, a hopper barge
and a screw steamer. It is intended to
be employed at the mouths of harbors
and rivers in Canada, to keep them clear
of silt and other obstructions, and most
wonderfully below what would be prac-
ticable under the whole system of fleet,
including dredgers, barges, and tug
steamers—the work of all which is man-
aged under the new system in "one
bottom". The vessel floating machine
—which ever we may call it—was
moored at about 11 a.m., a little way
below Dalmar, and its machinery started
for operation in about 18 feet of water.
In about two hours the "hopper" sand-
vessel was filled with 200 tons of stuff—
sand, gravel, &c., dredging from the bottom
of the channel. The dredging machinery
was then, with considerable success, dis-
connected and the screw propeller put into
motion. The dredging crew were then
and then transformed, as one might say,
into sailors; and the moorings having
been loosened, the *Canada*, as the craft
is called, proceeded down the river under
easy steam, at the rate of about eight
miles an hour. Off Port Glasgow, a ball
was called for the purpose of putting on
shore one or two of the company who
required to return early to town; but
with this exception the *Canada* made no
stoppage until at the mouth of Leven, and
about half a mile from the Kilmory-
gan shore the trapped bottom of her
hopper cavity was opened, and the 200
tons of the dredged stuff above mentioned
allowed to slide into the sea. The
Canada, as we have stated more explicitly
at the outset, is the property of the
Canadian Government, whose repre-
sentative in this country, Mr. Maxwell Scott,
Birkenhead, was present on the trial trip
of Tuesday along with other gentlemen.

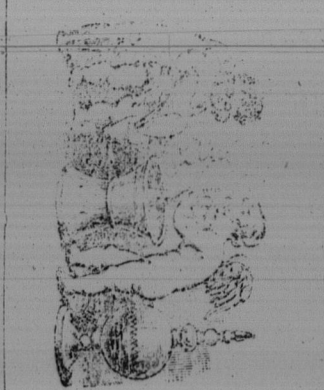

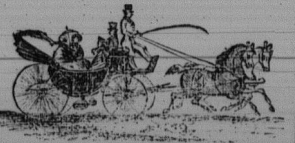

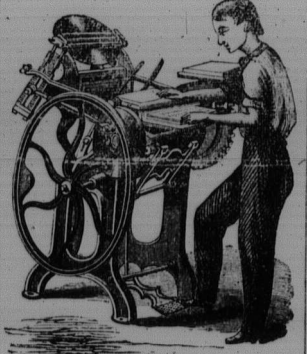

A SINGULAR OCCURRENCE.—About four miles west of this village there is a lake about a mile long by from one quarter to five-eighths of a mile wide. This lake from the quantity of fish therein (we suppose) is called Pike Lake. The water is usually in the winter season frozen over to the thickness of from 12 to 18 inches, but this past winter it was solid to a much greater depth. At the breaking up of the ice this season the fish have been washed up on shore in very large quantities, variously estimated from seven to ten thousand, and now lay dead all around the lake. These consist of pike of various sizes, perch, suckers, &c., and in one part near the outlet they lay on top of each other a foot in depth. This is the first season that anything of the kind has occurred here, and various are the conjectures as to the cause. Some are of the opinion that the lake was frozen nearly solid and that the fish were thus killed, while others think that some convulsion of nature below the lake has taken place. We incline to the former theory as large and numerous roots are also washed up on the shore, and apparently torn up from the bottom by the ice when rising.—*Mount Forest Confederates.*
