Chicago and Kansas City capital in a big mining, smelting and railway project, involving the erection of a 2,000 ten smelten. ton smelter at Grand Forks and the expenditure of four million dollars in reloping two thousand horsepower on the Kettle river, seven miles below Grand Forks. This power will be trans-mitted by wires to a smelter, which will be erected in the vicinity of this city. The plant is primarily intended to treat custom ores from the Boundary mines and mines on Colville reserva-tion, and will begin operations with an equipment of two furnaces. This plant will be enlarged from time to time as may be occasioned by the opening up of our mineral resources. My associates are willing to invest four million dol-lars and a portion of this amount will devoted to mining enterprises and building railways to sections that

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
