"Mr. O'Brien's visit to Canada to stir up enmity against the Governor-General is a complete failure and has done the Home Rule cause infinitely more harm than good. One cannot help admiring the physical and moral courage of the man in facing a great multitude at Toronto last night, hostile to his person and mission, but the conduct of the Canadians in drowning his voice with a mighty chorus of patriotic hymns is even more admirable. The people of Canada, especially in Ontario, are intensely loyal, which is a grand quality in any people. They are as free as they are loyal, and law-abding and law-enforcing to a degree known, perhaps, in no other country. O'Brien's mission among them was ungrac ous and has been fittingly rebuked. He tried o drag them into a quarrel which was no concern of theirs. Even the Irish Canadians treated him coldly and disapproved of his visit. They remembered the Fenian invasion of 1866, and had not forgotten the resolutions of the Canadian Parliament advising the British people to give Ireland the same form of government that Canada enjoys.

"Mr. O'Brien's visit has only had one important effect, and that is to solidify Canadian sentiment in opposition to the Home Rule party which sent him forth to bread dissensions in a country that had shown marked sympathy with the principle of home rule."

The Executive Committee of the Toronto Prison Aid Association held a meeting yesterday afternoon in the Rossin House to arrange for the reception of the National Prison Association of the United States which holds its annual meeting it this city which holds its

for the reception of the National Prison Association of the United States which holds its annual meeting in this city next September. Mayor Howland, Warden Massie of the Central Prison and others were present.

The association has hitherto been an American one, but as similar associations in Canada have expressed a willingness to co-operate, it is likely to become international. Its membership consists of wardens and others having charge of prisons, and also those who are interested in prison reform. Mr. R. B. Hayes, ex-President of the United States, George W. Cable, the southern author, and other prominent Americans will attend the convention. The sessions will be held in the Normal School Theatre.
