He further points out that the Ontario Legislature passed an act in 1879 providing that the dimensions of a grand jury should be reduced from twenty-four to fifteen, which was to become law on a day named by proclamation of the Lieutenant-Governor. However, the Ontario Government is willing to cooperate with the Dominion Government and reduce the dimensions of grand juries by simultaneous legislation, thus avoiding any question of constitutionality. This seems to be a safe reform containing none of the supposed perils of a complete gabolition of the system.




