MOWAT'S DEATH KNELL!

Sounded in London Last Night by Mr. Meredith.

AN HONEST CLEAR-CUT POLICY

Enunciated by the Leader of the Ontario Conservatives.

SEPARATION OF CHURCH AND STATE

Energy, Economy, Efficiency, and Equal Rights.

Energy in the Advancement of Ontario's Iron Mining and Smelting Industries—Economy in Public Expenditure by Abolition of Government House, Institution of Biennial Sessions and Leasing of Unusable Officials—Economy of Ontario's Timber Resources—Efficiency in Every Department of the Public Service—Equal Rights in That All State-Aided Schools Should Be Controlled by the State, Should Have One Set of Text-Books and the Subject of the Same Regulations—Municipal Control of Liquor Licenses—A Straight Stand on Prohibition—Every Plank an Honest One That Will Be Endorsed Emphatically on June 25.

LONDON, Ont., May 21.—The Meredith meeting here to-night has been a magnificent success, and the speaker, Mr. Meredith, has met with the most enthusiastic approval in a most successful manner the very pronounced feeling of antagonism toward the Mowat Administration which animates the bulk of the electorate west of Toronto and Lake Huron. How strong that feeling is one has only to move along the western portion of the province, to talk to the people and to read the proceedings of the biennial meetings and to realize as best one can the activity and influence of the P.P.A. movement, politicians protest to imagine. This feeling in the minds of the people of Western Ontario, roused in whatever way it may have been, is intensely Protestant. Not that it denies anything that the Ontario electorate has a right to, but it is strong—almost aggressive—in its maintenance.

1. Equal rights to all—privileges to none.
2. The entire separation of church and state.

3. The amplest provision to the Catholic electorate of such rights in regard to Separate Schools as they enjoyed under the British North America Act was passed. Not an abridgment of these rights in a single instance, but an equal opportunity to declare in favor of the retention of these rights in any single direction.

That is what Mr. Meredith set out to vindicate. He frankly contended for the Catholic population the right to have their schools, but he maintained that it was still within the right of the Ontario electorate to insist that as they were state-aided schools, supported by public money, they should be under the government and regulation of the State, subject to state supervision, that their supporters should be trustees, that their teachers should possess the qualifications defined by the state necessary for public school teachers receiving public money; that the text books used in the schools should receive public approval, and that, while Catholic children were not denied a single right they honored, the state, as guardian of the education of the people, was free and bound to ensure that the education imparted to children of the province, whether in Public or in Separate schools, was of an efficient character and made word, that as the state was responsible for such education and provided the means for its supervision, it was its duty to see that it was not in any way prejudicial to the interests of the state, and that his hair-dressing in that time strongly and he insisted, with much show of reason, that Sir Oliver Mowat had either done them or had trifled with them.

Unbounded Enthusiasm.
The first thing that deserves mention in regard to the Meredith meeting is the enthusiasm that prevailed. The people here are full up to the brim in their admiration of the speaker and his views. Shortly after 7 o'clock the neighborhood of the Grand Opera House was crowded with people anxious to get into the hall. When the doors were finally opened at 7:30 the theatre rapidly filled, and it was not long before the aisles, too, were soon crowded, and among those who stood to stand were many who had not been to the theatre for some time. There was no shouting, no cheering, no cat calling. The meeting was unanimous itself.

A Message of Victory.
The Conservative campaign opened under favorable auspices in the city of London to-night. If the wave of enthusiasm that is rolling here to-night is a fair indication of the feeling throughout the province there can be little doubt which way the victory will go on June 25.

Mr. Meredith was not in as good voice as he generally is. He had some kind of a frog in his throat. But he was intensely earnest and he spoke with the fire of the great man. His reference to his 22 years in politics and his 15 years of leadership of the struggle that he had begun to write, but that those who knew him from his boyhood and his early manhood would give him credit for the integrity of his words, brought him round after round of applause and approval.

300 On the Platform.
Precisely as it looked the curtain went up and exposed to public view such an array of celebrities and staunch supporters as is rarely seen at any meeting. There must have been at least two and three hundred on the stage from which all the speakers had been conducted. Among this solid phalanx were, noticeable as a number of Meredith candidates from neighboring constituencies. Major Beattie, president of the Liberal Conservative Association, took the chair and introduced the speaker of the evening. The Sons of England Band occupied the front row of seats in the orchestra chairs and during the evening enlivened the proceedings with lively airs.

Mr. Meredith, who was received with loud and continuous cheering, accompanied with the waving of flags and handkerchiefs.

HILL WILL OPPOSE ST. JOHN.

WEST YORK LIBERALS CHOOSE A CANDIDATE.

Dr. Gilmour, M.L.A., in a short Address Explains the Steps Our Members Have Taken to Oppose the Nomination of the Liberal Candidate.

The Liberals of West York met in convention yesterday at the town hall, Weston, for the purpose of nominating a candidate in opposition to J. W. St. John for the Local Legislature.

Notwithstanding the unpropitious state of the weather about 200 of the 250 delegates elected from the different municipalities put in an appearance. The nature of the elements did not dampen the ardor and enthusiasm of the delegates, and the convention was a very successful one. The delegates were present:

McQuethon, Dr. Gilmour, Toronto Junction, by Dr. Gilmour explained the nature of the meeting, stating that he was not a candidate, and asked whether it was the wish of the meeting to proceed on the basis of a convention to be held on June 25.

The meeting was plainly in favor of placing a candidate in the field at once, and the chairman then proceeded to call for nominations, which resulted as follows:

W. J. Hill, proposed by ex-Warden of York Andrew Russell and George Selwood, Toronto Junction.

Dr. J. T. Jackson, Weston, and George W. High, Bayview, were also named.

Mr. Meredith then took up the license system and accused the Liberal Government of taking advantage of one of the most honest sentiments of the people for the purpose of using the liquor traffic in the interests of their political party. It is well known that the hotelkeepers and restaurateurs are engaged in the business. The system was rotten to the core in that it compelled men to vote, not according to the dictates of their consciences, but according to the wishes of those who controlled their business. (Hear, hear.)

The Opposition is opposed to the Government's license system in their hands. Our theory is to let the cities and towns appoint their own commissioners, who shall determine the number of licenses and those who shall have the licenses. In the rural districts the licenses should be issued by commissioners appointed by the county councils. The traffic should be entirely separate from Government control.

A straightforward stand on Prohibition. In regard to the prohibition movement the speaker deemed it his duty to bow to the mandate of the people of the province. Whether prohibition can be enforced or not, and in some way it cannot be enforced, his position is that the will of the people of this province must be respected and not the Legislature has jurisdiction to pass a prohibitory law that will be the duty of the speaker of the evening to carry into effect a prohibitory law if the people desire such a law.

A Secret Tally Noted.
Adverting to the next branch of his subject Mr. Meredith enquired why the people were denied a secret ballot the same as was with the waving of flags and handkerchiefs.

POLITICAL DAMP WEATHER.

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He had little or no experience in politics, having devoted most of his time to the study of law, and he felt that it would be better for him to hold West York to Reform principles.

Resolutions were passed thanking Dr. Gilmour for his past services and expressing confidence in the Mowat Government.

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Mr. Davin seconded the motion, and after some further discussion Hon. Mr. Patterson, Minister of Militia, said that he sympathized with the motion, and if the mover would withdraw it he would promise to bring the matter to the attention of his colleagues.

The motion was withdrawn.

Mr. Edgar then moved the resolution which has stood in his name on the order paper for about six weeks and has become known as the "Universal Peace" motion. It recites the motion passed in the Imperial Parliament last year, endorsing a resolution adopted by the United States Congress in favor of arbitration, and concludes with an endorsement by the Canadian House of Commons.

Mr. Edgar spoke up to six in support of his motion, delivering a moderate and carefully prepared speech.

That Canada is a Defencelose.
After recess Mr. Edgar concluded his remarks and was followed by Mr. Dickey, who seconded the motion, but said that he was half afraid he and the mover would open themselves to ridicule on account of the position of Canada as a defencelose people, who could resist attack.

Supported By The Premier.
Sir John Thompson supported the resolution and spoke in eloquent terms of the good example set by two great nations in adopting such a resolution in the settlement of their international difficulties by arbitration instead of by the arbitrament of war. He was already carrying on in his allusions to the action of the United States in making war on our defencelose sealer at the very time they were passing a resolution in favor of arbitration, and in terms of high praise of the action of the United States in referring the matter to arbitration.

He referred to the award of the Paris tribunal, touching lightly on it by the Opposition, and concluded a brief but eloquent speech with the hope that the resolution would be adopted unanimously.

Laurier Agrees.
Mr. Laurier agreed with the mover and seconded as to the importance of the motion, but had an exception to Sir John Thompson's remarks with reference to the adverse criticism of the Opposition on the Behring Sea award. He defended that, even if the award had been a hundred times more disadvantageous to Canada than it was, it would still have been much better than a recourse to war. After some remarks by Mr. Gilmour the motion was carried unanimously.

Mr. Somerville's motion for copies of correspondence with reference to some of Henry George's works being sent to the Lead Office was passed without discussion.

The Woodstock Vestment Case.
Mr. McCarthy made his motion for copies of papers relating to the free admission at Woodstock of some vestments for the use of the Anglican Church at Woodstock by Rev. M. G. Farthing. In support of his motion he read a great deal of correspondence between Mr. Farthing and the Department of Customs, and claimed that great injustice had been done by admitting the goods for Father Brady's use and charging duty to Rev. Mr. Farthing.

Controlled Laurier replied at considerable length, quoting from the correspondence to show that the statement that any wrong or injustice had been done by him was untrue. He also quoted from a letter of Rev. Mr. Farthing, apologizing for his attack on himself. He then turned on Mr. McCarthy and charged him with publishing the correspondence in violation of the rules of the House.

This brought Col. O'Brien to his feet and laughter from both sides of the House, which was renewed by Mr. McCarthy. Mr. McCarthy continued to attack Mr. McCarthy, saying that he had lost all the cases entrusted to him by the Government by Mr. Farthing.

The discussion was continued by Colonel O'Brien and Mr. McCarthy.

The Collector Was at Fault.
Sir John Thompson said it was evident from the correspondence that the Collector of Customs at Woodstock had made a mistake, and the duty had been paid as soon as the error was discovered. The Controller of Customs had nothing to do with the matter, and it puzzled him to understand why Mr. Wallace should be supposed by a Roman Catholic priest. The motion was carried.

Disfranchisement of Provincial Officials.
Mr. Mills (Annapolis) made his motion for disfranchising employees of local Government which have been disfranchised by the Federal Government, and justified his position by recounting the history of the Legislature in the different provinces under Liberal rule for disfranchising Federal officials.

Mr. Fraser advocated the disfranchisement of all officials, Dominion and provincial.

Hon. Mr. Daly said he could not support the resolution, as it favored too much of retaliation. He moved the adjournment of the debate, and the House adjourned at midnight.
