THE LAND OF THE JAP.

Interesting Letter From Mrs. Wm. J. Thompson, of Watford.

Shidznoka, Jan. 27th, 1911. EDITOR GUIDE-ADVOCATE:

Dear Sir,—Many thanks for the paper.
I have received it every week thus far.
The last one I received was printed Dec.
30th. I got it January 26th, 1911. I
promised you to write a letter for the
Guide, if you think it worth printing. I
hardly know what to write about. I
think Japan is the most wonderful counthink Japan is the most wonderful country in the world. The mountains are clothed in beauty; no barren mountains in the ports of Japan I have visited. The most beautiful trees I ever saw; orange groves and tea are cultivated on the sides of the mountains. Shidznoka, the city where our people live, is eighty miles from Yokohama where we landed after a voyage of thirteen days agoss the Pacific. voyage of thirteen days across the Pacific. Shidznoka is in Central Japan. There are fifty thousand inhabitants in it. It is clean and airy and noted for its manu-

facture of lacquer ware, delicate basket work in curios, and its great productions of tea. The mountains are covered with work in curios, and its great productions of tea. The mountains are covered with tea. The most interesting place of worship is The Temple of Sengus; the Shintoists worship there. I visit the temple very often. The interior of the temple has large pillars of lacquer; the central part of the temple ceiling is painted with dragons. We are always told not to fail to notice the carvings on the gates which lead to the shrines. One the gates which lead to the shrines. One of the carvings represents a lioness with her cub. Truly they have fine carving in Japan. They have a set of colored statuettes of ninety-five soldiers who fell in the Chinese war besides hospital nurses and Chinamen. Several other figures in the grounds are made of

cement, representing cavalry men.
The best excursion from Shidznoka is
by jinrikisha to Kunosan, here was the
first burial place of the great Shogun Ieyasu. According to some Ieyasu's body still lies here and others say his body was taken to Nikko. As we reach the temple we ascend a steep zig-zag cut in the rock one thousand steps when we in the rock one thousand steps when we get to the top where the temple is, the view of the sea is glorious but we obtain a still better one from a venerable gnarled tree called the (mononu no matso)
They tell us the temples have been puri fied to a certain extent by the Shinto party thirty years ago, but they still re-tain their Buddhist ornamentation. On one side of the temple is the wooden one side of the temple is the wooden effigy of a sacred horse, then as we proceed up a flight of steps we come to the drum tower, then we pass the treasure houses. As we go round the interior we see pictures of thirty-six poetical geniuses and there is an elaborate bordering of chrysantheums. The last flight of steps lead we up to the stope town of Leaven. leads us up to the stone tomb of Ieyası We happened to go on the anniversary of the Shogun and we saw them go through their services. Buddhist priests in beau-tiful robes of pale green silk and brown brocaded silk went through their prayers and sacrifices with many different salutations. I felt a strange feeling at the top of that great mountain overlooking the sea, at the devotion and earnestness of those priests. Their robes were well worth seeing. We had lunch in one of the priest's houses and wended our way downward, took jinrikisha for home well pleased with our day's journey. I'm atraid I have taken up too much space already so I will leave some of the other things I wanted to say for a future letter. 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

Annual Report of the Board of Directors

TO THE SHAREHOLDERS:

Your Directors beg to present herewith the annual statement of the affairs and financial position of the Canada Cement Company, Limited, as of the 31st December, 1910.

In presenting the Balance Sheet, we call attention to the Company's strong financial position as disclosed by the large amount of cash on hand, and other quick assets, and the comparatively small amount of current liabilities. After providing for interest on our Bonds and Dividends on our Preferred Stock for the year, we have been able to set up reserves for depreciation, extraordinary repairs and renewals, bad debts, etc., and carry forward a substantial balance to Surplus Account.

The consumption of cement during the past year was not as large as anticipated. Our business also suffered on account of the Railways not being able to meet our full requirements for cars during the heavy shipping season; consequently, we carry over from last year 781,116 barrels of

Early in 1910 the price of our product was fixed at a lower price than cement had ever been sold for in Canada, excepting for a short period in 1909, but your Directors are pleased to state that the anticipated savings in manufacturing and distributing our products were such that they were able to still further reduce this price.

We trust, when you consider the above mentioned conditions, and also the fact that during 1910 our plants were only operated to 57.6 per cent. of their capacity, the profits shown will be satisfactory to the Shareholders.

During the current year, we look for a larger natural demand, which demand will be stimulated by continuing to manufacture a strictly high grade article, and by selling it at the lowest possible price. This anticipated increase will enable us to operate our plants to better advantage than in the past, but we do not expect that the demand will be sufficient to enable us to put into operation either of the two plants which have been idle since the organization of this Company. However, it is confidently expected that the increased demand, and increased output, will result in further savings in the cost of manufacture and distribution, and it is the policy of your Directors to give your customers the benefit of these reductions,

The Shareholders' profits will depend on the increased volume of the Company's business, the policy of the Company being the maintenance of such a stable position as will insure regular and uniform payments of interest on its bonds and dividends on its Preferred stock, and at the same time be in a position to withstand any unforseen emergency that may arise consequent on business depression or otherwise, which condition naturally necessitates the accumulation of, and the maintenance of, a large cash reserve.

It is also the policy of the Company to equalize the price of cement throughout Canada in so far as the physical conditions make such possible, and in furtherance of this policy, your Directors have arranged to purchase a site near Winnipeg, on which they will erect, this year, a mill to grind clinker, which clinker will be shipped from one of our Eastern mills. The buildings, machinery, etc., will be planned so that, should it at any time in the future be advisable, a Burning Department can be added, and the clinker produced on the property.

And further, an agreement has been entered into whereby this Company expects to acquire, in the near future, a property at Exshaw, which, added to our Calgary plant, and the projected plant at Winnipeg, will put us in the position of anticipating any extraordinary growth in the consumption of cement in the Great West.

With the view of educating the public, and popularizing the use of cement, in addition to the ordinary advertising, the Company has published a small book illustrating some of the many uses to which cement may be put, for which book there has been a great demand, 25,000 applications for same having been received during the past six months.

For the purpose of stimulating interest in the Company on behalf of the Employes, both in efficiency and cheapening production, as well as creating a feeling of mutual goodwill, your Directors deem it expedient to introduce a system, already adopted by several large industrial corporations with beneficial results, viz., to enable employes to become the possessors of Preferred and Common Stock at prices which will be attractive to them, the employes paying a fixed amount per share per month out of their earnings, and the Company carrying the stock for them, charging a rate of 5% interest. If the plan is put into effect, all dividends will be credited to the employes applying for the stock. Said stock will be held in trust for the employe for a term of five years, excepting in exceptional cases, such as death, when his heirs will receive what benefit a deceased employe has derived from subscrib-

Your Directors feel that the policy, as herein outlined, will, as nearly as possible, make the interests of the consumers, the employes, and the shareholders identical, and will inure to the most enduring and beneficial results for all concerned.

The attention of teachers and trustees The attention of teachers and trustees who may be desirous of introducing some measure of agricultural teaching into the work of their schools or of improving their school surroundings by planting trees, shrubs or vines, is called to the work of the Schools' Division of the Experimental Union, one of the extension

ranches of the Ontario Farmers' Tech-ical College, viz: The Ontario Agricul-ral College.

tural College.

This organization was started two years ago for the purpose of bringing the schools of the Province Into closer connection with the College. The work is sow past the experimental stage. In 1909 there were 117 schools co-operating in the work and last year 237 schools. It is expected that this year there will be a much larger number of schools taking up the work. Interest in industrial or vocational education is growing, and with our the work. Interest in industrial or voca-tional education is growing, and with our Government taking legislative steps to support this line of work, it should not be long before practically every school in Ontario has modified its work in the direction of giving the boys and girls some practical instruction of Agriculture into the curriculum of the Public Schools has been tried several times. The plans has been tried several times. The plans offered by the Schools' Division may be found to help in the solution of this prob-

For this year the Schools' Division is arranging to send out seed packets for children's gardening, seed grain for small experimental plots, shrubs, vines and tulip bulbs for school ground improvement; tree seeds and agricultural seeds are also included in its distribution. To schools undertaking to frame it and give are also included in its distribution. To schools undertaking to frame it and give it a place on the walls, a picture of the Agricultural College is sent free also. For some of these things no charge is made, provided the material is used strictly for educational purposes; for most of the material, however, a charge is made as it is not possible, nor considered advisable, to undertake a free distribution of valuable material.

In all phases of the work, teachers and pupils are provided with instruction sheets, booklets or charts; they are not left alone in the work, but have the experience and co-operation of others who are doing the same kind of work elsewhere.


