Assessment Law.

At the request of some of our readers, we lay aside editorial matter prepared for this issue of the Monitor, to make room for the following explanations, semi-official at least in character, from which the intelligent tax payer may understand the law and even correct the less intelligent man who may act as assessor, and misread the statute. The Halifax Morning Chronicle devotes credit for its effort to render the obscure sections of the assessment Act into language which interprets them to common minds without legal training.

Notwithstanding that this is the second year of the operation of the assessment act, we find, from the numerous enquiries received, that there is still some misapprehension as to its meaning, and lack of full information as to the details. This is a matter of wide and general interest, we have taken pains to investigate the matter, touching certain points which the special enquiry has not made, and will submit to our readers reliable information on these points.

First. Many queries are made as to the schedule which taxpayers are required to make out. Last year it was optional with the assessor to send the schedule to the ratepayer to fill in the schedule or not. This year by the amendment of the act, the assessor is required to send the schedule to the ratepayer to fill in, and the assessor is not to be held liable for any error in the schedule, unless it is shown that he acted in bad faith or with gross negligence.

Second. There still seems to be some difficulty as to the meaning of the word "income." The law expressly provides that nothing is to be regarded as "income" that is derived from property that is subject to taxation. Therefore, the profits of the merchant are not "income," nor the profits of the farmer, miner, lumberman or fisherman. But income is confined by the law to wages, salaries, interest, dividends, and income derived from investments. For instance if a lawyer derives \$1,000 from his profession, he is not liable to tax on it, but if he derives \$1,000 from a farm, he is liable to tax on it.

Third. There is a common error as to the mortgage tax on the land and its full value. The mortgagee under the old law paid nothing. Under the new law he pays a tax on the mortgage of \$200 on a \$10,000 mortgage. To illustrate: A owns a farm worth \$10,000. B holds a mortgage on it for \$10,000. A pays a tax on the mortgage of \$200. B pays a tax on the mortgage of \$200. The total tax is \$400.

Fourth. Exemptions: mechanics' tools are exempt to the extent of \$200; farmers' implements are exempt to the extent of \$200; the produce of the farm being the property of the farmer, is exempt altogether, and also the produce of the fisherman. Widows, spinners and minors are exempt to the extent of \$400, and this exemption also applies to the case of wives deserted by their husbands and compelled to earn their own living.

These are the principal points which difficulties seem to be connected with, and the explanations we have offered will be of assistance to those who are endeavoring to administer the law. -Halifax Chronicle.

LOCOMOTIVES TO RUN BY SOLE.—Four locomotives to be run by soda, which takes the place of fire under the boiler, have been built for service in the streets of Minneapolis, Minn., where steam engines are forbidden. The engine is about sixteen feet long, entirely boxed in, with no smoke stack or pipes, as there is no exhaust or refuse. Inside the boiler will be placed five tons of soda, which, upon being damped by a jet of steam, produces an intense heat. In about six hours the soda is thoroughly saturated, when the action ceases. A stream of superheated steam from a stationary boiler is then forced through the soda, which drives out the moisture and the soda is ready for use again.

THE EXHAUST STATE OF THE CYLINDER is used to saturate the soda, and by this means all the refuse is used. These engines are the first of the kind that have been built in this country. They are said to have the same power as those used on the New York elevated road. Soda engines are used in Berlin and other European cities and they also traverse the St. Gotthard tunnel under the Alps, where sufficient ventilation cannot be had to carry off the noxious gases which would be generated by a steam engine.—New York Commercial Traveller.

NATURE HAS ENABLED SOME ANIMALS to see objects behind them as well as in front without turning around. The hare has this power in a marked degree. Its eyes are large, prominent and placed laterally. Its power of seeing things in the rear is noticeable in greyhound coursing, for, though this dog is mute while running, the hare is able to judge to a nicety the exact moment at which it will be best for it to double. Hares are another instance. It is only necessary to watch a hare driven invariably without blinders to notice this. Let the driver even attempt to take the whip in hand, and if the hare is used to the work he will at once increase his pace. Spilling Children. The Tea Was Warm.

'The worst injury any person can inflict on society is to put away their children in such a way that when they grow up the world will regret that they did not die in infancy. A mother allows her boy to answer her back, and treat her rudely. Years after she has gone to her account another person will reap the bitter harvest of her weakness. Teach him to hate cruelty, to take the part of the weak, to recognize the special gentleness and respectability of his mother and sisters. In this way you may prevent your pets from ever becoming pests.'

The above extract from 'The Five Talents of Women,' and most heartily will be endorsed even by those who offend against its ideals most. The need of care for children is an undisputed question; and sometimes one is forced to question if the results for the great mass of children would not have been better if we had learned to use the world culture instead of care when speaking of their training. Caring for a child seems to be purely physical, a child's financial, the two responsibilities of a child's guiding that can be trusted to servants. Culture recognizes more in the child than in the body. It recognizes a mind and a soul in the child, and it is for which the present is a preparation working to positive results. Yesterday, that well-dressed mother who quietly put a rugged, healthy boy in a vacant seat in a Fourth Avenue car, ostentatiously paying full fare—though the boy was under age—while an elderly gentleman stood up, certainly was taking a cure in the child's mind and a soul in the child's nature. The possibility of gentle consideration for others in the future of a boy so trained is hopeless.

Culture means care, but far more than care. It means the study of the future citizen in all his relations; it means the constant pruning of disagreeable habits; it means the imposing of burdens that will develop thought and consideration for others. Bad table manners in a child are the reflex of ignorance or carelessness of the parents, and when developed till they become habits, are bonds that were woven by the parent. Selfishness and disregard of the rights of others are but the natural fruit of a childhood that may have had care, but lacked that which is far higher, culture. The time to begin culture is in the cradle, elevating the heart with the influence about him.—Christian Union.
