"KNOCK, AND IT SHALL BE OPENED UNTO YOU."

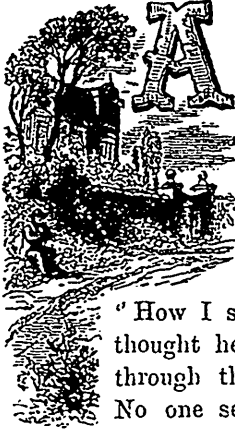

THE LESSON STORY.
