Those who con-Municipal, Government and dueted the world's commerce in past ages were chiefly commercial travellers. To them is chiefly due those achievements in the arts of peace, to which this age owes its main glory. They cut through the dense, dark forests of barbarism; they too ploughed the main as pioneers. They opened the roads over earth and sea, along which the mighty tide of religious, educational and social mission influences flowed. Wherever the commercial traveller set his foot there were established social order; political liberty; industrial enterprises, out of which came the wisdom or the wealth which gave the world the requisite resources and capacities for religious, governmental, and other organizations, which contribute the soul and body of civilization. The lands which to-day are blighted by semi-barbarism, or by despotism, are those where the commercial traveller is unknown, or his operations are restricted. or his calling unhonored. Greece, whose Literature and whose Art and whose Politics reached the summit of glory, to whose inspiration and teachings the modern world owes so much of which it boasts, was largely enriched by the enterprise of its e mmercial travellers.

England was first touched by civilization through travellers sent out by commerce. It was the trading impulse sent Cosar to Britain; it was the subordination of that force to mere militrary ambition that ruined the Roman Empire. The magnificent record of the Italian Republics; their vast wealth; their noble struggles for liberty; for self-government; their splendid artistic fame; rested upon and arcse from the enterprise of commercial travellers, who pushed the trade of Venice. Florence, Pisa and Genoa, wherever trade could be done. The English merchants who sailed from Kentish ports in the 8th century, were commercial travellers. England owes its woollen trade to Flemish commercial travellers who decided to establish this as "a native indistry" in 1808. So later, to the entertrise of travelling foreign merchants, Europe owed its silks, cotton, glass and other industries. Later still, by the same means, came the making of linen, lead pipes, gold coin-, etc., which commercial travellers having seen abroad resolved to manufacture in the old land.

In 1296 the first "Commercial Travellers Association" was organized in England, under the name of "Merchant Adventurers." 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commercial travellers. This remarkable body was the first "Board of Trade"; prolably the only national one ever organized.

Take these as samples, the first furnace used for heating rooms by steam; the first artistic fender and fire grate; the modern kitchen range; the first railway switch and turntable; the first railway saved-these were all the work of men who were commercial travellers. The vast improvements made in casting cannon and pipes; the building of iron bridges, with a long list of other advances in mechanism, were the ideas and inventions of commercial travellers. 





A person who never toucher an article of diet or refreshment cannot, in the very nature of things, be "temperate" in regard to their use, his attitude is indeed intemperate, or con trary to temperance.

The initial difficulty of such an analysis arises from the impossibility of levying upon one department an exact share of the expenses of management. A very large part of the outlay of such a company is made in advertising both sections jointly, in canvassing indiscriminately, in maintaming a staff whose respective labors for one department, and the other cannot be well assured equitably on either. To levy such expenses on the basis of the gross amount of the business done in each division is only a "rule of thumb" method, as life assurance is not like a manufacturing or store-keeping enterprise, in which purchases and sales are begun and closed in a definite and brief time, the result being quickly and positively ascertainable. Life assurance business is subject to very prolonged contingencies which make an exact analysis of the cost of some one portion impossible. The company, for instance, may spend considerable time in trying to secure an application for a policy under the "Temperance" plan, and, after spending its efforts in vain, it may secure from the person it has been soliciting, one messages of sympathy. under the "General" section, practically may be withdrawn or transferred from ness, save by some arbitrary rule.

The managers of such companies are almost invariably a little "gone" on the total abstinence question, and are prone to accept business on that basis much too readily as evidence of the progress of their favorite "fad." We regard then the attempt to state scientifically the exact working of two departments such as are kept up by the "Temperance and General," as an impossibility, as assumptions must be made and conclusions drawn which are vitiated by mere guessing and suppositions. It is reported that the "Temperance" section mortality returns do not show favorably to total abstinence. Probably the fear of this coming out publicly accounts for the unwillingness of the management to make more complete returns.
