

VERA CRUZ, April 21—Vers Cruz tonight is in the hands of forces from the United States warships, but the occupation of the port was not accomplished without loss of American lives.

Four Americans, bluejackets and marines, were killed by the fire of the Mexicans, and 21 fell wounded. The Mexican loss is not known, but it is believed to have been heavy.

The water front, the customs house and all important piers, including those under the terminal works from which extend the railroads to the capital, have been occupied. All the territory around the American consulate is strongly patrolled and detachments hold other sections of the city.

The Mexican commander, Gen. Gustavo Maas, offered a stubborn resistance to the American advance, and there was received by Secretary of the for many hours there was fighting in the streets. Toward nightfall it was reported that the main body of the Navy Daniels at 6 o'clock. Rear-Admiral Fletcher, in command of the United States warships, prefaced his occupation of the port by a demand, thru the American consul, W. W. Canada, for its surrender. Gen. Mass promptly declined to accede to this demand, and shortly afterwards ten whaleboats were sent off from the side of the transport Prairie loaded with marines. These boats effected a landing in the neighborhood of the customs house before noon, norther, landed marines and sallors and a few minutes later Capt. William R. Rush of the battleships Florida, who was in command of the operations from the Utah, Florida and Prairie ashore, brought his flag in.

MARINES REPLIED TO FIRE.

Capt. Rush's men had already taken up their positions. They numbered 150 bluejackets from the Florida, forces did not oppose landing, but 390 marines from the Prairie and 65 marines from the Florida. Later these were augmented by a detachment

The coming of the American forces was not heralded by any great excitment, but small crowds gathered to watch the landing. Soon the bluejackets and marines marched thru the streets leading from the water front and along the railroad yards. Others proceeded to the American consulate, while still others were deployed along the approaches to Central Plaza, in which Gen. Maas had concentrated his men. These manouvers were effected without opposition, but suddenly Gen. Mass challenged the advance with the first shots—a volley fired housetops and streets. Tehre was a lull for 10 minutes and then another brief exchange from the west end of Montesinos street, where a federal outpost was stationed.

The first shots from these pieces were directed against an ancient tower which once served as a lighthouse. This was occupied by Mexican sharpshooters. Lieut. NO PEACEFUL OCCUPATION TO BE ALLOWED BY MEXICO

Stubborn Resistance Was Put Up Against Americans When They Landed at Vera Cruz, Which Was Captured With Loss of Several Men.

VERA CRUZ, April 21.—The Americans have captured Vera Cruz, but at the cost of the lives of several men and a much larger number

The Mexicans, under Gen. Maas, the commandant of Vera Cruz, put up a stubborn resistance. Gen. Maas challenged the advance of the Americans almost from the first, and made it clear that the Mexicans do

not propose to permit a peaceful occupation.

Less than half an hour after leaving the side of the United States transport Prairie, the marines had landed, and the absence of resistance at the waterfront, and failure on the part of the Mexicans to contest the taking of a position somewhat in from the waterfront, caused the curious spectators in the street to laugh, and when one Mexican peon ran for cover, having had the temerity to shout at the top of his voice, "Viva Mexico,



The rules follow: "Article xxv.: The attack or bom-



George Bernard Shaw has said all that is needed to be said about censors and censoring. When the London censer prohibited "The Shewing-Up of Blanco Posnet," Shaw wrote:

"This little play is really a religious tract in dramatic form. If our silly ensorship would permit its performright-side-up the perverted conscience and reinvigorate the starved self-respect of our considerable class of loose-lived playgoers whose point of honor is to deride all official and conventional sermons."

Mr. Shaw discusses the whole question of the censorship at great length in his preface to the play. Why the Liberal Government meddled with the censorship at all he explains. "Many simple souls believed that it was because certain severely virtuous plays by Ibsen, by M. Brieux, by Mr. Granville Barker and by me were suppressed by the censorship, while plays of a scandalous character were licensed without demur." It is this inconsistency which Mr. Shaw describes as the Achilles heel of censorship. 


INCOME TAX BILLS HARD TO COLLSCT.

Horace L. Brittain, director of the Bureau of Municipal Research, addressed the Municipal Improvement Association at luncheon yesterday, on "Leaks in City Government." He criticized the civic administration for needless borrowing, locing discounts by delays in payment and selling sinking fund securities at short notice to me maturing obligations. Speaking of in-come tax dodging, he said:

"I have been credibly informed that some men make it a practice to pay no attention to the receipt of income tax bills, and in many cases actually never pay them. Even if those who remain in the city do eventually pay there must be hundreds and thousands of tax bills that are totally lost by the moving away, or death, of those to whom the tax bills were sent. A friend of mine recently was asked by a man who is receiving \$5000 a year, what an income tax bill meant, as he had never received one.



Several counties in Nebraska reported notable losses in acreage owing to lack of moisture. There was word, too, from Missouri that Hessian fly damage was no longer a theory, but in Pettis County at least was a demonstrated fact.

It looked as if liquidating sales of corn had for the time being reached an end. The west and southwest reported greatly improved demand from feeding sections, and some of the larger shorts here evinced considerable eagerness to cover on all weak spots in the market. Cash dealers in Chicago said they were receiving good orders for immediate loading to fill in gaps east before the built of the Argentine new crop would arrive. Nevertheless, the May deligers here decisively lost its premium over deferred deliveries.

These quotations would go to show that fat cattle were about 10c to 15c lower than on Monday, providing the quality was the same.

Sheep, lambs and calves, as well as hogs, sold at steady prices.

Feeding steers were the best sellers, and in some instances brought more than some sold for butchers' purposes.

Milkers and springers were firm at steady prices.

Choice steers sold from \$7.60 to \$7.35.
