- Some enterprising Americans are abont to commence a pork-pucking establishment at Morrisville, near Othwa. They will also purchase and ship grain.

- The rails of the II:milton and North Western Railway are now had to Port Dover and the first train passed over the line on the Queen's Birthdiy.
- E. B. Sinderson, boot and shoe manufacturer, of Toronto, has compronised with his ereditors at the ridicalonsly low mate or 5 cents on the dollar:
-The contract for the constritction of the Quebec graving dock has been ararded to Messrs. Charlebois, Shanly \& Co., for the sum of \$422,984.
-.-A Aother Jobster canning establishment ms just been built at Port Matoun, N.S., which is capmble of puting ap 100,000 cases of lubsters in a senson, and will employ 103 hands.
- A Dundas man is takiag thorough bred Durbam cattle to Manitoba. The stock in that province is capable of great improvement, and we are glad to see that efforts are being made in that direction.
- A Belleville mper learins from good anthority that one of the mines in the rear of the county is turning out to be very tich in the precious metals. A vein has been struck Which will yield a very large per cent. of gold.
-The smallest dividend on record, eleveneighteenths of 1 per cent., has recently been declared by the assignees of a bankrupt estate in New. York. One creditor received 4 cents and mother 9 cents.
- Two Oltawa contractors have succeeded in obtaining the contract for the erection of thie new St. Jobn yost oflice; to take the place of
that destroyed by fire in the great conflagration of Junc last.
- A ship canal through the Isthmus of Famama has long been talked of. There is at last "hrosuect of its being built, a contract with that end in view having been ratified. It is to. be finished in 12 yeara from 1883.
- A vein of pure albertite is said to have been discovered at Memmancook, N. B. The vein is nine inches in diameter; its depth nad extent are not yet ascertained. It lies about three feet from the surface.
- A singulur item in the British tride returns for the first quarter of the yeur is the increase ol shipments of hardware and cutlery to Russia, which in other respects has shown a decided tendency to cense trading with England, whenever German goods would do.
- Mr. Jette, M. P., has gone to England to represent the Provincial Govermment, before the Privy Commi, in the appeal case respecting the right to impose stamp duties on ineurance compmies doing business in this Province. Su much for party power.
- New brunswick is to have new provincial buildings, certainly not before they are required, for the present ones are alstanding disgrace to the province. Phans, with estimates of cost, are asked for through the columas of the Official Guzette.
- Times ate reported dull in St. John and Moncton. Joiners work for 51 a day and laborers have to be content with 80 cents. A number of men have been discharged from the Interconial shops at Moncton as there is not work enough to keep them employed.
- Under the Act of lasl Session of Parliament, to gram relief to the Canada Agricultural Insurance Company, P. S. Ross, W. T. Fish and G. II. Dumesuil have been appointed joint assignees to administer the aftairs of the Company.

- The following gentlemen are competitors for the position of Flour Inspector in this city, Messrs. Louis A. Boyer, James Williamson, John Brodie, John Fairbairn, H. Labelle and J. B. Gingras, of Montreal; Alexauder Rough and Wm. Gray, of Toronto; and J.T. Ross, of Conway, Ont.
- The danger of small steamers, often run by those who do not understand them, was forcibly illustrated in Galt last week, where a boat of this kind became unmanageable and was carried over a mill dam and capsized, resulting in the drowning of eigist persous out of seventeen who were on board.
- At a mecting of the Canada Engine and Machinery Compuny, held on 'luesday, a resolution was carried to acceptan offer from a new company of 40 cents on the dollar for the assets of the old company. The leading men of the new company are Messes. Stephen, Rankin and Reckic.
-J. D. Ronald, of Chatham, Ont., who carries on an extensive foundry, has been talking for some time of removing to some other point. The village of Brussels has been trying to secure his works, and the rate payers have just passed a by-law to grant him a bonus of $\$ 20$, 000 if he will establish himself there.
- Dredging operations are being carried on in Toronto and Collingwood harbors. In the latter it is proposed at present to dredge only the worst parts of the harbor, so as to form a channel deep enough to admit vessels of heayy draught. Eventually the channel will bemade about 300 feet wide and 16 feet deep.
- A proclamation appears iu last Suturday's official Gazette applying the provisions of the Blake Act to this city and the connty of Hochelaga, from lst June. $1 t$ is to be hoped the Act will be duly enforced, and that there will be no more of those shooting cases which have unfortunately been so frequent of late.

- A robbery of silks, to the value of $\$ 500$ or $\$ 600$, wasmade early on Saturday morning last from the premises of Messes. Brown, Taylor \& Co., McGill Strect. 'lie robbers eftected an entrance through the outer door by means of slecleton keys, and then reached the shop by cutting out a pane of gluss from the inner door. The police are on their track.
- A lake captain has discovered a new lighting apparatus, which consists of a common brick sonked in kerosene oil for ten minutes. The brick absorbs the oil, and, being suspended with wire, will give a good light for lunt an hour or more. The captain has pat this sort of light to practical use, and finds that it is better than the common torch.
- Alcohol is being shipped from Chicago to the Mediterrancan. A cargo is now waiting for shipment, \$2.50 per barrel to Gibraltar being offered. The schooner While Cloud, now. in Chicago harbor, is negotiating for the chatter. She will carry the alcohol to. Quebec, where it will be transferred to the Pamlico, which will deliverit at Gibraltar "for orders."
-Trade in Toronto harbor is dull, rates being low. There is very little sailing at present with the exception of the vessels carrying through corn from Chicago. Rates are main-

- McGregor \& Grant, dealers in dry roods and clothing, New Glasgow, N. S., have friled, with linbilities amounting to $\$ 10,388$ and assets of $\$ 6,208$. Or their liabilities abont $\$ 4000$ is due to parties in New Glasgow. They offer 50 cents on the dollar, in 6,12 and 18 months, secured. - The liabilitics of Hon. James Skend, of Uttawn, as shown by the claims filed with the assignee, amount to $\$ 622,488.69$. There are preferential claims against the estate of $\$ 4,550.10$, and mortgages on the real eatate of $\$ 57,842.08$. The Quebec and Merchants' Banks hold security for their claims, the Quebec Bank on timber limits, and the Merchants' Bank hold a mortgage on the mill, and other security. A meeting of creditors is called for the $16 t h$ of June.
- George Black, a general merchant, of Mapleton, Manitoba, asks an extension. He and his brother removed from Montreal some years ago, and commenced business at Red River, where they were apparently doing well, but, though in a good part of the country, the prospective crossing of the railway line a couple of miles from their place of business has drawn Hway a portion of their irade, and Selkirls, (the crossing) bas now more merchants than the business of the place warrants.
- According to the figures in the newspaper directory just issued by Nessrs. S. M. Pettengill \& Co., advertising agents, New York, there are published in the United States and Canada 8,615 newspapers and periodicals; of which 790 are dailies, 6,545 weekty, 872 monthly, the remainder being issued at various periods. In Canada there are 44 dailies, 22 tri-weeklies, 14 semi-weeklies, 360 weeklies, 41 monthlies, and 8 others- 482 in all.
- The report just presented to the shareholders of the Great Western Railway of Canada for the six months ending on 31st January s'ows that the gross receipts amounted to $\mathbf{4} 467,237$; as compared with $\mathbf{E} 401,628$ for the same period the previous year, while the total working expenses were reduced from $£ 313,715$ to f 295,274 . there was a deficit of $\mathbf{x} 33,623$, whilst this year a surplus of 49,628 is shown, making $a$ gross improvement of $x 3_{3} 251$ for the half year.

- The gold mines of the Chandiere Valley appear to be very rich, and the miners are meeting with encomaging sucecss. Two men exhibited at the Crown Lands Department in Quebec last week the result of their labor at the St. Onge Company's diggings for the space of a month-seven pounds of gold in nuggets, which is worth something over $\$ 17$ per ounce. During the last two months the receipts at the Orown Lands Department for gold licenses have been over $\$ 100$ per month.
- Of $54,750,128$ bushels of grain received at the six principhl Athatic seaports the first four months of the year, New lork received $24,953,-$ 957 bushels, or $45 . \mathrm{G}$ per cent ; Baltimore, 11,947 ,700 bushols, or 21.8 per cent; Philadelphia, $11,558,380$ busiels, or 91.1 per cent; Boston, $4,972,50 \overline{2}$ bushels, or 9.1 per cent; Portland, 1,579,321 bushels, or 2.3 per cent., and Montreal, 45,208 bushels, or less than 0.1 per cent. The receipts at New Orleans were about the same as Boston.
- The New York Merald is strenuously advocating the repeal of so much of the mavigation laws of the United States as prevents a foreign-built vessel receiving a register in that country. Unless this clatim is repealed the people of the United States are not likely to derive much benefit from any war between England and Russia or any other power. We doubt whether public opinion in the United States Congress is sufliciently adranced to accept

THE CANADIAN MONIPILY-PARTY GOVERNMEN'I.
The number of this popular journal, which has just come to hand, is, we presume, the last which will be issued under the old management. It is horenfter to beamalgamated with Belford's Monthly, under the style and title of the "RoseBelford's Canadian Monthly and National Review," devoted to science, literature, art and politics, and is to be under the sole editorial control of 2 Mr . George Stewart, junior. The article in the last number on "Current Events" is mainly occupied with a severe censure of party government, which is the great bug-bear of those who arrogate to themselves the designation of the "Canada First" party, although we scarcely imagine that they seriously believe that there are any number of Her Majesty's Canadian subjects who desire the prosperity of other parts of the Empire in preference to that of Canada, These tirndes against party
government are very senseless, for there is no possible way of carrying on parliamentary government, except through the instrumentality of party. It must not be imagined, however, that those who are most attached to party govermment are blind to the evils which are the necessary consequence of the system. Party leaders in all periods of our history have committed errors of judgment, which have entailed loss of popularity, which has sometimes been irrecoverable, but generally, when they are men of ability, only temporary. It has been most truly said by Lord Macaulay that "theso two parties "have never been the whole nation, nay "that they have never, taken together, "made up a majority of the nation. Be"tween them has always been a great "mass which has not steadfastly aclhered "to either, which has sometimes remained "inertly neutral, and which has some"times oscillated to and fro." Theve cannot be a fairer representative of this class of the population than the renowned Times newspaper, which has, during a long series of years aimed at giving expression to the public opinion of the most influential classes in the United Kingdom, and which has maintained its entive independence of political parties. If the writer of "Current Events" were to confine himself to $n$ declaration that he saw so many faults in both the Canadian political parties that he found himself unable to give his adhesion to either, we should have no complaint to make, and we should, movoover, be ready to admit that his monthly criticisms of the acts of both parties would be calculated to be of great service to the public. Among the evil consequences of party the greatest, probably, is the want of candor displayed to those of the opposite party. It is not sufficient to criticize the policy of a hostile party, but it is the invariable practice to charge its supporters with being influenced by dishonest intentions and motives. There are periods, too, when party feeling, always strong, among those actively ongaged in the political conflict, becomes intensified. We ae passing at present through one of those periods. A general election is at hand, and, throughout the entire Dominion, the rival parties are appealing to the great mass of the people in whose hands are the scales, and by whose votes it will be decided by which of the rival parties we shall be governed for the next five years. We have admitted that there are inherent imperfections in party government, but they are as nothing to the inestimable benefits which it confers; and, notwithstanding the bitferness of feeling
exhibited by the party leadors towards each other, it may be hoped that it is more apparent than real. We have had an opportunity within the last few days of perusing a book, recently printed for pri vate circulation, entitled "Waifs in Verse" by G. W. Wicksteed, Q.C. The author, who is universally admitted to be one of the most valuable public officers that Canada has ever possessed, and who this year will have been fifty years in the service, has been induced, at the earnest solicitation of his friends, to collect and print the poetical pieces that he has thrown off from time to time at his few leisure moments. One at least of these "Waifs" was written fifty-seven years ago, while the Queen's Birthday IS78-Toasts-Govemor-General and Countess of Dufferin, and a National Anthem; wero all written within the last few weeks. Our reason for noticing this little volume on the present occasion is that we were moch struck by a remark in the preface, which, coming as it does from one who has had as good an opportunity as any living man of knowing the real sentiments of Canadian politicians of all parties and nationalities in the old Province of Lower Canada, in United Canada, and in the Dominion, sinco Confederation, possesses great value. No one who has the honor of Mr . Wicksteed's acquaintance will for a moment doubt his sincerity, and his opinion is, therefore, most valuable. After stating that "I have, under divers min"isters, drafted, consolidated, revised, "amended, or had some not unimportant "part in almost every possible bill which "has originated in the House of Com"mons, and have worked with and for "almost every minister and every men"ber of note," Mr. Wicksteed proceeds as follows:-"I am proud to say that "the best and ablest on either side have " ever treated me with the utmost consid"eration and confidence. I am by mature "and habit non-partizan and inclined to "look on both sides of every question, "and this was well, for no party man "could perform the duties of my office "with pleasure to himself or satisfaction "to the Housc. Party spirit has run "high, and members have said hard things "and accused one another of all sorts of "abominations in the heat of party strife; "but this I can say, - no one of any party "has ever asked me to draft or help to "draft a bill, clause, amendment, or reso"Iution which I do not think he honestly "believed to be for the good of Canada, "independent of party, and I feel sure "that the foremost men on cither side, "whom I am proud to call my friends, "might and would in their calmer mo.
"ments, friirly say to those of their oppo" nents worthy of their steel :"-
" I're done as fou have dome,-that's what 1 eonld,Induced as you have becn,-that's for my commey."
'T's those who helieve in the necessity of government, through the instrumentality of party, Mr. Wicksteed's testimony will be most encouraging. Besides "Current Events," which we may term the leading article of the "Canalian Monthly," there are several athers deserving consiteration. A writer, whose now de plume is 'sombllo' has made a vigorous onslaught on the New lemperance Act. He maintains that the advocates of prohibition aet in each constituency in concert, and exereise an influence far exceeding what they are legitimately entilled to, and he advises the licensed victuallers to unite and organize for self-protection. "Camadensis" has fumished an interesting articlo on "Uniform Non-local Time" which Mr. Sandford Fleming thinks a subject well deserving of discussion. It would not be possible for us to do any justice to this article in the space which we could devote to it, and we shall, therefore, merely refer to it as well worthy of perusal and reflection.

## TIIE SUGAR QUESTION.

Mr: Alexander McGibbon has addressed a letter to the Guzette on the sugar question, which we reproduce as, from his practical knowledge of the subject, the writer is entitled to have his views failly considered. We should hope that there would hardly be a second opinion as to the desirability of having our own sugar refineries at work, and doing a fairly remunerative business. The diffientity is to settle the amount of encmagement, or we should more properly say protection, which would be fair to the consumers. The duties fixed by Sir Jolin Rose and Mr. Jilley in $186 S$ were thought by many too favorable to the refiners, but the refiners, on the other hand, complained that they were not sufticiently protective. The producers of the best grocery sugars in the West Indies complained bitierly of those duties, which were intended to stimulate; the introduction of the lowpriced muscovadoes to the exclusion of the crystallized centrifugals. Now, leaving aside for the moment all discussion as to whether the refiners or their opponents were right as to the merits of the tarill decided oin by Sir John Rose and Mr. Tilley, it must be borne in mind that no change has been made in that tariff, with the exception of a reduction on the lower grades, which was admitted to be favorable to the refining interests. It may be doubted whether, under the circumstances, Mr.

Megiblon is justified in designating the present thriff' on sugar as "a new system." 'The refincties went on for' st considerable time under the present tarifts, and, no donbt, would have continued to do so but for the increase of bounty gramed by the United States, and for the frands perpetrated under the color test. Now we have invariably contendel that the United States bounlies should have been mel by a countervailing daty, which would Have offectanly redressed the grierance complained of by the refiners as regards the introduction of what Mr. Mchibbon terms "American whites." Our difficalty is this: we believe that the "Scotch yellow sugar" competes in the Camadian market with the "American whites" with advantage. Now letus, for argment sake,assume that by a countervailing duty, which we have always advocated, we sheceeded in exchnding the " American whites." How should we deal with the "Scoteh yellows"? As-far as regards that sugar it cannot be contended that either the late or the present government is chargeable with neglect. That sugar comes to Canada subject to full duties and without the benefit of drawback, and our refiners have no reason to eemplain of it. We fail to comprehent how Mr. Mecibbon proposes to deal with the Scotch yellow sugar, which is largely consumed in Canada. We can conceive of no reason except the establishment of a system of bountries on exportation, that would justify a larger measure of protection than that which now exists, and which was suffieient to enible our sugar refineries to supply the consumers for a large period of years. Unfortunately, Mr. Meciibbon's letter is obvionsly intended to serve a political object.

We shall not follow him into that discussion. The sugar question is one surrounded with difficulties, and is too important to be dealt with merely with reference to the political contest of the day. It appears that Scotch sugar refiners, without protection of any kind, are able to furnish an article which Mr. McGibbon assures us contains only 65 per cent. of sugar, while our own refiners, according to the same authority, furmished us with "pure sugar". Now it seems beyond doubt that "pure sugar" camnot be sold as cheap as an article containing only 65 pericent. of sugar, and yet our consumers prefer the cheap and bad article. To our mind the inference to be drawn from Mr. McGibbon's letter is that Canadian sugar consumers have a most depraved taste. They will have Scotel yellow sugar in prelerence to the pure sugar of their own refiners, but we fat to
eomprehend how a remedy is to be ippulied We publish Mr. Mcriblion's letter, and we entirely coneur in his opinion that the "Scoteh yellows "and " dmerican whites" are not deserving of the patronge of the publie, but, although we think the "Americun whites" might be kept out, without any sacritice of prineiple, we confous that we have not yot seen any feasible phan of preventing the eonsumption of "Seoteh yellows" by those whon preter the atide.

## Fogl ADUTTERATMN (3).

There is no loter example of the error of popular beliefs than that respecting the adulteration of sugar. We all have heard and read mumerous anecdotes of pious grocers who mixed sand with their sugars, a statoment as lacking in truth as that of the "basswood hams" and " wooden mutmegs' of our Yankee neighbors. There is scarecly any article of food so free from adulteration as sugar, and we believe that no means have hitherto been discovered for adulterating what is kmown as white " gimulated." Salt is used to a slight extent in Scotch refined, the light brown article known as coffee sugar in Ontario. The report of the department of Inland Revenue shows that the three samples furnished in October, $1 S \mathrm{i} G$, to the Toronto amalyst by Wm . Casswell of that city, all contained common salt ; the first a " crushed sugar," ten per cent., the seconci, a mere trace (from bottom of same barrel), the third, Muscovado sugar, 1.7 per cent. of common salt. These statements are repeated in the report for $15 \pi 7$, recently issued. Snimples were obtained in January, 18i7, from the following Toronto firms, Cramp, Torrances心 Co., Smith \& Keighley (2 samples), $F$. Morrison, Frank Smith \& Co., and W. Ramsay \& Co., of each of which it was reported, "It contains no injurious substance." Ofthe twelve samples examined in Montreal in December, 1S76, two contained levulose or inverted sugar, supplied by Kinlock and by Baird \& Kinnaird. Gibb, Laird $\mathbb{d}$ Co. supplied five samples, all of which were pure; those supplied by W. R. Ross \& Co., Reford Bros. and others were also free from admixture. The sugars analyzed in Montreal contained a very high percentage of cane sugar as compared with those examined in other places, with the exception of that supplied by Whitehead $\&$ 'lurner, and by Ross d. Co., of Quebec, which were also up to the highest standard. It would be interesting to know if this pure cane sugar was the product of the Redpath refinery which had ceased operations only a short time before, and why all the samples
examined in Montreal and the two above mentioned in Quebec were free from glucose or grape sugar. The sample supplied by Tobin \& Co., Esson \& Co., and Bauld \& Gibson of Malifax contained no adulteration. That fumished by J. S. Maclean, also one of the two samples from R. B. Macintosh, contained a slight admixture of glucose sugar.

In our issue of the 10 th inst., we gave the results of the analysis of coffee samples furnished in 'Toronto. We regret to say that the results in. Montreal are not as satisfactory as might be desired. Special mention should be made of S. $\$$ E. Eving, whose samples were all genuine coffee. Murray, Heron © Co. and A. Wills \& Co. also fumished samples of genuine coflee, but a very poor sample was also fumished by the former tim, being, in the words of the report, "atulterated with pea-meal and chicory about $i 0$ per cent." The two samples furnished by J. Langlands were both adulterated with ehicory and pea-meal. Eight samples were examined in Quebec, all apparently procured from retailers. The ollicer in Quebec may do unintentional injury to respectable firms of same name with those whose sumames only, in six eases out of eight, are given. The sample furnished by P. Maranda consisted "of oneeighth collee, the rest a mixture of chicory, ronsted peas and bears." Griftin \& Pelletier furnished samples of similar chameter to Mamata's. Onolleis simplo contained "little or no coffee; nearly all chicory, peas or beans roasted." The stmples fumished by Paylor and by J. O. Labbecontained one hall colteo; the rest a mixture similar to that above noted. No wonder that in Quebec the sound of the family collee-mill is heard in the land. In Halifax the sample obtained from W. M. Marrington was "pure coftee." Of the other samples, those supplied by Lordly \& Stimpson, Peaks \& Jaton, C. \& W: Anderson and Geo. Schwartz, were also of fair to good chanacter. Rye is used to a small extent in comnection with peas and ehicory in Nova Scotia, but there is a large percentage of pure colfee in all save two out of the eleven samples examined.

It is in the adulleration of milk that the greatest difficully is to be met with, and it may be supposed that the greater proportion of infint mortality in our large cities is chue in no inconsiderable degree to this most mischievous fraud. It is unfair to the mercantile community to institute comparisons between them and the milkman as regards the actulteration of their - respective articles of trade. The wholesale dealer, the jobber and retailer, in
tha, eofree, spices, colors, ete, do not perform the adulteration themseives; this is done by the foreign exporter, the grinder, etc., and a lower price is usually charged for the article. This is especislly the case in coffee and spices. Doubtless the best phace to exmmino tens is at the castom house, and a similar law to that passed in England in 1875 would be the surest remedy. It is perhipes to this law that we are indebted for the porer quali. ties of teas in the United States and Camada during the last two years, as by its provisions the Custons authorities in England have the power to refuse entry to teas which have been allu!terated, which consequently must find a market elsewhere. In ten there is oceasional mixing done by jobbers, but this can scareely come unler the term "talaterated," as even some of the most fasiali. ous consumers prefer thenir tea mixed black and green in ratious proprtions ace cording to taste. The admistimes on the part of the broker or jobber are genemally for the purpose of permitting "thave" in price to the retailer, fo maintain anything like a profit in these days of culting down prices. On the other hand the price of milk is never reduced because the cuality is. We pay our 5 to 6 conts a quart in summer and 7 to 8 cents in winter, whether the article be gool genuine milk such as that procured by the inspectors from I. Frvine, A. Lacombe, J . 0 Commor, L. Fleteher and others of this city, (incluting the Dominion daing in 187i), or consist of 20 to 25 per vent. water, and eream remaved, such as supplici by A. Norman amd others, nad by the Dominion Datiry, in T877. The samples supplied in Halifax wereall pure and unadulterated. The Guebec dealers also appear to rend gool milk with very few exceptions. Of the 24 sumples exanined in Poronto, but iwo appear to be genuine first-class articles; ro., those of Geo. Henderson and Thoma; Wilhams. The others were delicient in verious ways, by removal of cream, addition of water, Sc. Of the 33 samples evamined in Montreal, only nine were up io the standave; the others were "do:tored" as above, and with the addition in several cases of from one to two put cent. of common salt. We would suggest to the department that the same parties who fumistied samples in 1569 be called upon again, to ascertain whether any benefit proportionate to the cost to the comntry has been derived from the publication of the results in the Blue Book; whether the dealers supply a better article now than they did two years ago, whether as yet in our miclst "the spirit of murder works
in the very means of life." The results ot the provious analyzation appear unchanged, tabulated in both issues of the report.

It is a matter for some comfort that, with the exception of the produce of the "iron-tailed cow," none of the popularly supposed defilements, such as formerly used in London, Eng., are found in Canadian milk. In that city it was common, in onder to soften the sky-blue tint and bring the diluted goods up to a delicate cream color, to swing romal a ball of annatto in the can. Other careful obseryers and writers detected flour; starch and treacle in London milk. As a nation, yet in our intancy, we are embled to profit by the experience of our forefathers, and the sooner we wisely apply it the sooner will prosperity be our portion. The bone and sinew of the combtry are dependent for their strength on the chatracter ofour loorl, and it is to be hoped the department of Inlam Rovenue will be successful in the reform it has undertaken.

## GHIPEDGED BUTMER.

'lhe present article is deroted to a description of the submersion, or "conler" or deep-setting system, which we trust to make clear to our readers with the aid of the illustration below. This method has one great advantage over all others, inasmuch as it can be used for any number of cows, for the small dairy as well as the largest creamery. It is exceedingly simple, the machinery costs less than any other for butter-making and will enable any lamer to make an article which will command the highest price in the market, besides allowing him the use of the skimmed milk and buttermilk to feed his young stock.


The illustration shows four tin tanks or cans, $8 \frac{1}{2}$ inches in cliameter by 20 inches in depth, two submerged in water, and two on top, the better to show the construction. The box, or "cooler" as it is
called, is 30 inches lony, 23 in. wide and about 26 inches deep on the inside, and lined with zire. This box holds four tanks, or sufticient for 12 cows. The tanks have an opening th the bottom, by which, as soon as all the cremen has risen, the milk is clrawn off, a rubleer tube with a stop cock at the end, being used, which, on the principle of the syphon, thans off all the milk which lies above the level of the onter end of it. This reverses the ustal skimming operation, the milk being now removed from the cream insteat of the usual tedions process of lifting the erean from the milk dishibuted overa multitude of pans. By a strip of ghass inserted, say eight or ten inches perpendienlarly in the side of the upper part of the tanks in making them, the depth of crean can be seen, and the balance (the mills) in the tank can be measured off into another tank of ergual size when the cream can be poured out and placed in a simitar tank in the conler, where it should the kept free from contact with the outside air till the proper time betore chaming. But of this we shall speak again.

The first operation is to place the milk in the tanks as soon as possibleafter milk. ing, (the sooner it is cooled the lether), bearing in mimd our instructions on the subject of milking in our issue of the IOth inst, then phace the tanks in the " cooler," cover them over with ordinary milk pans or other such vessels, but inverten, as shown in the cut; then place some weight on top, or such as the suall beam of wood slided under littie cleats fastened into the sides of the cooler, or any other contriv. ance that will prevent the inverted pan covers being lifted by the water which is next poured into the box or cooler so that it completely covers the top of the tanks two or three inches cleep. Those who try to push an inverted vessel perpendicularly into water will understand the necessity for firmly fastening the covers, the air under them proventing the water rising within the cover and flowing into the milk. The water of a very cool spring will do, but it should, if possible, be kept down to a temporature of 40 to 50 degrees Fahrenheit,-a place for the thermometer, to regulate this being cut into the cooler, as shown in the cut, so that its back touches the aine lining. Thermometers which cost from 40 to 60 cents will do, and, if taken ordinary care of, will last for years. If the water be not under jo degrees, ice should be used, and in any case it should be kept at as even a temperature as possible. Submerged in water at about 40 degrees all the cream rises in $4 \frac{1}{2}$ hours; at 50 degrees or thereabouts, in 10 hours: If the witer have a tempera-
ture of 50 to 60 degrees the cream will take from 16 to 90 hours to rise, without other disadsantage, except that twice the can and coois capacity is needed than with a temperaturo nurder $50^{\circ}$. The milk when diawn off from the cream is quite sweat and fresh, much better than that genemally supplied by the city milkman.

And now th show the great cconomy of this phas. Ordimary milk pans cost about s'its per dozen. The lanks used in the submersion or coolor system cost sso each, but one of them holdings 40 lus. of milk is sufticient for three cots, execpt perliaps in the mictst of how seaton when a tifth tank may be reguinel for a proportion of $1 \because$ cows. There is great economy of space, the milk of 12 cows not covering more space than an orthaty conking stove, and, as all foul air or chinvis is exelucled, the purity of atmosphere so important in mising crean is thoronghy aceured. The system pur. suod in Denmaris and Hoistein, and we believe in some parts of Normandy also, is partiad immersion in very cool spring or iced watmr. ha the present we go a step farther; we totally immerse, excluding all contatt with the survounding atmosphere. The tanks need not be chemed but once a week. Fvery farmer's wile knows what a labor it is to keep milk-pans in good order. In describing this system some of our contemporaries in the western sections of Ontario, especially in Huron and Bruce counties, make use of the term "air-tight tank," which is apt to misleat. The tants is bot airtight until it is covered and submerged in the cooler. of course before removing the taks for refilling, the water in the coder must he lowered, which can be ensiiy regulated by a stop-cock or plug.

The gentleman whose personal appearance we live attempted to sketeh in the illustration holding a butter-worker in his hand is Mr. William Garvey, jum., of Morrisburg; Ontaris, alias the "Butler King;" well known to the butter men of Canada by his persistent and laudable eflorts towards improvement in the manufacture of this grect home product for which our country is so well adapted, and which should be secondary in importance only to our wheat and lumber for exportation. "His $M_{\text {ajesty }} "$ is a strong advocate of the cooler or deep-sotting system which we have attempted to describe, and, among other gifts, bis castomers can testify as to the accuracy of his judginent in what. constitutes a good article of butter.

## UNITED STACES FINANCES.

The session of Congress is drawing to a close. Several important questions which have oceupied a large share of aftention seem tikely to be shelved. The most important of these is the tarifl amendment, which was in the hunds of Mr. Wood, and which at one time semed likely to become law. If is not surprising that if should have been fond impossible to obtsin the conemmence to a tarift of a majority of a boty with such at variely of conltecting interests, and without tho inducement of adtesion to a ministry whose continuance in power depended on the suceess of the scheme. It is when finameial questions come under consideration that the defects of the Republican system are brought most clearly before us. The resmaption of apecie payments is not likey to be interfered with, and especially as it seems to be molerstood that the President would veto any bill the olject of which should be to post pone tho period of resumption. It seems probablo that there will be a gencmal consent to the circubation of grecubacks, and we shall be much surpinised if hacy do not become a permanent portion of the National currenes. When once redeematile in coin, even if that coin be silver, they will be a much more convenient mode of discharging liabilities of all kinds, than any deseription of com. 'lhey will constitute the reserves of the National Banks, and, if no dhange should take place in the rebative value of gold and siber, the fomermetal will be at a premium. It seems doubtal whether the lishery appropriation will be made, but, if not, the President vill, it is said, call an extra session of Congress. There are likely to be warm contests regarting steamship and malway subsidies, but, so fir as we can gathor from the public joumals, the session is not likely to be protracted beyond the month of June or eatly in July.

## FIRE INSURANGE.

We observe that the National Board of Fire Underwriters in New York, have sonnded a note of alam in a circular addressed to the insurance companies of the country. The New York Bulletin is of opinion that the present is "a critical "moment boih for the underwriters and the public whom they assume to insure." The cutting of rates, which seems to prevail inevery branch of business not only in the United States, but in Camada, is evidently producing considerable alarm in the public mind, which is manifestod by decreasing business. It is surprising to find the exient of the reluction in the premiums
paid on New Tork Gity business since 1873. Of course the depression in business would accome for a considerable re. duction, but there must be other caluses at work. The premitums paid on New York city business in $187: 3$ amomed to s8, 281,000 , while in 1877 they rere only \$5,032,000. The Bullelin whose authority is high states that the falline ofl is only partially due to the depression in trade and in values, its man cause is the " wild competition and reckless ignoring " of adequate rates during the past few "yeurs." the remedy suggested is re. organization among the companies, and the " conservatory influence of the National Board." The trouble is, that there seems no way of preventing violation of compacts entered into. We had occasion in our last mumber, when referring to the cutling of milway rates, to notice a statement that the ink was hardly dry in an agrement before it was violated. The milroad companies inflict injury on themselves, but unfortumately the fire insurance compunies not only injure themselves but suliject those who ingure with then to the risk of serious, loss. The subject is one which is as deeply interesting to Camadians as to citizens of the United States, and camot be too fyeguently pressed on their consideration.

## TORONTO AFFALRS. <br> Tomonto, Mty 2 t, isis.

The city is nut by my menns dall, although it is not eatsy to saty why it should be greaty more chereftal than it lats been for months, or even years, back. But it is sping ; it is at fresh sensen, and bits of biying are being fone in excess of what has taken flate during the winter. The ommipotent dietation of fashion must be obeged, and the work girls in warchonses and saleswomen in show-rouns ate fairly busy. The woney is coning from smew bert, alhongh people have been telling eath other that that sort of exchange was roing to be searcer than ever. And althongh it is not easy to see where much outside work has been done, or is being done, the population who dejend on their labour are not mearly so bady ofit to mpearance, as they were one year ago. 1 slwatid state that this applies to une sort of the working prophe, for there is amother sort who are living in a fashion that would make existence impussible, if it were not summer weather. The benerolent funds of sucietios that profess to take an interest in the condition of Englishmen, and of frishmen, and olters, are not allowed to he orro, acemulating interest. And it is a matter of speculation how many people live at all; hot having work, :s they sity; for montle at a time. 'there are not many contracts for building this summer, but it is noticed that the greater number of structires going up are of a superior sort, generally public buithings. The speculation of building, as a means of profitable investment of capital, has received a sercre check, owing to the alaming increase of taxes and the projected stree improrements, which will add to the rate. The property owners calculate that it requires now 331 per cent. of the rental of the entire revenue to pay taxes atei cliarges, and these beasts of harten -as they call themselres-snort with impatience at every new scheme of the municipal finance committec. It is significant of the distemper to note the steady harge list of sales of the houselold effects of citizens of good standing: and the large number of house properties that could be bought this spriug at a heary discount on the prices of even a yeurago. One of the "Property Owners," at a recent meeting of the Assucintion, remarked that their honses would soun be like some of the railway stack in it down company-they would have to give a bonus to a man to take the possession of their hamis. Bat that is only the immedinte, allhough it is mather a blue; lookon.
It is probably quite a legitimate way of doing business, but it sems a little desperate of the promuters to make the announcement so boldy. It has been lain down by the leading merchante, and sustained by the Comeil, and promulgated by the press, that Toronto is entitled to do nearly all the trading for the population ontside; to the north and west, at least. The new Exhibision Grombls were obtained from the Ottawa Goveriment on purpose to erect buildings likeron, which would make it, before mang years, the only place in the province fyr hoh-
ing the annual exhibitions. This would gradually achieve the result, by the yearly lesson of visiting Turonto, of bringing the bulk of bugers into the city. lint if it only brought the thonsands in onee a year, it would fill the tills of our merchants with vast sums that would otlerwise be spent amone the comary merchants. The admabages to Toronto cond scarcely be ealeuhated. Hotel-keepers, merelants, railways, cabmen, would make as much out of the fearly exhibition as would make up the average for six months of the year to a good paying figure. It was pointed ont that the mere circumstance of the Hanlon-Plaisted boat mace had brought into the city, probably, $\$ 150,000$. If this was done in one day, what would be the winnings in one week of exhibition; and if the exhibition were held every year in Toronto, instewd of every fourth year, how much then? and, finally, it could easily be arranged by that time to have the time for exhibitions cxtenderd to funr weeks every gear, and how much would the gross receipts amount to then? In short, We smaller cities and towns in this Western Province would have to move into Toronto, if they wanted to do :uny busimess att ant. Then Turonto would grow to its destimed greatnces: there would not be a vacant tenement on bur streets; reats would go up, and the Property Ownres Asswimtion would rejuice with exceeding joy. 11 would he only throwing a spata to entel in muckere?. How the ontside pooples doing business in amerons presently thrify centres of trade wonld like the scheme, is of no consequence. Bat the learing and scope of the platen entitle it to the admination, if not the grod wishes, of outsiders. The merchams in every small town know well the ndwatage they gather from one day of a circus. 1t is a fair opportunity, and one that is shared by every town on the ronte of the carasan. But Toronto alone knows how to fix this foating element and source of wealti, and make it all her own.
I may ouly remark that the Com Bxchange is not oprating the "call-board" at theirmeetings. There is a divided upiniou abont the propriety of establising the practice But the produce business is so dull at presenf, that the eflicacy of evena "call-board" would fail to infuse life into the Bxehange.

- The lmperial Bank has dechared a halt yenty dividend of 4 per cent.
- Tlie Bunk of Commerce has lechared a dividend of 4 per cent. for the current year.
- Difficulty is experienced in cireulating the new silver dollar in the United States. Of the six millions coined only about one million are entrent.
- Adim Gres; of Seaforth, having failed, his planing mill, and the stock of dressed and undressed lumber, together with his dwellinghonse, are to be sold by tender for the benefit of the estite.
- J. H. McLaughlin, grocer, of this city, ifter a brief experience of a year, is tiring to compromise his liabilities. He owes about $\$ 1,800$, of which $\$ 570$ are mivileged, being for rent, etc.; ussets about $\$ 1,100$.
- Mr. John Kelly, of the fim of John Hickler \& Co., contractors for No. 3 Section, Latcline Canal, has been missing since the toth
inst. As he lad a considerable sum of money on his person, and his business affars are all in good order, foul phay is feared.
-The Canada Shipping Company has earned over 10 per cent. on capital during the past year. Five per cent. has been carried tu depreciation accombt, live per cent, rlividend maid to shareholders, and the batance carried forward to the curent vear's accourt.
- Mr. James Gilmoner for a number of peats a prominent merchant of Montreal and widely known in Quebec and the Lower Provinces, died at his residence in Picton, on Tuesday, in his G0th year. His remains were brought to Montreal for interment.
- The annual meeting of the Dominion Type Founding Company was hedd on Tuestay. The sales for the past year were repored to be larger that ever befow, but the finameial exhibit was not very satisfactory in consequence of the mismanagemeat of the late manager.
- Awrit of attachment has been served on Daniel Shannon, commission merchant, of this city. Mr. Shanon was very lagely interesten in the heavy fathre of W. (i. Stewatt of St. Andrews, and has also been mufurtmate in making wher lusses. No delinate ligntes of linbilities yet ascertaned.
- Lonis Cusson, a Hume denler, of Actonvale, has absconded, a demand of assignament heing issued simultancously with his departure. His liabilities are small and in few hands. Cosson was fommery in store hasimess at St. Simon d'Yamaska, wheme de faited some five yeatrs ago.
- The exemsion-buat season is cuming ronnd, when they have to roll a dozen hogshends of iron on the right side of the bont to batance tha weight of lamanity around the " har" on the other.

Grant was originally a successful storekeper at Picton, and retnoved to Halifise a number of years ago where for a time he did a good business, but the litst three years he has made serious lossesand there has been a stealy retrogression, rasmhing as above. limmots forining to his probable failure were carrat earlier in the spring, so that his stopparge was not unexpected. No figares as to liabilities or assets have yet been made public.
- The groneral store-keeping fiom of F. Laroche \& Co., Rimunski, have assigned. This business of late has been regotuded as belonging virumbly to 21. (i. Manatain, whatesale grome of gucbee, wino fitidetat fer months aso, and the assigument is no dombt at maturat sequence to his fablure. The resubts of the business have unt been apparently satisfactory, as efforts were mate neatly a year ago to sell it out. Mr. Laroche has previously been unstrecessful as a member of the tirm of Wrapean $\mathbb{E}$ Laroche, who failed in 1875.

The dimetors feel that, from the reduction of the expenditure and other adrantageous elements which they will he able to bring to bear upon the aflitios of the society, they maty look forward to the results of that valuation with the same confilence that they have ever reposed in the fature of the assochation.

At that date a complete organic elange was detumined on in the mode of conducting the business of the associrtion, by which the eurrent expenditure was fixed at a given maximum amount, and the directors relinguished netive eflorts to obtain new business. This armagement came into operation on the ist of January 1876. Two yenrs have, therefore, elapsed since it was determined to make the imporinat change above referved to. From a perusal of the ordimary annual inccounts of the association, as rendered nuder the "Life dssurance Companies' Aet of 1870 ," the directors will be enabled to see how the business is being preserved, and that, notwithstanding the chaims and the sarrender values which lave been paid, the assets have somewht incrensed. The two yenes which have passed, I infer, therefore, to have been a time of transition, the effects of which are but yet in course of evolution; hence, although there can be no doubt that the change thus effected was ot a bighly bencficial character to the association, too short a time as yet elapsed for the results to be made manifest. I would, therefore, sirongly advise the Board not to bave a quinquennial valuation made to the end of last year, but to allow five years from the date of the last investigation to elapse before so doing. I would respectully submit that no injury can arise from this course, whilst there is every probability of benefit; for at the end of another two years we shall be better able to see Yunt the experience of the society is likely to
be, and to take action with that confidence experience alone can give. To the recommemhation which I now give, I am lappy to be able to udd the opinion of the four experienced actanries by whose advice you have benefited on at former occasion.

The Chairman: I camot but think that two yrars ate too soon to deal with this question with safely. If the valuation is made in accordance with this suggestion, the mext valuation wonld be in 1870 . In every way, i hink, it would be desimble to carry out this recommandation. At all events, we, as directors, finding it so strongly recommented by our own Actnary and four gentlemen of such eminence, feel it ti) be our daty to lay it before you. Purther, we strongly advise its adoption hy the meeting. $1 t$ you upp ore of this course, it will be necessary to make an alteration in the deed. I therefore nove that the next valuation be made at the enil of December, 1879.

Dr. Wichards, believing it to be for the interest of: The shathoholders genemally, seconded the motion, which was carried manhmonsly.

The Actury and Secretary, replying to a vote of thanks, said he was ghad this repori had been adopted. He did not hesitate to say that it was the broper conrse to pursue. After the change which had taken phade in the society, the best thing for every person connected with it was to give the society every possible chance of doing the best it could with the resources at command. He did not think it weessary to adduce any argemeat in favor of the recommendation. The recommendation was not in any way influenced by anything he may linow to the injury or prejudice of the ottice. On the contrary, sis far as he was enabled to jutge, the busmess was being well preservel and keph together. If they took the trouble to compare the rejrot now presented with the lastone, and if they allowed for what had gone ofl by claims and sitrenders, the huses were comparatively trifting. As far as one conld judge, the suciety was going on wedl, and all was heing lone for the advantare and uhimate benefit of the poliey and sharehotiers. The opision he hat ventured to give hhem hatd been confirmed withont the slightest reservation by four eminent actuaries of Lsondon, and the Board would not have been justified ju hesitating to ndopt it. De was quite sure the right thing had beentone, and he leth that the futme wond show the wisdom of the resolution passed todixy.
A motion hy Mr. Fnriling, seconded by Dr. Taylor, that the report and imanee-sheot le sent out a few days betore the meeting, wis fut. and lost.

## 'IHE SUGAR QUBSTION.

When the retiming business in C:amula was stopped by the policy of the present Government, we were tolil that the nev system would be the means of giving the peoppe cheap surar, nod even now the ndvocates of the phriy in power argued that to have refincries in operation in Camadi is only putting moner into the pockets of a tew pople at the expense of the consumer. Ihis is a phatisibe argment, and, no donbt, gets supporters frum a class of people who would believe the moon is made ot green cheese, if only a Grit orator proclaims it as truth. The new system has now had a hir irjal, and what is the result? In Redpath's time, when raw sugar sold at ot to 7 c , Redpaths prices wers, for yellows 7 d to Sc , and tor white sugar $8 \pm$ to $\% /$ cents. Raw sugars can be laid


St c, rnd American whites 94 to 107 cente. This is not nll, hedpath furnished pure suyte, whereas the Scote' mond American are both adulterated, the former ondy contaniag abont 6 ber cent. of sugar.
The guestion is not one that need interfere With the revenus, for it should make no diflerence to the 'lreasury whether the duty is collested on the raw article or on the refined; but in the former case we conld buy in the chenpest markets, at phaces of growth, employ our own vessels in bringing it here, and employ our own capiat mad preophe in the mannfacture of it. As it is now, we are compelled to buy in the Scoteh and American madkets, and bive to take inferior sugat, besides prying frum one to one and a hatf cents a poind more than ve did with our refineries in oferation, comparing the price of raw sugat now with what it was then. These are facts. which statisties and trade prices cument ean pore, and I defy the Twronto nad Kingston importers 10 gainsay them. The matier, therefore, is not a local one, as some think, one that only interests Montrent, but it is one that aflects the whole Dominion. Everyone that hses a pumad of imported sugar is paying 1 to $1 \frac{1}{2}$ cents more fur it that would be done if it wats brought hete in a ma state and refined by ourselves. Dhontreal certainly bas a very grent interest in the question, and it is to be hoped any cmadidate who ofters himself forelection at the wext contest to support fur mere party sake a system that has closed up our direct sugate trade, and deprived theneminds of people the means whereby they earned their breat, I say I trust any vae who will come forward io perpetarte this system, shonld be tatught a lesson that Montreal at least will not support so suicinal a policy any longer.
