

They refused and charged down the snow-covered slope on their skis into the derman trenches, where a terrible atruggle took place before the French soldiers were overcome.

CETTINJE, Montenegro, Feb. 15, via London, 12,15 p.m.—The members of the royal family of Montenegro were subjected "esterday in their re-sidence at Rieka to machine sun fire from two Austrian aeroplanes. Rieka is a village near Lake Scu-teri, where the royal family passed the winter. King Nicholas, the queen and the princesses watched the aerial raid-ers from their palace windows. Sev-eral of the builtes fired from the aero-planes fell near them.

WILL SEE YOU THRU SAID WOUNDED PILOT

Refused to Leave His Post Tho Wounded and Has Lost One of His Legs.

Special Cable to The Toronto World. CAIRO, Feb. 14. — A stirring little story of quiet heroism displayed dur-ing the battle against the Turkish in-here. The hero of the incident is Pilot Carew, who was on board the Hard-inge, one of the ships engaged on the canal helping repel the Ottoman at-tack. His ship came under the heavi-est fire and Carew was severely wounded in the arm and legs. He would not, however, leave his post, altho suffering terriby. "Bring me a chair and prop me up," he said to one of the crew. 'I will see you thru." The gallant pilot is now in hospital, where it was found necessary to ampu-tate one leg. Happily he is making good progress, and his recovery is as-sured.
