STANDING RULES AND REGULATIONS

—OF THE—
COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION

—OF THE—
United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry

AS REVISED AND ADOPTED BY THE COUNCIL, OCTOBER, 1886.

Meetings and Adjournments of the Council.

- Hrs of meeting and adjournment. 1. The Council shall meet at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, at the Court House, Cornwall, unless otherwise especially provided; and if at the time appointed there be no quorum, the Warden, or the Chairman appointed in his absence, may take the chair and adjourn with the consent of the majority then present.
- When members shall leave seats. 2. When the Council adjourns, the members shall keep their seats until the Warden or Chairman leaves the chair.
- When names to be taken down. 3. Whenever the Warden or Chairman is obliged to adjourn the Council for want of a quorum, the hour at which such adjournment is made, and the names of the members then present, shall be inserted in the minutes of the Council.
- Appearance of a quorum. 4. When a quorum is present, the Warden or Chairman shall take the chair and call the members to order. The Roll shall then be called.

Minutes.

- Minutes to be read. 5. Immediately after the Warden or Chairman shall have taken the chair the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk. Any error or omission in the Minutes shall then be corrected by the Council.
- When reports &c. to be printed in body of minutes. All the Reports, By-laws and Memorials adopted by the Council shall be printed in the Appendix to the Minutes.

Warden.

- The Election of Warden. 6. In the election of Warden, the names of the candidates shall be placed in the hands of the Clerk immediately after the members shall have taken their seats; and in case of more than one candidate being proposed, then the Clerk shall name two Scrutineers from the members present, and shall proceed to take the vote by ballot. He shall check the vote after being counted by the Scrutineers, and shall declare the number of votes cast for each candidate; he shall continue the ballot—dropping the name of the candidate having the least number of votes—until a majority of the members present has been obtained for one of the candidates, when he shall declare the candidate who has so obtained said majority duly elected. In case of a tie, the question shall be decided as provided by 46 Vic., Chap. 18, Sec. 225.
- Order, &c. 7. The Warden or Chairman shall preserve order, and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Council.
- Points of Order, &c. 8. When the Warden or Chairman is called upon to explain a point of order or practice, he is to state the rule applicable to the case without argument or comment; and when objection is taken to the ruling of the Warden or Chairman, members may discuss the point of order before the vote is taken.
- When Chairman is to be chosen. 9. In case the Warden shall not be in attendance, the Clerk shall call the meeting to order until a Chairman be chosen, who shall preside until the arrival of the Warden. If the Warden or Chairman desire to leave the chair for the purpose of taking part in the debate, or otherwise, he shall appoint one of the members of Council to fill his place until he resumes the chair.

Members Speaking.

10. Every member, previous to his speaking to a question, shall rise and address the chair.
11. If two or more members rise at once, the Warden or Chairman shall name the member who is first to speak. Two or more members rising.
12. Every member present, when a question is put in Council, shall vote thereon, unless the Council shall excuse him. When members may not vote.
13. When the Warden or Chairman is putting a question, no member shall walk out of, or across, the Council Chamber; nor when a member is speaking shall any other member hold discourse to interrupt him, except to order, nor pass between him and the Chair. Order when putting a question.
14. A member called to order shall sit down, unless permitted to explain, and the Council, if appealed to, shall decide on the case, but without debate; if there be no appeal, the decision of the Chair shall be submitted to. Members called to order.
15. No member shall speak beside the question in debate.
16. Any member may, of right, require the question or motion to be read for his information at any time of the debate, but not so as to interrupt a member speaking. Members may request motion to be read.
17. No member, other than the one proposing a question or motion (who shall be permitted to reply), shall speak more than once on the same question, without leave of the Council, except in explanation of a material part of his speech, which must be void of improper personalities. Limitation of rights of speaking.

Strangers.

18. No stranger shall be admitted within the bar of the Council without permission from the Warden or Chairman. without strangers.

Rules of the Council.

19. The Rules of the Council shall be observed in a Committee of the whole Council, excepting the rules limiting the number of times of speaking, and of taking yeas and nays, and the rule requiring that motions shall be written and seconded. Rules in Committee of the Whole.

Divisions of the Council.

20. Upon a division of the Council, the names of those who vote for, and of those who vote against the question, shall be entered upon the Minutes, if any member require it. When names to be recorded.

Motions and Questions.

21. A motion to adjourn the Council shall always be in order, except when a vote is being taken. Motion to adjourn.
22. In Committee, a motion that the Chairman leave the chair shall always be in order, and shall take the place of any other motion without debate. Motion to leave the chair in Committee.
23. No motion, except for adjournment, for going into Committee of the Whole on By-laws or Reports, or for receiving Reports and Petitions, shall be debated or put, unless the same be in writing, and seconded. What motions need not be in writing.
24. After a motion has been read by the Warden or Chairman, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn at any time before decision or amendment, with permission of the Council. Motions not to be withdrawn without leave.
25. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, unless to amend it, or commit it, or to postpone it to a certain day, or for the previous question, or to lay it on the table, or for adjournment. Motions on questions under debate.
26. The previous question, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendment and debate of the main question, and shall be in the following words: "Shall the main motion be now put?" The previous question.
27. A motion for commitment, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendment to the main question. Motion for commitment.
28. All questions, whether in Council or Committee, shall be put in the order they are moved, except in filling up blanks; the shortest time and the lowest sum shall be put first, and amendments shall take precedence of original motions. Order of questions.

No motion to have a preamble. 29. No motion having a preamble shall be admitted by this Council; but resolutions may have preambles.

Reception of motions when seconded. 30. Every motion when seconded must be received and read by the Warden or Chairman in Council, except in cases otherwise provided for in the Rules.

Motions contrary to rules. 31. It shall be the duty of the Warden or Chairman in Council, whenever he shall conceive that a motion which he has received and read, is contrary to the Rules of the Council, to apprise the Council thereof, immediately before the question on such motion is put, and to all the rules applicable to the case.

Motions requiring one day's notice. 32. No motion for a grant of money, the discharge of any special committee, or for the appointment or dismissal of any officer, or for the introduction of any charge against an officer of the County, shall be made until after one day's notice thereof has been given; except upon the recommendation of a Standing Committee.

By-Laws.

Mode of introducing. 33. Every By-law shall be introduced by a motion for leave, of which one day's notice shall be given, specifying the title of the bill, or by a motion to appoint a Committee to prepare and bring it in, or by order of the Council on the report of a Committee.

Two readings before commitment. 34. No By-law shall be committed or amended until it shall have been twice read.

Amendments reported by Committee. 35. All amendments made in Committee shall be reported to the Council by the Chairman standing in his place. After report, and the By-law has been read a third time, it shall be subject to a debate and amendment in Council before the question to pass, sign and seal shall be decided.

Readings.

Three readings on different days. 36. Every By-law shall receive three several readings, previous to its being passed, which readings may be on the same day, unless objected to by three or more members present.

Clerk to certify readings. 37. When a By-law is read in the Council, the Clerk shall certify the readings and the time on the back.

To be read in Committee of the whole. 38. By-laws committed to a Committee of the whole Council shall first be read throughout by either the Clerk or the Chairman, and then debated by clauses, leaving the preamble and the title to be last considered.

When passed by the Council, to be certified. 39. When a By-law passes the Council, the Clerk shall certify the same with the date thereof at the foot of the By-law, and shall be signed by the Warden and Clerk and have the Seal of the Corporation attached thereto.

Petitions.

How presented. 40. Petitions, Memorials, and other papers addressed to the Council shall be presented by a member in his place, who shall be answerable to the Council that they do not contain improper or impertinent matter. Every petition, remonstrance or written application intended to be presented to the Council may be delivered to any member thereof, and the member to whom it shall be given shall examine the same, and endorse thereon the name of the applicant, and the substance of such application, and sign his own name thereto, which endorsement only shall be read by the Clerk, unless a member shall require the reading of the paper, in which case the whole shall be read.

To be examined and endorsed. 41. No Petition or account shall be received by this Council after the second day of each meeting, unless it shall arise out of any matter before the Council.

Endorsement to be read, or the petition if required.

Papers Laid Before the Council—Form of Reading.

Papers addressed to the Council to be read by the Clerk. 42. Papers laid before the Council or referred to a Committee for their consideration, are of right to be read once by the Clerk or Chairman at the table; but when once read to the Council or Committee, they are then like every other paper that belongs to the Council, to be moved for to be read, and if objected to, to be decided by taking the sense of the Council or Committee.

Committees.

43. In forming a Committee of the whole Council, the Warden or Chairman shall leave the chair, and shall, before leaving the same, appoint a Chairman to preside, who shall have the same authority in the chair of the Committee as the Warden in the chair of the Council, and in other Committees the Chairman shall have the same authority.

Committee of the whole.

44. On motion in Committee to rise and report, the question shall be decided without debate.

Motion to rise and report.

45. When in Committee of the Whole a motion to rise has been put and carried before any definite action has been taken in respect to the matter under consideration, the subject referred to the Committee shall be considered to be disposed of in the negative.

46. When a member introduces a By-law, Petition or motion upon any subject, and the same is referred to a Special Committee, the member introducing the By-law, Petition or motion shall be one of the Committee without being named by the Council.

Members referring motion, &c., to Special Committee to be one.

47. A majority of any Committee may proceed to business.

Majority of Committee to form a quorum.

Standing Committees.

48. In the first session of the Council in each and every year, Standing Committees, to consist of not less than seven members each, besides the Warden, shall be appointed to the following purposes, viz. :—

1. Education.
2. Finance and Assessment.
3. County Property.
4. Roads and Bridges.
5. Equalization of Assessment.
6. Printing.
7. Communications.

All documents relating to those subjects shall be severally referred, unless referred to a Special Committee.

49. The several Committees on Education, County Property and Roads and Bridges shall meet the second day of each session of Council at 9 o'clock a.m., and those on Finance and Assessment, and Printing and Communications, at 2 o'clock p.m.

50. The Committee on Equalization shall consist of the Reeves of the several Municipalities, and in their absence of the Deputy Reeves.

51. The Warden shall, for the purpose of consultation, but not to vote, be *ex officio* a member of every Committee.

Warden *ex officio* of Standing Committees.

Orders of the Day.

52. The Orders of the Day shall have preference over any motion before the Council.

Orders of the day to have preference to motions.

53. When any order or orders of the day shall be left undisposed of at the time of an adjournment, either for want of a quorum or otherwise, such order or orders shall be taken up in succession as the first business after a daily routine at the next meeting of the Council.

To be taken up in succession.

Routine Business of the Council.

The daily Routine Business of the Council shall be as follows :—

1. Calling the Roll.
2. Reading Minutes of Preceding Day.
3. Receiving Communications.
4. Reading Communications.
5. Presenting Petitions.
6. Reading Petitions.
7. Presenting Reports by Committees.
8. Giving Notices.
9. Orders of the Day.

Upon motion of Mr. Warner, seconded by Mr. Connelly the Warden left the chair till seven p. m.

EVENING SESSION.

Council resumed.

The Warden in the chair.

Mr. Graham, Chairman of the Printing Committee, presented their report.

Upon motion of Mr. Fraser, seconded by Mr. Bennett, the report was referred to a Committee of the Whole.

Mr. McNaughton in the chair

The Committee rose and recommended the adoption of the report with amendments.

Upon motion of Mr. Redmond, seconded by Mr. Whittaker the report was adopted in Council.

Moved by Mr. Patton, seconded by Mr. Whittaker, that Mr. Kerr be a member of the Nation River Drainage Committee in place of I. R. Ault, deceased, and Mr. Kennedy in place of Dr. Steacy who has ceased to be a member of this Council, and that a By-Law be passed to that effect.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Harkness, seconded by Mr. Redmond, that Mr. Kennedy, Reeve of Mountain and Mr. J. M. Campbell, Reeve of Finch, be appointed members of the Nation River Drainage Committee, in lieu of Dr. Steacy and I. R. Ault who have ceased to be members of this Council.

Amendment lost.

Main Motion carried on same division.

Moved by Mr. Whittaker, seconded by Mr. Patton, that Mr. McGannon, representative of the License Victuallers Association, be heard before this Council.

Carried.

Mr. McGannon addressed the Council.

Moved by Mr. Harkness, seconded by Mr. Everetts, that Mr. J. E. Tuttle, an old member of this Council who is now in the Council Chamber, be invited by the Warden to take a seat within the Bar of the House.

Carried.

Moved by Mr. Redmond, seconded by Mr. Mulhern, that Messrs. J. M. Campbell, Bennett, D. A. McArthur, Coulthart, Harkness, Eider, A. A. Stewart, McLennan, the mover and seconder, be appointed a Special Committee to consider and

report in what manner it would be best to dispose of the fund arising from the Scott Act fines now held by this Council, and also to report any other matters connected therewith which appear necessary.

Mr. D. A. McArthur gives notice that he will to-morrow ask leave to introduce a By-Law re-appointing the Committee in *re* River Beaudette Drainage Improvements, filling vacancies of members ceasing to be members of this Council.

In conformity with our report of 18th October last, a new floor has been put in the criminals' room in the North-west corner of the Gaol.

Your Committee would also draw the attention of the Council to the duties of the Caretaker, as defined in the report of Counties' Property Committee of January 27th, 1887, and to recommend that it be distinctly understood that he shall have charge of both furnaces and that he will be under the supervision of the Treasurer at all times.

 Your committee have received communica-

 and having in view in the light of recent ex-
 perience, the necessity of having a competent
 and thoroughly reliable officer such as the
 present Treasurer has proved, we would re-

Leaving a deficit on the year's business of \$6392 62. This is aside from the County Building Debenture Account, the High School Account or the Levies for Public Schools. While about one-half of this deficit resulted from unusual expenditure, such as that connected with the defalcations of the late Treasurer, Hill and Middaugh suit, it is evident that the increase in the expenses on account of education which are paid out of the general county funds, as well as that connected with the administration of county affairs, will make it necessary if we are to avoid deficits in the future to increase the assessments on the municipalities.

The Registry Office account which should be provided for by assessment on the several counties has been allowed to run into the general account, and no assessment has been levied to provide for this expenditure for several years. An adjustment of this account will reduce the apparent deficit.

As the last item in the assets is not at present available, and as it is necessary to provide for carrying on the business until after the June Session, your committee would recommend that the Treasurer and Warden be authorized to renew the notes in the Bank of Montreal. We would also recommend that they be authorized to renew the notes in the Union Bank at Alexandria on account of the River Beaudette drainage, and those in the Molsons Bank, Morrisburg, on account of the Nation River drainage, and that in the latter case they be authorized to add enough to cover interest overdrawn account and to pay small accruing accounts not on the whole to exceed \$1200.00 over the present notes of \$11,000.00, it being understood that a by-law will be in readiness at the June Session to provide for the issue of Debentures on the credit of the lands effected to close this account.

Your committee would also recommend that the Treasurer's bond be renewed, and that the new bond be for himself \$12,000, and two or more approved sureties in an equal amount, and as the Treasurer has expressed his intention of getting a bond from a guarantee company, that one month be allowed for the renewal, the old bond in the meantime being left with the Warden who is also empowered to approve the new sureties.

BY-LAWS.

BY-LAW No. 837.

A By-Law to Provide for the Deepening of a
Part of the River Beaudette, in the Town-
ships of Charlottenburgh and Lancaster,
and for Borrowing on the Credit of the
Municipality the sum of \$7,700.00 for Com-
pleting the same.

Provisionally adopted the 18th day of Octo-
ber, 1888.

Whereas the River Beaudette runs through
the Townships of Charlottenburgh and Lan-
caster, in the County of Glengarry, one of the
United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and
Glengarry, and the Municipal Council of the
Township of Charlottenburgh has made an
application to the Municipal Council of the
United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and
Glengarry, to deepen the said River through
the said Townships of Charlottenburgh and
Lancaster, and remove obstructions therefrom
for the purpose of draining the lands in the
vicinity of the said River and in the vicinity
of the lands between Lot number twenty-
seven in the eighth Concession of the said
Township of Charlottenburgh, to Lot number
one in the said eighth Concession of said
Township of Charlottenburgh, both inclusive,
and also Lot number nineteen in the seventh
Concession of the said Township of Lancaster
to Lot number thirty-eight in the said seventh
Concession of said Township of Lancaster.

And whereas, thereupon the said Council
procured an examination to be made by
David R. Brown, a Provincial Land Surveyor,
being a person competent for such purpose, of
the said River proposed to be deepened, and
has also procured plans and estimates of the
work to be made by the said David R. Brown
and an assessment to be made by him of the
real property to be benefitted by such deepening;
stating as nearly as he can the proportion
of benefit which in his opinion will be derived
in consequence of such drainage and deepening
by every road and lot or portion of lot,
the said assessment so made and the report of
the said David R. Brown in respect thereof,
and of the said deepening, being as follows:

To D. A. McArthur, Esq., Chairman of the
River Beaudette Drainage Committee.

SIR,—In accordance with your instructions
I have made a survey, plan, profile, estimate
and assessment for the improvement of the
channel of part of River Beaudette, in order
to drain the low lands in the vicinity of said
River.

I find that the work should commence at
stake No. 0, planted on the North bank of said
River at the centre line of Lot 27 in the 8th
Concession, Township of Charlottenburgh,
near the centre of said 8th Concession and
east of Monroe's mills, at a depth of 6 feet be-
low a hub at the foot of said stake No. 0, or 4.35
feet below a B. M. on an ash tree about 60 feet
westerly of said stake 0 near the north bank
of the River. Thence following the River
easterly to stake No. 24, with a fall of .04 feet
per 100. Thence easterly following the old
channel to stake 813, with a fall of .01 feet per
100. Thence to stake 918, with a fall of .02 feet
per 100. Thence to stake 1048 x 30, with a fall

of .05 feet per 100; said stake, 1048 x 30, is 194
feet below McLennan's mill dam, on Lot No.
19, 7th Concession, Lancaster, a distance of
nearly 20 miles.

The channel should be 8 feet wide in the
bottom, with a slope on each side of 1½ feet
horizontally, to 7 feet in depth.

If the above is properly carried out I believe
it will redeem the drowned lands along the
River and provide a proper outlet for the
drainage of the swamp lands in the vicinity
of the said River.

Where the banks of the River are high the
earth and stones may be deposited in the bogs
so as not to obstruct the channel, as may be
directed by the person in charge of the work.

In the low lands the earth should be re-
moved to at least six feet from the banks of
the River and spread. The stones to be placed
in the bogs out of the way of the channel, if
the owners of the property do not choose to
remove them.

All of said work to be done to the satisfac-
tion of the Engineer in charge.

issue debentures of the Corporation to that
amount in sums of not less than one hundred
dollars each and payable within ten years
from the date thereof, with interest at the
rate of five per centum per annum, to be paid
in ten annual consecutive instalments, to be
of such amounts that the aggregate amount
payable for principal and interest in any year
shall be equal (as nearly as may be) to what
is payable for principal and interest during
each of the other years of such period of ten
years, and make such debentures payable at
the branch of the Bank of Montreal in the
Town of Cornwall.

3rd. That for the purpose of paying the sum
of \$6,973.73, being the amount charged against
the said lands so benefitted as aforesaid other
than the roads belonging to the several Muni-
cipalities, and to cover interest thereon for
ten years at the rate of five per centum per
annum, the following special rate over and
above all other rates shall be assessed and

levied in the same manner and at the same time as taxes are levied upon the undermentioned lots and parts of lots, and the amount of the said special rates and interest assessed as aforesaid against each lot or part of lot

respectively shall be divided into ten equal parts, and one such part shall be assessed and levied as aforesaid in each year for ten years after the final passing of this By-Law, during which the said debentures have to run.

Report of the Nation River Drainage Committee.

To the Warden and Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

GENTLEMEN:

Soon after the meeting of your Council, held in June, 1888, a meeting of the Committee was called at Cass's Bridge, for the purpose of considering whether in view of the grant from the Dominion Government of four thousand dollars and the facility for doing work while the dredge was in the river, anything should be done to improve the channel already excavated. This meeting was held on the 2nd of July, the members being all present.

Though the money was granted to complete the work, it was believed the Government would allow it to be used for improving the work already done, by enlarging the channel up the river, even though the dam would remain in the river, and this it was believed would give a measure of relief.

After considerable discussion it was moved by Dr. Stacey and seconded by Mr. Fulton, that inasmuch as the grant from the Dominion was made for completing the work as at first contemplated, this Committee does not feel warranted in making improvements not contemplated in the plan and agreement, unless such as come within the province of the Engineer to meet local circumstances, but would recommend that as far as possible, subject to these conditions, the work at Cass's Bridge be improved.

In accordance with this, the Engineer recommended that in consequence of the river at that point being spanned by a bridge, the cut be made the full depth of the centre cut and as wide as it could be safely made between abutments.

As this work was not of sufficient magnitude to warrant fitting up the dredge, an effort was made to complete this as well as the block that remains in the South Branch with teams and scrapers. Work was commenced in the Branch and continued for about a week, but the many rains in August made it impossible to prosecute it further and nothing has been done since.

It will be remembered that \$3000 was granted to this work on request of this Council some three years ago. At last report \$2000 of this had been paid, the balance to be paid when the work would be completed. We are pleased to be able to report that on a report from the chairman, made during the winter, this money has been paid. We regret, however, to have to add that the \$4000 granted for completing the work has not been re-voted, and that it will consequently lapse at the close of this month.

Without going into exact figures now, it may suffice to say that it will require about \$1000 to complete the excavations. There are now \$11,000 not provided for by debentures. Interest and expenses, until the work is completed, may add several hundred dollars to this. We must therefore ask the Council to amend the By-Law so as to provide sufficient to meet all liabilities and complete the work under contract.

We would recommend that if practicable these Debentures be issued, and the money provided for their payment by continuing the present assessment a sufficient number of years to meet it, and not by increasing the present rate.

SALARIES.

Your Committee have had under consideration a letter from A. J. McDonald, one of the Auditors, asking for an increase of salary commensurate with the increase of labor. Would not recommend any departure from the course adopted at the January session.

ACCOUNTS.

We have passed accounts amounting to \$497.84 as per statement marked A, to be appended to By-Law, and would recommend the passing of a By-Law for their payment.

LIABILITIES.

The liabilities of the Counties, aside from local improvement obligation and Debentures for the public buildings, are—

This, however, did not accrue from excess of ordinary expenditure over revenue. When the public buildings were commenced Debentures were issued for \$12,000. The actual cost, however, of the buildings and improvements On the Gaol and Court House was..\$20,733 93

As this should all have been charged to capital account and as there have been in recent years some other expenditures that may be regarded as exceptional, your Committee would recommend the issue of Debentures at 4 per cent. covering a period of twenty years, for \$12,000, to provide for that portion of our liabilities due to the causes above set forth.

RENEWAL OF NOTES.

At the time of the January session we had notes in the Bank of Montreal here on Counties account of \$15,000 and in Moisons' Bank, Morrisburgh, on Nation River drainage account of \$11,000, and in the Union Bank, Alexandria, an account of River Beaudette drainage of \$2,000, all bearing interest at six per cent. During the interval since that session the Treasurer, with the Chairman of the Finance Committee and the Chairmen of the respective Drainage Committees, succeeded in making an arrangement with the Bank of Montreal here to take the whole account at five per cent. Your Committee would recommend that By-Laws be passed confirming the arrangement and authorizing the renewal of the notes until the Debentures which it is proposed to issue can be realized on. It being understood that the Nation River drainage account will be closed within the year.

BORROWING MONEY.

As the balance in the hands of the Treasurer is reduced to \$630 and as something more will be required to meet current expenditure before we can realize from any assets, we would

recommend that the Treasurer and Warden be authorized to borrow from the Bank of Montreal here, not to exceed \$2,500, for that purpose.

We would also recommend that they be authorized to borrow at the same place \$1,500 to meet current expenditure on the River Beaudette drainage until the Debentures to be issued under the By-Law passed can be realized on.

Last year there was levied on the Village of Lancaster \$109.29. Of this \$76.50 should have come from the Township of Charlottenburg and \$32.79 from the Township of Lancaster, in the proportion of 7 for the former and 3 for the latter. It now appears that the whole of this amount was paid in here by the Township of Lancaster. Would recommend that Charlottenburg pay this \$76.50 to Lancaster. Otherwise it will have to be collected by the Counties' Treasurer and paid by him to the last named Township.

REGISTRY OFFICES.

No adjustment of the Registry Office account has been made since 1878. A statement which is herewith submitted shows that from that time to the close of 1888 the following amounts have been drawn from the general county funds by the several offices, viz.:

Your Committee would therefore recommend that a By-Law be passed accordingly.

ESTIMATES.

During a period of about ten years a uniform levy of \$12,000 has been made for County purposes, while our revenue from County refund and other sources approaches \$3,000 a year. This has heretofore been found sufficient to meet ordinary expenditure, but recent increases, principally on account of education and administration of criminal justice, items over which the Council has very little control, have increased our outlay to a little over \$16,000, as shown by accompanying estimates, based on the expenditures of the last two years. As this results largely from the heavy dockets at recent courts, which may not form a precedent for the future, it is not deemed advisable to increase the levy this year further than the increase in the valuation. We therefore recommend that 75-100 of a mill on the dollar be levied for county purposes on the equalized assessment of \$16,180, -146. This will give us \$12,135 10, which, with the licenses and refund, which is likely to be large this year, will give us a revenue for County purposes of nearly \$16,000. The Committee desire further to say that in speaking of the C. T. Act fund as a liability, it

is not that they regard this money other than as belonging to the Counties when all the claims under the Canada Temperance Act itself are satisfied; but for convenience of keeping the account and to avoid confusion when the Committee having the matter in charge finally reports.

By-Law to Appoint Milo Knowland to take the Census of the Unincorporated Village of Chesterville.

Whereas Jeremiah Hanes and one hundred and seventeen other freeholders and householders of the Village of Chesterville and its vicinity, petition the Council to incorporate the Village of Chesterville; and whereas it is necessary to take a Census of the inhabitants under the direction of this Council, to ascertain whether the Village has the requisite number of inhabitants to entitle them to incorporation as a separate municipality.

Be it enacted a By-Law of the Corporation of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, that Milo Knowland of Chesterville, be appointed, and he is hereby appointed to take the Census of the said Village of Chesterville, and to report to the Council.

BY-LAW No. 877.

By-Law to Incorporate the Village of Chesterville in the County of Dundas.

Whereas upwards of one hundred freeholders and householders residing upon Lots Nos. Seventeen and Eighteen, in the Fourth Concession, and portions of Lots Nos. Seventeen and Eighteen, in the Third Concession of the Township of Winchester, in the County of Dundas, hereinafter described and referred to; have by their petition prayed that those Lots and Portions of said Lots be set apart from the said Township of Winchester, in the County of Dundas, and erected into an Incorporated Village, by the name of the Village of Chesterville, and that the inhabitants thereof be constituted a Corporate Body Politic, apart from the said Township, under the name of the Corporation of the Village of Chesterville.

And whereas it appears by the returns made by Milo Knowland, the Census Enumerator appointed to take the Census of the inhabitants residing within or upon the Lots and portions of Lots aforesaid, that the number of inhabitants contained within the said Lots and portions of said Lots, exceed seven hundred and fifty.

And whereas it appears that the residences of such inhabitants are sufficiently near to form an Incorporated Village, and it is desirable to grant the prayer of the said petition, and incorporate the said Lots and portions of said Lots therein and hereinafter particularly described as the Municipality of the Village of Chesterville.

Be it therefore enacted a By-Law of this Municipal Corporation of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry,

1. That from and after the 19th day of June, A.D., 1889, Lots numbers Seventeen and Eighteen, in the Fourth Concession, and portions of Lots numbers Seventeen and Eighteen in the Third Concession of the Township of Winchester, in the County of Dundas, within the limits and boundaries hereinafter particularly described, shall be set apart from the said Township of Winchester, and erected into and constituted an Incorporated Village by the name of the "Village of Chesterville," and that the inhabitants thereof shall be con-

stituted a Corporate Body Politic, apart from the said Township of Winchester, under the name of "The Corporation of the Village of Chesterville," and shall have all such powers and privileges and liabilities as are now or may hereafter be conferred or imposed upon Incorporated Villages.

2. That the Municipal Corporation of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, do assign as boundaries of the said Incorporated Village of Chesterville, the boundaries and limits hereinafter set forth, that is to say:

Lots numbers Seventeen and Eighteen, in the Fourth Concession of the said Township of Winchester, and portions of Lots Seventeen and Eighteen, in the Third Concession of the aforesaid Township, described as follows:—

Commencing at the north-east corner post of said Lot number Seventeen, in the Third Concession, thence west along the northern boundary thereof, a distance of ninety rods; thence south parallel to the eastern boundary of said Lot number Seventeen, a distance of eighty-eight rods and fourteen feet; thence east parallel with the northern boundary of said Lots Third Concession, and Eighteen, in the said Township, a distance of one hundred and eighty rods; thence north, parallel with the western boundary of said Lot number Eighteen, in the Third Concession, a distance of eighty-eight rods and fourteen feet, to the northern boundary thereof; thence west along the said northern boundary, a distance of ninety rods, to the place of beginning.

Report of the River Beaudette Drainage Committee.

Present—D. Cameron, J. M. McCallum, John D. McVichie, Geo. Elder and D. A. McArthur. Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:

The contractors engaged in the work of the Drainage of River Beaudette were unable owing to the unfavourable condition of the weather to commence work until late in the month of August, and owing to the same cause were compelled to stop work early this month. The contractors commenced excavating on lot No. 19, seventh concession of the Township of Lancaster, 194 feet below the site of the Mill Dam, and completed the works as far as, and nearly through, the first rapid, and cleared the channel of drift wood as far up as the second rapid. Much more rock had to be removed than shown on the profile and estimates. The amount expended in carrying on the works so far, is \$4,337.07. To this must be added some small accounts, which have not yet been presented to Your Committee. A detailed statement of all sums paid in carrying on the works up to this date is appended.

Mr. McCallum, chief engineer of the Public Works Department, for this Province, accompanied by James Rayside, Esq., M.P.P., and the chairman of the Drainage Committee, inspected the works on the 3rd inst. Mr. McCallum expressed his satisfaction with the character of the work done, and his conviction, that when completed would have the desired result. The assessment on the lands and roads as per By-Law is \$7,700.00. Of this as already stated, the sum of \$4,330.07 has already been expended leaving a balance of assess-

ment \$3,369.97, to which will be added refund or grant from the Ontario Government on account of dam of \$1,500, thus leaving the amount now available for the prosecution of the work the sum of \$4,869.97.

Owing to its being impossible for the contractors to finish the works in the time specified in their contract with this Corporation for the completion of the works by 1st November, next,

Your Committee recommend that this Council pass a resolution extending the time for the completion of the drainage works, to the 1st of November, 1890.

Report of a Special Committee Appointed by Resolution of this Council, to Obtain Legal Advice as to whether this Council could Legally proceed to Expropriate the Mill Dam at the Village of Chesterville, in the County of Dundas, under the old By-Law, viz., By-Law 733, and the old Assessment.

Present—E O'Callaghan, A.A. Stewart, John Bennett and D. A. McArthur.

Your Committee beg leave to report that they have consulted D. B. McLennan, Esq., Q.C., of this town, and have received his written opinion on the questions submitted to him, which opinion is hereto appended.

Your Committee recommend that this Council act upon the said opinion and appoint the necessary committee or committees, and introduce and pass the necessary by-laws, to complete the said drainage works, upon the proper application and the legal initiatory steps being taken by the interested parties; all matters and things done in respect thereof to be so done and passed so as to keep this Corporation harmless from any damages whatever.

DEAR SIR,—I have been asked to give my opinion as to whether the County Council can now pass a by-law for the removal of the Chesterville dam, treating it as part of the work to be done under by-law number 733, passed on the 19th day of June, 1884, so as to avoid the making of a new assessment, and whether if it was not in terms covered by that by-law, the County Council can now pass a by-law founded on the petition of the Township of Matilda, which is recited in by-law number 733. The decision of this point involves the larger question as to whether the Council could as part of the drainage scheme expropriate and remove the dam without the consent of the proprietor. I understand that the County Council does not take the position that any such power exists, and that in the face of the conflicting opinions on this point it is thought better to act on the assumption that no such power is vested in the Council. If this be taken for granted, as it must be from the fact that the Council now proposes to act upon a consent to be obtained from the proprietor of the dam, I take it that my opinion must be given on the assumption that the Council has by law no power to expropriate and remove the dam without the consent of the proprietor. This being so, it is quite clear that at no time prior to the obtaining of the consent in question had the Council any jurisdiction to deal with the removal of the dam as part of the drainage scheme. The result would be that anything heretofore done looking to the removal of the dam is entirely void, and that the proper proceeding now to take is to proceed *de novo*, treating the removal of the dam as a new and independent project.

Report of Finance Committee.

Present—Dickey, Coulthart, Sweet, Kerr, J. M. Campbell, A. G. McArthur, O'Callaghan, McCaullum, Cameron, McNaughton, Fraser, D. A. McArthur.

Your Committee passed accounts as per schedule marked "A," herewith submitted, amounting to \$1,587.65, to cover which a By-Law will be submitted for adoption by the Council.

An account for stationery from the office of the Registrar of the Surrogate Court was refused payment, because your Committee were of opinion that in civil procedure where payment is made by fees, the blanks should be provided by the parties receiving the fees.

A petition was presented by one Victor Duchesneau, of the Township of Finch, asking for payment on account of injuries received while acting under the directions of a Justice of the Peace. Your Committee refused on a division to entertain the petition.

The Treasurer reports that the sureties of the past Treasurers, Dr. McDonald and Eneas McDonald, have paid in \$5,000 of the amount due and to fall due on account of settlement, which has been used to retire notes and pay current expenses.

He also reports his bank account overdrawn to the extent of \$96.82, and intimates that it will require about \$2,500 to pay accounts passed, and to meet the further expenditure likely to accrue before the County assessment becomes available. Your Committee would therefore recommend that a By-Law be passed giving authority to the Warden and Treasurer to borrow that amount at the Bank of Montreal, here, should it be found necessary.

Your Committee find that the accounts of the judges for examining lunatics, amounting in all to \$100, have been presented to and passed by the County Board of Audit and paid by the Treasurer, without having been first presented to the Council. This appears to be irregular, as the payment of these allowances rests entirely with the Council. We would recommend that the accounts so far passed in this way, be allowed; but that in future, no payments be made for this service, unless approved by the Council.

We would also recommend that Debentures be issued at the earliest possible date, to cover the floating indebtedness of the Counties, which is about \$20,000.

Report of the Drainage Committee.

Your Committee beg leave to report, that owing to the want of the season the contractors did not fully complete the unfinished portions of the work under contract. Nothing was done at Cass's bridge. In the South Branch the work is believed to be nearly completed, though not yet examined, and no estimates have been given for work done this year.

In the month of June last Messrs. Munro & Barrie made a proposal to agree to the removal of the dam at Chesterville, provided the value as determined by arbitration were paid to them. Several meetings were held, but no agreement reached.

Your Committee beg further to report that the amount now due by these Counties on account of this work, not provided for by debentures, is \$12,327.20, and that to finish the present work under contract and to pay expenses and provide for interest until debentures

tures are realized on, a further sum of \$1500.00, or more may be required. We would therefore recommend that a by-law providing for the payment of this by the issue of debentures be passed, and that should any of the outstanding notes on this account fall due before the debentures are realized on, the Warden and Treasurer be given authority to renew, and that they be also authorized to borrow a sum not exceeding \$600.00 to satisfy claims that may require adjustment before the debentures are disposed of.

We would also recommend that the present assessment of \$2001.21 on the scheduled lands be continued eight years longer—in all from the passing of the original by-law, eighteen years—in order to provide means for the payment of the debentures to be issued for the payment of the amounts expended under the present contract.

We would also recommend the Council to devise means to construct the works so as to procure the removal of the dam at Chester-ville.

BY-LAWS.

BY-LAW NO. 895.

By-Law to Grant Permission to the Corporation of the Village of Lancaster to assume all the Streets in the Village of Lancaster which are of a Less Width than Sixty-six Feet.

Whereas the Corporation of the Village of Lancaster has petitioned for permission to assume certain streets in the Village of Lancaster of a less width than sixty-six feet, and it is expedient to grant permission.

Be it therefore enacted a By-Law of the Corporation of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, that the Corporation of the Village of Lancaster have permission to assume the following streets: Wood Street, Broad Street, Queen Street, Thomas Street, John Street, Colin Street, Duncan Street, Head Street, Molan Street, High Street, North Beach Street, Spruce Street, Pine Street, Monk Street, Front Street, Catharine Street, Victoria Street, Beach Street, Elm Street, Military Road and Oak Street, as shewn on a map prepared by D. R. Brown, P. L. S., and dated 16th October, A.D., 1889.

BY-LAW NO. 896.

Whereas the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Finch has petitioned the Municipal Corporation of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry for permission to assume and open up certain roads in the said Municipality of the Township of Finch of a lesser width than sixty-six feet.

And whereas it seems expedient that such consent should be granted.

Be it therefore enacted a By-Law of the Municipal Corporation of the said United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, that permission be given, and permission is hereby given to the said Municipal Corporation of the said Township of Finch to assume and open up roads of less than sixty-six feet over the land and of the width hereinafter mentioned, viz: In the said Township of Finch, over a piece of land fifty feet wide from the break of the bank of the Nation River across the East quarter of lot number three, in the fifth concession of the Township of Finch, more fully described as follows: Commencing at a post planted fifty feet from the break of the bank of said Nation River, on the line between East half of the East half of said lot number three, then to run Eastwardly at a width of fifty feet parallel with the said break to the concession road between the fifth and sixth concessions. Also over a piece of land fifty feet wide from the break of bank forming the flat on the Nation River (except ten rods opposite Mr. Lyzell's residence, which is to be forty feet) across the East half of the West half and West half of the East half of lot number three, in the fifth concession, more fully described as follows: Commencing at a post planted fifty feet from the break of the bank forming flat of river, on the line between the West half and East half of West half of said lot number three, in the fifth concession; then to run Easterly at a width of fifty feet (with the above named exception) parallel with the said break, to a post planted on the line between the West half and East half of East half of said lot. Also a road from the North end of the bridge on the Nation River at lot number three, in the fifth concession, fifty feet wide from said bridge to the concession road between the fifth and sixth concessions of the said township. Also over a piece of land fifty feet wide from the break of the bank of the Nation River across the West half of the West half of lot number three, in the fifth concession of the Township of Finch, more fully described as follows: Commencing at a post planted fifty feet from the break of the bank of the said river on the line between lots number two and three; then to run Easterly at a width of fifty feet parallel with the said bank to a post planted on the line between the West half of East half of West half of said lot number three. Also over a piece of land fifty feet in width for a public road lying on the South side of a line, hereinafter described, extending across the East half of West half of lot number two, in the fifth concession of said township: Commencing at a post planted on centre line of said lot number two, in the fifth concession, on the South bank of the Nation River; said post is marked Number 6 on the East and R on the South side; thence South sixty-seven degrees and twenty-two minutes, West three chains and thirty-two links to post number seven, marked R on South side; thence South seventy-eight degrees and fifty-seven minutes, West two chains and sixty-nine links to post number eight, marked R on South side; thence South eighty-two degrees

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and thirty minutes, West one chain and forty-five links to post number nine, marked R on South side, planted at the centre line of West half of said lot number two; said post number nine is planted at the foot of the high bank of the flat on the South side of the Nation River. Also over a piece of land fifty feet in width for a public road lying on the South side of a line, hereinafter described, extending across the West quarter of lot number two, in the fifth concession of said township, to within twenty feet of the West side line of said lot; Commencing where a post is planted at the centre line of West half of said lot number two, at the foot of the high bank of the flat on the south side of the Nation River; said post is marked number nine on the East and R on the South side; thence East eighty-two degrees and thirty minutes, West three chains and ninety-nine links to post number ten, marked R on South side; thence South sixty degrees and eight minutes, West three chains and forty-four and one-half links to post number eleven, marked R on South side, planted on South bank of Nation River, and twenty feet East of West side line of said lot number two. Also a strip of land twenty feet in width along the East side of West side line of said lot number two, extending from the front to the rear of said fifth concession. Also over a piece of land twenty feet in width along the West side of the East side line of lot number one, in the fifth concession of said Township of Finch, extending from the front to the rear of said concession. Also over a piece of land fifty feet in width for a public road lying on the South side of a line, hereinafter described, extending across the East half of lot number two, in the fifth concession of said township; Commencing where a post is planted on the line between lots numbers two and three, in the said fifth concession, on the South bank of the Nation River; said post is marked number one on the West and R on the South side; thence South forty-four degrees and five minutes, West three chains and sixty-five links to post number two, marked R on the South side; thence South thirty-two degrees and forty-two minutes, West two chains and fifty-three links to post number three, marked R on the South side; thence South forty-three degrees and ten minutes, West three chains and forty links to post number four, marked R on South side; thence South fifty-four degrees and forty-nine minutes, West two chains and forty-eight links to post number five, marked R on South side; thence South sixty-three degrees and thirty-seven minutes, West three chains and ninety-five links to post number six, marked R on South side, planted on the centre line of said lot number two, on the South bank of the Nation River.

BY-LAW NO. 897.

By-Law No. 897, to Amend By-Law No. 733.

Whereas By-Law Number 733, passed in pursuance of a petition from the Municipal Council of the Township of Matilda, on the Nineteenth day of June, A.D., 1884, to provide for deepening the Nation River, and for draining parts of the Township of Matilda, Mountain, Winchester and Williamsburg, and for borrowing on the credit of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry,

the sum of \$14,714.47 for completing the same; and which has been acted upon by the construction of such works in part, does not provide sufficient means for the completion of the work.

And whereas it is necessary to amend the said By-Law by making a further levy on the lands and roads benefitted, in order to fully carry out the intention thereof, and of the petition on which it was founded.

And whereas it is estimated that the further sum of \$14,228.52, will be required to fully complete the work.

And whereas the assessment made on the lands and roads in said By-Law No. 733, provided for the payment of interest at six per cent, and amounted to \$2,001.21 each year, for ten years, and the loan was procured from the Ontario Government at five per cent., which was subsequently reduced to four per cent., thus releasing the whole of the assessment for the tenth year, and \$1,124.98 of the assessment for the ninth year; and it is found that by continuing the assessment on the lands and roads for eighteen years instead of the ten years first contemplated, the amount required may be realized.

And whereas it is deemed expedient to so continue it and issue Debentures accordingly;

It is therefore hereby enacted a By-Law of the Municipal Corporation of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry:

1st.—That said By-Law No. 733, be amended in order to fully carry out the intention thereof, and of the petition on which it was founded, and that the Warden and Treasurer of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, be authorized to borrow on the credit of the said United Counties, the sum of \$14,228.52, and to issue Debentures of the said Corporation to that amount, and sufficient in addition to pay interest thereon, at the rate of four per cent. per annum, in accordance with the following schedule:

eighteen years, from the passing thereof, or until the Debentures set forth in the foregoing schedule are paid, and that it be levied on the several Townships of Matilda, Mountain, Winchester and Williamsburg, and the lands and roads therein, as provided by the Municipal Acts and Amendments thereto.

By-Law to Remove the Chesterville Dam.

The above by-law was read a first time and withdrawn.

BY-LAW NO. 899.

By-Law for Removing the Dam of Messrs. Munro and Barrie and Lowering the Shoal in the Nation River at the Village of Chesterville, in the Township of Winchester, for the purpose of Draining the Lands and Highways in the Townships of Matilda, Mountain, Williamsburgh and Winchester.

Whereas the Council of the Township of Matilda has petitioned this Council to proceed under the provisions of the drainage law to remove the said dam and lower the said shoal; and whereas the said Munro and Barrie have filed with this Council their consent, in writing, under seal, to the expropriation of the said dam, under the provisions of the Municipal Act; but this Council and the said Munro and Barrie are unable to agree upon the compensation to be paid for said dam; and whereas it has been determined by this Council to grant the prayer of the said petition.

Be it therefore enacted a By-Law of this Council, (1) That the removal of the said dam and the lowering of the said shoal be proceeded with under the provisions of the drainage law; (2) That R. B. Carman, Judge, of the Town of Cornwall, be appointed an arbitrator to act for this Council in the arbitration for the determination of the amount to be paid to the said Munro and Barrie for the said dam; (3) That the amount which shall be awarded by the said arbitration to the said Munro and Barrie, and the amount necessary to be expended in the work of removing the said dam and lowering the said shoal, as well as any other moneys this Council may be required to expend or pay in connection with said drainage work, be assessed against and levied from the persons and corporations benefitted by the said work, in the proper proportions, under the provisions of the drainage law; (4) That David R. Brown, P.L.S., of the Town of Cornwall, Civil Engineer and Land Surveyor, be and he is hereby appointed to make the necessary estimates and assessments for the said work; and (5) That a Special Committee of this Council, consisting of A. Harkness, Reeve of Matilda; James Dickey, Reeve of Williamsburgh; H. D. Fulton, Deputy Reeve of Winchester; Andrew Kennedy, Reeve of Mountain, and George Kerr, Reeve of Osna-bruck, be and the same is hereby appointed to carry the said work into effect, and that the said committee, or a majority of its members be vested with all the powers of this Council in dealing with the said arbitration, letting the contracts for the work, and all other mat-

ters and things necessary to be done in carrying the said project to completion.
