PLENTY OF FOOD AT DAWSON CITY.

Eight Thousand Tons of Supplies There and More Going In.

Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 22.—The steamer Jewett, which left Portland in June for St. Michael, carrying a load of provisions for the Yukon trading posts, returned Friday to Gray's harbor to load lumber. Capt. Johnson says there is a large amount of provisions sent in to Dawson City this summer.

When he left St. Michael there were 8000 tons of supplies at that point awaiting transportation to the river. The bulk of this was bound for Dawson City, very little being billed for other places. It has been shipped there mostly by trading and transportation companies, and the quantity of reports of the quantity of supplies en route, there is little danger of starvation among the miners during the winter.

From the number of vessels that have since landed at St. Michael with large amounts of freight it is probable that 8000 tons more are either on the way to Dawson City or will soon be forwarded. The facilities for carrying freight up the river's mouth seem to be sufficient. From St. Michael the supplies are loaded on barges and towed up the river on boats to the gold fields. The Jewett left St. Michael July 17, and the steamer, which is expected to arrive here very little gold then awaiting transportation from that point, nearly all having come down on the steamer Portland and Excelsior. But the prospects of a large quantity being sent out this month are very favorable.

Letters, however, have been received here, containing details of the execution. The writers say that the anarchist left by the prisoner took a cup of coffee at 8 o'clock on Friday morning, and drank a cup of bouillabaisse at 10 o'clock. The prisoner calmly ascended the steps of the scaffold and donned the black gown and cap, placing the cross of the latter at the back of his head. He calmly regarded the spectators, asked to be allowed to speak, and uttered clearly the word "Germinal." (Germinal was the term given to the seventh month of the French Republic) and then turned, the screw of the garrote was then turned, the collar tightened, and the body was exposed until 6 o'clock in the evening, when it was buried. All the spectators were greatly struck by the anarchist's attitude.

APPEARANCE OF LIGNITE.

Another Lever to Lift the Rainy River Country Into Fame.

Deposits Exist on Both the American and Canadian Sides of the River—Gold in Manitoba—The Fine New Steamer Keenora—Beautiful Scenery in the Lake—The Woods—See her Letter from the World's Commissioner.

Rat Portage, Ont., Aug. 17.—(Special Correspondence).

Just at present there are those here who think that coal is about to be added to the mining products of this country. Some time ago a black substance very much resembling that mineral fuel was found on the shores of Buffalo Bay, an arm of the Lake of the Woods.

One gold-bearing district which I have not yet touched in my correspondence is that lying to the west of Shoal Lake, the western bay of the Lake of the Woods, and right upon the boundary dividing the Provinces of Ontario and Manitoba.

To a number of vein-carrying properties here located the locators have as yet been unable to obtain titles, for the simple reason that there is no means of telling in which province they lie.

A new era of navigation has begun in this Lake of the Woods country—an era of modern, up-to-date steamboats and quick transportation.

The Keenora, whose dimensions were the other day described in these columns, is a beautiful boat and her initial voyage has proven her a steady and more than ordinarily comfortable craft.

The sailing of the Keenora was a big event for this region, as was evidenced by the interest taken by the inhabitants in her movements.

The Keenora is fitted out with single berths for 200 people and she can accommodate more with cots, so that the 110 passengers, who hailed from Winnipeg, Toronto, Montreal, England and the United States, had lots of extra room in which to lounge about and enjoy the surpassingly beautiful scenery of the Lake of the Woods and the Rainy River, which hour after hour slowly unfolded itself to music from an orchestra on deck, and finally reached a sublime climax in the falls at Port Frances, which play their own Titanic organ accompaniment.

In the course of the journey are numerous scenes of a grand and sublime western country, which prove interesting to the visitor from outside. At one place a village of fishermen are gathering to take up their nets, another a pioneer settler is industriously clearing a field, and a third is cutting a wooden post for the lazy Indian who pushes his picturesque bark canoe into the water, and it is the power to return from that scene to the next.
