

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
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A Quebec Delegation. There was a delegation also from Quebec headed by Hon. E. Casavant received by the same Ministers. The delegation urged that the Federal Government grant a bonus to the Great Northern Railway of \$1000 per mile for 40 miles of the route. This project was designed to connect the Atlantic City with the Canada Atlantic and Ferry Sound systems, and as to which by the way, the Mayor of Quebec made some very angry charges in the matter of the city bonds. It has already a bonus of \$200 per mile.

Mr. Wilfrid Laurier, speaking for the Government, returned the rather chilling reply that it had been decided by the Parliament not to grant another railway assistance this season.

Drummond Railway Inquiry. What a row would have been raised in past years by James Lister, M.P., chairman of the Drummond County Railway Investigation Committee, if, as a private member, he had been any of the obtaining information at a Parliament enquiry in the manner that he has done this morning to Conservative members of the committee.

Examination of Mr. J. N. Greenhalgh was resumed by Mr. Borden, who Greenhalgh said he held \$200,000 of the stock and obtained about \$100,000 at par, and the balance at various prices. Pressed to find out from whom he had the stock, Greenhalgh told Mr. Borden that he had bought it from the late Mr. Borden, and that he had also bought it from the late Mr. Borden.

The chairman ruled that Mr. Greenhalgh need not answer, and the committee decided to adjourn until the 10th day of March.

Ryan and Farwell, for \$2,000,000, the subsidies on the extension were to be added, and the cost of the line was to be deducted from the \$2,000,000 to be divided among the shareholders to give a third. Mr. Ryan was to get the balance.

Mr. Greenhalgh explained that Mr. Farwell obtained the option of the line, because he did not want the nature of the transactions to be known to the Government, and that he had bought the line from the late Mr. Borden, and that he had also bought it from the late Mr. Borden.

Messrs. Lowell and Borden questioned the witness closely to ascertain his exact connection with the late Mr. Borden, and to establish a difference between the statements made by Mr. Greenhalgh and the Minister of Public Works. The Minister also pressed Mr. Greenhalgh to acknowledge that La Patrie was purchased out of Liberal party funds, and that the witness did not admit.

Mr. Samuel McLaughlin, of the company, testified that the original paid-up stock of the company totalled about \$400,000, of which Mr. Farwell held 700, Mr. Mitchell 100, and Mr. N. Greenhalgh 2500. The Federal subsidy received totaled \$347,850. The total indebtedness of the company is \$65,000.

Enlightenment on Business. Among the arrivals to-day was Sam Schofield of St. John, who is the forerunner of an important delegation that is due tomorrow from Montreal. He was accompanied by Messrs. Wilson, Mayor of Manchester, and Sir Rossen Leitch, formerly Lord Mayor of Manchester.

Personal and General Notes. Hon. David Mills has notified the members of the Social Science Club on April 10th on the political character of the late Henry George.

F. H. Clague of Sault Ste. Marie is in Ottawa to-day to submit propositions for the establishment of a factory for the production of paper and Canada on a subsidy of \$80,000 each from the Canadian and French Governments.

The City Council is being urged to request the Curfew bill. There is a good deal of opposition to the move, as the bill is claimed to be a dead letter where it exists.

A chess board is to be formed in Ottawa. The corporation will defray part of the expenses.

The bill to amend the criminal code with respect to cruelty to animals, imposing a heavy penalty for the docking of horns by other persons than veterinary surgeons, has been referred to the Committee on Agriculture.

Fine Structure to be Erected on College-street in This City

For the Bible Training Institution, which is Evangelical and Un denominational—Description of the Building—List of Council and Executive Officers.

The officers and members of the corporation of the Toronto Bible Training School, which has been doing good work at the school, Leith-street, west of Water-street, are building an elegant institution on College-street, near University-street, which is to be ready for occupation next December.

The site is quite central, and as two lines of street cars pass regularly, it is easily accessible from every part of the city. The address will be 100 College-street.

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### WOMEN IN COUNCIL

**Dr. Chamberlain Tells Them of the Need of County Homes—A Nurse for a Nickel.**

The quarterly session of the Woman's Council was held Thursday afternoon and evening, in the theatre of the Normal School, at which a large number of ladies were present.

The address of a woman's touch was illustrated by the acting-president, who concealed the baroness of the table on the platform with a very handsome cover, which she brought with her in a brown paper parcel.

The acting-president, Mrs. Willoughby Cummings, occupied the chair.

The president of the Woman's Art Association gave an informal report of the work done, outlining the course and objects, mentioning that 20 lecture courses had been given in the city, at Varsity, Queen's, Halifax and down East.

A representative from the Aberdeen Society detailed the joy that 174 families felt on receipt of parcels of books, and many grateful letters had been received.

Mrs. Wood, from the Humane Society, dealt on the great importance, and vast magnitude of their work, and cited an instance where she, herself, had induced a person whom for the sake of brevity she would call a "man," to let out his check rein three holes.

The treasurer's report showed a balance in January of \$37.95, and an existing sum to the good of \$57.65.

Miss McLeod, the head of the Victorian Order of Nurses, described what district nursing is, giving examples of cases, also explaining the method of procedure, and the routine of a day's work. This order is intended merely for those classes who cannot afford the cost of a regular nurse, the maximum charge per visit being 50 cents, and from that down to 5 cents.

The following were appointed delegates to Ottawa, the latter five being substitutes: Miss Cox, Mrs. George Kerr, Miss Cayley, Mrs. Kavanagh, Mrs. Edward Lee, Mrs. Francis, Miss Fitzgibbon, Mrs. Benjamin, Mrs. Thompson and Mrs. Thornton.

**The Aged Poor.**—"Toronto the good, places her poor in jail," is what a Halifax lady said some time ago. The question of the aged poor is being taken up by the Local Council of Women. On this subject the meeting was last evening addressed by Dr. Chamberlain, the municipal inspector of Asylums and Prisons.

"We have the poor," said the Doctor, "and we have to solve the problem of what to do with them. It is an old, old theme. The United States has the nearest ideal system of country in existence, though for the helpless poor Canada has a very complete system."

"Half a century ago things were better, the neighbors did their share, and the churches co-operated, but with increase of population this had to be taken up by the municipalities. There is a change for the worse took place under the 'Wage-earning Act,' designed to operate against hibernators. The municipalities, generally penurious, found under this act old people could be committed to the common jail, and when they came out at the end of six months they were sent back."

"This system, still in existence, is cruel and much inferior to the farming-out plan."

**County Homes.**—"The remedy for this existing evil, to my mind," said the Doctor, "is the establishment of county homes over all the Province, but although we have 14 of these, legislation on the part of the Local Legislature is necessary. These homes are not a success, because they are not uniform in management, and there is no law making people enter them and nothing prohibiting us from retaining them. In the United States this is compulsory, and they must stay there, and their system consequently is much better than ours."

**Home Defective.**—"Also, to my mind, the homes we have in this direction, are not what they should be. The class of honest poor, rendered poor by misfortune or other cause, require more sympathy than those who may be termed dishonest poor, who when young made no provision for the future."

**As Soon Jump Into the Don.**—"I have visited the Industrial Home, which is anything but a 'home,' and is a resort for tramps, who break through slowly. The aged poor in the homes are discontented, as well, I would as soon go and jump into the Don as go into a home, and I would rather die young than have to live on their diet. The surroundings are not home-like enough, the dieting is not what it should be. These homes are unwholesome. If they were comfortable the inmates would be happy and would have no inclination to wander away, and should the Government see their way clear to establish

these homes, it would get rid of a great deal of friction that now exists, and would largely depopulate the jails.

"There should be no poor in jails. They interfere with the classification of criminals. A bill providing for district jails should be introduced. The House of Providence should not exist. Under the present system a great deal of time and money is going to waste."

**Female Immigration.**—After a very hearty vote of thanks had been passed to the lecturer, the subject of "Female Immigration" was taken up by Mrs. Wood, and followed by Mrs. Brunell and Mrs. Thompson, and the discussion became general. It was agreed that unsuitable immigration should be deterred and correct information as to wages and conditions distributed, and the advisability of establishing homes under the auspices of the Women's Protective Association, was discussed.

### RAILWAY NEWS.

The Grand Trunk are having a great deal of trouble with their bridge on the Grand River, near Paris, one of the abutments of which was split in two by the frost of last week. Superintendent Fitzhugh has been on the scene all week; the place has also been visited by Messrs. Macdonald and Morse. The break was thought to be repaired on Saturday, but the stone-work broke again, and the damage is now greater than it was before.

**Two Versions, Both Correct.**—Some time ago Mayor Shaw wrote to President Van Horne of the Canadian Pacific and General Manager Hays of the Grand Trunk, asking if the disagreement between the companies over the Port Arthur Division affected the interchange of passenger traffic at North Bay, or had the freight business also been affected. General Manager Hays replied that the passenger traffic only was affected, while a letter was received from President Van Horne yesterday, stating that the disagreement had affected both freight and passenger traffic.

A railroad official said yesterday that, though these statements were contradictory, they were both correct. The Grand Trunk had abandoned the agreement controlling the percentages on passenger traffic and the Canadian Pacific had disregarded that covering the interchange of freight at North Bay. Still, the Canadian Pacific had to accept freight handed them at North Bay if it came from a Grand Trunk point, but if it originated at a point on their own line they would take it amount by South's Falls. For instance, a settler for the north is coming on a Grand Trunk non-competitive point, and is going to the destination via the C.P.R. He may take the C.P.R. train at the nearest junction point, but his effects will be hauled by the Grand Trunk to North Bay, and there have to be accepted by the Canadian Pacific. To abort the Grand Trunk are willing to interchange freight traffic at North Bay when it pays them to do so.

**Good Earnings.**—The earnings of the Canadian Pacific Railway for the week ending March 14 were \$492,000 in 1898 and \$220,000 in 1897, an increase of \$272,000. The earnings of the Grand Trunk also show an increase, the figures for the week ending March 14 being \$107,000, and for the week ending March 18, 1897 were \$403,556, an increase of \$72,511.
