The Pommern carrying Delbrueck who was acting as pilot; a banker, Herr Semmelhardt; an architect, Herr Benduhn, and a man named Hein, ascended this afternoon at the gasworks. The wind was blowing a hurricane, and the Pommern broke away before she had been completely ballasted.







Dr. Ferguson States the Case, and Gives Solid Reasons For Extra Grant of \$250,000.

Editor World: On April 9 the ratepayers of Toronto will have the opportunity of voting on the bylaw to grant \$250,000 to the new General Hospital. As one who has taken a good deal of interest in the welfare of the hospitals, not only of this city, but of the whole province, I ask the liberty of saying a few words.

On a number of occasions I have

been on deputations that have waited upon the government and the city council to urge needed reforms, and changes that would place the hospitals in better positions to cope with the growing demands upon them, and to maintenance. As a result of these efforts the hospitals now receive 70 cents a day instead of 40 cents from the city towards the maintenance of poor patients, and 20 cents per day instead of about 15 cents from the government, This increase of 35 cents per day on poor patients means an increased income to the four general hospitals of Toronto of over \$40,000 a year. This has proved a great boon to these institutions, and has enabled them to make improvements that would other-

wise have been impossible.

But it must be borne in mind that the 70 cents from the city, and the 20 cents from the government, or 90 cents per day, falls below the cost of maintenance. Thus it is that the hospitals have still to finance a considerable portion of the cost of caring for the poor patients. This must come from either donations or the margin of profit on private ward patients. At no time has the city ever paid the full cost of maintenance. In this way the city has come to owe a very large monetary obligation to the hospitals.

Small Support From City.
The hospitals of Toronto, and I refer to the four general hospitals,namethe General, St. Michael's, Grace and the Western, have up to date only received from the people of Toronto by public vote, \$400,000. This would not make up for the loss these hospitals have incurred in caring for poor pa-tients at less than cost from the city. These hospitals have now grown to very important institutions in this Bhey have acquired lands, buildings and appliances that represent large expenditures of money. It might be said that the four hospitals just named represent a total value of about \$2,000.000 in lands, buildings; appliances and cash. To this the city has so far given only \$400,000. The balance has come from the gifts of the generous and the company of the private wards. These institutions, therefore, merit well at the hands of the people.

But it is reasonable that the city,

as a whole, should contribute liber-ally towards the building funds for the wards for the poor patients. The hospitals furnish the management, the nursing, the supplies, the medical and surgical attendance, and part of the cost of maintenance. The people cost of maintenance. 



NEW YORK, April 2.—Gustaf Ljungström of Sweden proved to-day that he is the best long distance runner on this side of the Atlantic by winning the second professional Marathon Derby at the Polo Grounds. He won with a breezy rush by a third of a mile from James Crowley, the Irish Marathon racer, in 2.34.08 2-5. This beats the record made by the Frenchman, St. Yves, over the same course a year ago by six minutes 45 1-5 seconds. Thure Johansen, another Swede, was bird, five hundred yards behind Crowley, with Ted Crook, an American, fourth. The other two survivors, Fred Meadows of Canada, and Johnny Hayes of this city, who won the amateur Marathon in London two years ago, were badly distanced. Ljungstrom, on the form that he has shown in recent long distance races, was the choice among the ten contestants, but Hans Holmer was looked upon as being his most dangerous rival. Holmer cut out the pace from the start and before he had gone many mites he led by three hundred yards. This advantage he held up to be eighteenth mile, breaking the local track records of St. Yves and Shrubb up to that distance. Then Ljungstrom passed him after a wonderful sprint, Holmer kept on bravely, but his running shoes proved his undoing, and he had to quit after the 21st mile mark. His feet were bleeding when he stopped and he had to be assisted off the field.

Reorganizing the Conservative Party

OTTAWA, April 2.—Hon. George E. Foster has retired for a while at least from active political life. His health has been broken by hard work and the translations. the tremendous mental strain thru which he passed during the trial of his libel suit. The verdict of the jury was totally unexpected by him, and he has been much depressed in spirit. During the past month hs has only been able to be out of doors twice.

He Will Go South. After he has sufficiently recovered from his illness to travel he will go south for a long rest, but the arduous duties of parliament which he has undertaken for so many long years are a thing of the past for him. He may retain his seat in the house, but his seat in the house, but his ighting days are practically over. Mr Foster is not a very old man, being but 63 years of age. He was a min-ister of the crown in Sir John A. Maconald's government as far back

Who Will Be First Lieutenant? The retirement of Mr. Foster from the field of active politics leaves the position of Mr. R. L. Borden's first-llentenancy vacant. There is no indication at present who will succeed but it is likely that Mr. C. J. Doherty the member for Ste. Anne's, Montreal, will temporarily take the seat on Mr Borden's left hand. Ex-Judge Doherty is one of the most, respected men man in his native Province of Quebec. The permanent first-lieutenancy of the Conservative party will be decided during the recess.

A Reorganization of the Party. A complete reorganization of the party is afoot. This is much required. The lack of cohesion has been very apparent this session, and some newspapers have attributed this to Mr Borden. Such an assertion is unfair all the good qualities essential for suc-cessful leadership, but whose unfailing kindness and courtesy of demeanor have sometimes been mistaken for want of firmness.

Whips Are Inefficient. There are two reasons to account for the fact that the Conservative party has not been such a successful opposition as the talents of some of the members of it should have made possible. The truth is that the Con-servative whips, as a body, are hope-lessly inefficient. Most of them were appointed in the days when there were ery few men of ability in the Con servative ranks.



GRAND JURY CRITICIZE NSPECTION OF CATTLE

Presentment Made to Judge Denten In Sessions Court en Saturday.

The grand jury of the criminal ses sions made their presentment to Judge Denton Saturday morning. Insuffiyards and cattle market, and the laxity which permits cattle to go thru abattoirs and slaughter houses with-out inspection were the outstanding

"In this connection," says the presentment, "we found that hundreds, sometimes thousands, of cattle passed thru the stock yards or cattle markets in 24 hours, and that there was only one inspector. It is beyond our bellef that this inspection can be thore, and that this inspection can be thoro, and evidence was given to show that hundreds and thousands of cattle were delivered and discharged from the stock yards without inspection. While a large number of cattle may be removed to public abattoirs, where inspection may be adequate, there is the opportunity to remove diseased cattle to any point where they may be slaughtered and put on the market for food. We very strongly recommend

slaughtered and put on the market for food. We very strongly recommend additional inspectors to make this public service efficient."

As usual, the overcrowded conditions at Toronto jail are criticized, and the suggestion is made that female prisoners committed for trial be sent to the Morcer Reformatory to relieve the overcrowding. It is also declared that the medical attention at the jail is insufficient, and that the food, particularly the meat, supplied the prisoners is not up to the standard. Toronto Asylum and the Central Prison were also visited, and condi-Prison were also visited, and condi-Hons there were found satisfactory.

But Only Men Suited Make Homesteaders.

LICENSES. At this time of the year, when hundreds of immigrants are coming into the country, many of them with the RUGGIST, ISSUE 9 22 West Queen, op. nings. No witnesses the country, many of them with the idea of homsteading, a few words on this subject will be appropriate.

Would-be homesteaders may be divided into two classes; first, those who have had no experience of farming; and, second, farm laborers and practical farmers. In the first class WANTED.

who have had no experience of farming; and, second, farm laborers and practical farmers. In the first class are many young men brought up in the city, and my advice to these young men is, "Don't homestead," for it is almost impossible for a man coming from a large town, used to spending his evenings on the cricket field, playing football or going into a music hall, to be contented with homestead life in western Canada, where he is deprived of all these things.

I have known two cases where townbred men have paid down \$10 for filing on a homestead, \$40 for a shack, and incurred other expenses, only to give up all idea of homesteading after a few months' experience of batching thru a Canadian winter. But there are some who are inexperienced in farming, who have been brought up in the country, and these are the men who, with the farm laborers and the practical farmers, can make a success of homesteading.

The best plan for an inexperienced man, who wishes to homestead, to adopt is to buy a ticket sto Winnipeg and go into the immigration office there, where he can see a list of farmers who are anxious to secure this class of help. He can hire by the year:

In the spring following residence on his homestead the new settler will be able to work for some neighboring farmer, who will do his breaking required under the homestead law. His other summer's work should put him on his feet.

Coming to the second class, the practical farmers or farm laborers with some money, a splendid start can be made on a homestead with \$400. This will provide him with a shack made of lumber, farm implements and a team, and provisions enough to keep him going during the summer. A nice little sum can be earned by a man who was a team by breaking for his poorer neighbors, as he receives \$3 for each acre broken. This kind of man will have no difficulty at all in getting along in western Canada, and is the

kind of settler Canada wants. The elimate in the west is healthy and delightful. If the day were not protected by religious sanc-tion, the speaker questioned whether it would be long continued as a day of rest in these times of business stress and strain.
