BROKEN PLEDGES CAUSING SCENE TO REBEL

Actions Decided on in Conservative Caucus Afterward Abandoned—“Scape-goats” Not Responsible for Politics.

OTTAWA, April 2.—(Special.)—The split in the Conservative party is much more pronounced than outsiders imagine. It is stated by those who ought to know that quite a number of Conservative members are insurgent because promises given in caucus of certain action and course of criticism in the house on certain measures were broken. It is even specifically stated that a promise was given to move the six months' hold on the naval bill, and to the surprise of all the following, something else was substituted.

The attempt of The Toronto News to make scape-goats of Foster, Haggart, Sproule and George Taylor and the other whips, all remnants of the old Conservative party, is also resented here. These men are not responsible for the parliamentary policy that the Conservatives have pursued in the last years. The insurgency is against this parliamentary policy and those who made it and flouted it out, more than against discredited Conservatives.

FOSTER NOT TO RETIRE

According to Press Despatch Reorganization Stories Are Untrue.

OTTAWA, April 2.—(G. N. W. Press Despatch.)—The news so widely published that Hon. George E. Foster has definitely decided to drop out of politics has, as yet, no solid foundation. He is ill and will require a lengthy rest, but he has not been asked to retire; he is a private member and this could not be done, nor has he expressed an idea of retiring and the leader of the opposition will not ask him to do so.

Plans to Protect the Poor From Operations of the Present “Shark” System—Funds at Legal Interest Only.

NEW YORK, April 2.—Mrs. Russell Sage is to devote some of the millions left by her husband to saving the poor and needy of this state from the usury of loan sharks. The Sage millions are to be used to capitalize a chain of model loan establishments, which will advance money on chattel mortgages at the legal rate of interest.

HARD TO NEGOTIATE A RECIPROcity TREATY

German and French Tariff Treaties Stand in Way of Uncle Sam Giving Canada Preference.

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 2.—Within two months, according to the present plans of the administration, there will be a gathering in Washington or Ottawa of representatives of the Canadian and United States governments for the purpose of negotiating a reciprocity and trade treaty between the two countries.

\$125,000 Damage to Cloak Making Premises in Montreal.

MONTREAL, April 2.—(Special.)—A fire took place late Saturday night in the cloak-making room of J. H. Waldman & Co., St. Paul-street. The damage to the stock amounted to \$125,000, and it is stated the insurance totalled \$90,000. The building is also damaged up to \$50,000, partly covered.

FEARFUL TRAGEDY OF A RUMAY BALLOON

Three Men Perish and Another May Die—Aerial Craft Breaks Away and Finally Sinks in the Sea.

STETTIN, Germany, April 2.—The German balloon Pommern, which made an ascension here this afternoon, met with a series of accidents which ended in a disaster under most tragic circumstances in the Baltic Sea. Three men lost their lives. The radical member of the Reichstag, Werner Hugo Delbrueck, Herr Delbrueck and another member of the party were drowned, a third occupant of the balloon, Herr Hein, ascended this afternoon at the gasworks. The wind was blowing a hurricane, and the Pommern broke away before she had been completely ballasted.

NEW ROOSEVELT MISSES A VISIT TO THE VATICAN

MONTREAL REPORTER'S DEATH

George Duncan Robinson, for twenty-one years shorthand reporter on The Gazette, died to-day of heart trouble. He was born in Yorkshire, and was at one time a chemist at Windsor, England.

THE WORLD GROWS.

The World has instructed its architects to prepare plans for adding four storeys to its present spacious building. 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MAY BE NO MORE ELECTIONS THIS YEAR

Chaotic State of British Politics—Meanwhile There's an Enormous Deficit, But Nobody Seems to Care.

LONDON, April 2.—(New York Tribune Cable.)—The impending political crisis is approached with apathy by men of all parties. Even the astounding deficit of over £31,000,000 falls to make a deep impression, and the calculation that covers £20,000,000 must be provided in the two budgets this year does not appear to frighten anybody.

As Redmond Outlines the Situation.

LONDON, April 2.—John Redmond, speaking at Tipperary, declared that strength must hold the third reading of the budget until the lords voted on the veto resolutions. If the lords rejected it, they the premier must ask for guarantees, and if he refused he must resign. Immediately, on the other hand, The News declares emphatically that the budget will pass. It gives no reason for its opinion.

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GOOD CITIZENS ALL VOTE FOR HOSPITAL BYLAW

Dr. Ferguson States the Case, and Gives Solid Reasons For Extra Grant of \$250,000.

Editor World: On April 3 the rate-payers of Toronto will have the opportunity of voting on the bylaw to grant \$250,000 to the new General Hospital.

On a number of occasions I have been upon deputations that have waited upon the government and the city council to urge needed reforms, and changes that would place the hospitals in better positions to cope with the growing demands upon them, and to meet the constantly increasing cost of maintenance.

But it must be borne in mind that the 70 cents from the city and the 20 cents from the government, or 90 cents per day, falls below the cost of maintenance. Thus it is that the hospitals have still to finance a considerable portion of the cost of caring for the poor patients.

Small Support From City. The hospitals of Toronto, and I refer to the four general hospitals, namely, the General St. Michael's, Grace and the Western, have up to date only received from the people of Toronto by public vote, \$400,000.

These hospitals have now grown to be very important institutions in this city. They have acquired lands, buildings and appliances that represent large expenditures of money.

But it is reasonable that the city, as a whole, should contribute liberally towards the building funds for the hospitals. The city council has in the past furnished the management, the nursing, the supplies, the medical and surgical attendance, and part of the cost of maintenance of the buildings in which these poor patients are to be cared for.

Five Cents a Year Asked. Now let us see what the proposed grant of \$250,000 means to the taxpayers of Toronto. The grant will mean \$10,000 a year for interest and \$500 a year for sinking fund for 40 years.

On the other hand the gains are very great. The hospitals of Toronto have long been a standing disgrace to the city; and it is to be hoped that better things are near at hand.

When the proposed vote of \$250,000 is carried the amount given by the city to the new General Hospital will be \$450,000. For this the city is to have 450 public beds, or at the rate of a bed for every \$1000.

As one interested in the Western Hospital I have no hesitation in urging upon the electors to vote the sum asked. I know the needs of all the hospitals and the cost of their management. Let us hope that the vote will be an almost unanimous one.

Pennsylvania Railway Improvements. NEW YORK, April 3.—The Pennsylvania Railroad opened to public inspection for the first time Saturday 16.4 miles of the most extensive construction work, for foot, ever attempted—namely, its tunnel and terminal improvement from Harrison, N.J. to Sunnyside, I. I.

Can't Settle Philadelphia Strike. PHILADELPHIA, April 3.—All peace negotiations are again off in the street car strike. The latest efforts of the politicians and representatives of the American Federation of Labor were without result, and the politicians declare that so far as they are concerned the strike will run its course.

PASTOR RUSSELL'S SERMON

The Necessity for the Millennium.

TEXT: "Times of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord; and He shall send Jesus Christ, which before was preached into you; whom the heavens must retain until the times of His God hath spoken by the mouth of all His holy prophets since the world began."—Acts iii, 19-21.

BROOKLYN, N.Y., April 3.—Pastor C. T. Russell of Brooklyn Tabernacle preached here twice to-day to splendid audiences. One of his discourses was entitled, "The Overthrow of Satan's Empire." The other, which we report, was on the necessity for the millennium from the text above quoted.

Respecting two matters there can be no question: (1) That the early church thoroly believed in a millennial kingdom, hoped for it, prayed for it—"Thy kingdom come; Thy will be done on earth as it is done in heaven."

On the other hand the gains are very great. The hospitals of Toronto have long been a standing disgrace to the city; and it is to be hoped that better things are near at hand.

What has led to this radical change on the part of the religious wise men of all denominations? Have they taken a step in advance or are they departing from the path—from the teachings of the inspired word of God? That they have left the word of God, that they make light of it, that they profess far more wisdom and ability than the writers of the Bible and a higher intellectual inspiration than they are indubitable.

The present day concept of the Church of Christ is that God plied it amongst men as leaven in a batch of dough with the intent that it should propagate itself until the entire mass would be leavened. But the Bible apostolic concept of the church's message is the very reverse of this—that it is planted in the world, not with a view to converting the world, but on the contrary to keep itself separate from the world and to draw to itself.

As many as the Lord your God shall call of the pure in heart—to sacrifice unto death, and later, by the first resurrection, to enter into the heavens in glory with Him.

The two views are so radically opposite that none should confuse them in their minds. If one is right, the other is wrong. If one is scriptural, the other is unscriptural. In the above text Dr. Brown admits that the scriptural view entertained by the early church contemplated the church in suffering and in a temporary or tabernacle condition in the present life and promised a share with Christ in his reign in power and great glory; as God's kingdom during the millennium.

The safe, the proper, the right course is to go back and take up afresh the doctrine of the millennium.

land—helping the sick and doing many other acts of kindness which are very commendable when from a religious or humanitarian standpoint.

Our Lord's instruction was that His people should preach the gospel in all the world for a witness to all the world. The mission of the gospel is to select the kingdom class, a "little flock." The first opportunity to become members of this royal priesthood was offered to the Jews and, after the gathering of a remnant from them, and after their national rejection, the message was to go to the whole world irrespective of national lines, boundaries or language—anybody, everybody having the "hearing ear," was to be instructed respecting Christ and the opportunity of becoming His disciples by a full consecration of mind and body, time and talent, even unto death.

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God bless the Christian Endeavor and Epworth League and Students' Missionary League and the Laymen's Movement, all intent on "storming the world for Jesus." We hear their witness that they have a zeal for God which we greatly admire and would encourage. But their zeal is "not according to knowledge," and is therefore considerably misdirected. To any one of logical mind, who will reason from statistics, the thought of converting the world by singing a few rousing hymns or holding a few enthusiastic meetings for the collection of money! money! money! is childishness.

We have all had our share. But we all should say with the apostle, "When I was a child, I spoke as a child, and understood as a child; but when I became a man I put away childish things" (I Corinthians xiii. 11).

Christian people have been fooling themselves long enough! Yes, it is as absolutely irrational to think of converting the world, as it is unscriptural to believe that God ever gave as a child and understood as a child; but when I became a man I put away childish things" (I Corinthians xiii. 11).

There is more danger of their losing their own faith in the Bible, because of their misapprehension of some of its teachings—respecting the mission of the church, the hope of the church and the hope of the world!

Missionaries are thus handicapped! Full of commendable zeal they leave our shores to tell the heathen that their forefathers have gone to eternal torment and that they are going there, unless they accept Christ. It is a rude awakening to be asked where hell is, and why God should have condemned them and their forefathers to such a horrible cruelty. The heathen ask, "Why the different denominations? Why the different theories of salvation—by water, by election, by free grace, by joining the church, etc. The missionary, who is unable to answer the adult native, gathers children about him, starts a school and does all he is able, perhaps, to justify his presence in a foreign

We have shown the value and necessity for the doctrine of the millennium—that all Christians who would hold fast to their Bibles as a faithful anchor, and who would mark progress in their study of the word is no co-laborers with God in the gathering of "the elect" need to see that the elect only are now called to be heirs of the kingdom for which we pray, "Thy kingdom come." They need to see that that kingdom is God's provision for the future blessing of the non-elect. They need to see that the Bible does not teach, as many of them suppose, that the saints are called of God to sit in the heavenly balcony and look over at the non-elect, and to gush, and hear their cries.

Next let us note that the millennium itself is an absolute necessity for the world, according to such statistics of the world-wide. Many college professors and D. D.'s are inclined to speak glibly of the second coming of Christ being far in the future—"fifty thousand years yet," say some. But evidently these learned gentlemen have not used their educational advantages in connecting with such statements.

Any school boy can figure up what the population of the earth would be one thousand years from now, taking the present population as per the census as sixteen hundred millions and the rate of increase as shown by the census reports at 8 per cent. in 10 years.

Pressure of Real Liquidation Overhangs New York Market

Professionals May Find it Difficult to Keep Long Holders in Domestic Issues Influenced by Montreal.

World Office, Saturday Evening, April 2.

Announcements of important gold engagements come as a climax to a week of bad news for those trying to buy and unload New York stocks. Gold engagements to the value of \$1,750,000 were announced on Friday. Such arrangements for exports of the yellow metal had been looked for by those who saw the only method of liquidating European obligations by gold, by securities or by commodities. The latter have been out of the question for some time, owing to high prices and the want of a surplus. Securities have been tried, but these have not been acceptable, and now the only recourse is to pay up in the open form always acceptable, the not at all times convenient.

Just how much gold will have to go out can only be told after the end of the movement is, however, admitted that the United States debt is heavy, and a big outflow of the standard metal can only be avoided by making a substitute. Bonds and short term notes of considerable dimensions have and are continually being issued, and it is possible that Europe may take some of these, while the steadily-refuses to buy the listed stocks. The gold movement is the first real acknowledgment of the advance in the Bank of England's rate to 4 per cent. New York money rates have not advanced in sympathy, but perhaps this is in deference to the exigencies of the stock market, rather than to a desire to allow natural methods to take their wonted course.

Strikes, crop damage reports, gold exports and fears of supreme court decisions, have failed to be entirely reflected in the price of stocks. Wall Street never allows itself to be governed by conditions. If it did there would be no money made by those who go to the framing of prices. Modest declines have resulted when the manipulators tried to get out a few shares, but as soon as traders tried to take advantage of the situation, supply was at once put in, and then an attempt made to frighten out the shorts by an incipient rally. Fighting the decline is the proposition which now confronts the big fellows, and as they are adepts at the game they need no fine advice how to accomplish their purpose. If they can keep long holders in, and increase the number on each consecutive decline, the path to success is easy.

One important feature of the market recently is the gradual fading away of what might be termed the investment securities, if any in this market can be classed as such. North Western, Great Northern, Illinois Central and a few others of this variety have sagged under a pressure which can only be interpreted as the presence of liquidation. While such shares as these going down, is there any reason why Union Pacific, Southern Pacific and many of the highly manipulated industrials should not decline considerably further? Concessions of importance to labor have already been made, and in the case of Pennsylvania, this is expected to mean upwards of \$12,000,000 a year. Increased operating expenses must be met by increased earnings, but will they? A large part of the public which patronized New York has become disgusted, and the upkeep of Wall St. will have to fall on a smaller number. If this means anything, it is that those playing the market will be harder hit than before. To those who are still staying in, the only safe advice is don't buy until a substantial break in prices occurs, and this may not be far off.

As to the future, the present period of depression cannot last. Prices received owing to the temporary condition of the market, the congestion in bonds and the disturbed political situation, but these conditions have been amply discounted, underlying conditions continue sound, and when it is shown that the earning powers of our great railroad systems and industries are not impaired, confidence will return, and the securities of well-established properties will be once more in demand and must recover from the present depression. Such a recovery cannot be very far distant, and should come as soon as easier money is in prospect. The time that is usually a period of special disturbance in the money market, has been passed with scarcely a ripple, is itself assuring, and if Europe needs the situation will be helped by the fact that where it is most required.

Archdeacon Cody Speaks of Need of Spiritual and Bodily Refreshment.

The pursuit of selfish pleasure was the chief destructive agent. It brought toll to others and set an example of breaking down the character of the day. Amusements could be more strenuous than work, and the expertly proper Sunday observance proved that men and women returned to their occupations on Monday infinitely less fit than on the Saturday night preceding.

W. Thorne asked to have his case settled at once. He is a well-known lawyer and operator. He had never had any transactions in the raided office, he said, but had gone solely as a solicitor to find out who composed the firm and what charter they possessed.

Chief Croker's Auto Blows Up. NEW YORK, April 3.—Fire Chief Croker's automobile blew up with a roar to-day just as the chief was about stepping into it to speed to a fire.

Daring Burglary at Stratford. STRATFORD, April 3.—A daring robbery was pulled off here in broad daylight Saturday.

TRAVELER FOUND DEAD.

LONDON, Ont., April 3.—(Special.)—J. W. Christman, commercial traveler of Hespeler, was found dead in his room at the Dominion House to-day. Death was due to hemorrhage of the stomach.

Mutual Tip in Columbia. WASHINGTON, D.C., April 3.—A sub-committee of the house committee on the district of Columbia, headed by Representative Campbell of Kansas, Saturday reported favorably a bill by Representative Murphy of Missouri, under which all tip giving or tip receiving in hotels, restaurants and cafes in Washington shall constitute a misdemeanor, punishable by fine not exceeding \$500.

CO-OPERATION A FAILURE

Experiment in Furness Shipyards Doesn't Satisfy the Men.

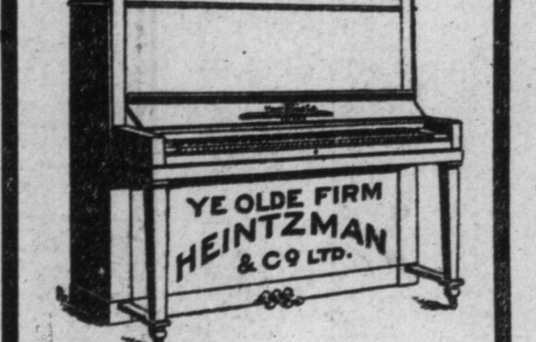
LONDON, April 2.—Sir Christopher Furness' plan of operating the shipyard of Furness, Withy & Co. at Hartlepool on co-operative lines, has collapsed after a trial of one year.

The employees who accepted co-partnership provisionally to-day voted against its continuance. They complain that their expectation of full employment has not been realized.

The labor leaders also contend that such profit-sharing systems break up trade unions, with the principles of which they are inconsistent.

Sir Christopher's plan, which received the cordial support of former Premier Balfour as president of the Labor Co-operative Association, provided that the workmen should receive nine per cent. interest annually on the small sums which they invested in the business, in addition to their regular wages. At the same time they agreed never to strike, but to settle differences thru a council composed of representatives of the management and the working force.
