Butter.-Much butter is spoiled from using salt containing lime and other substances which hasten its decomposition Salt can easily be purified by pouring upon it a little warm water and allowing it to drain ; it dissolves it and takes out the lime and other extraneous sub. stances, and leaves the salt nearly pure. The quantity usually added to butter is one ounce to the pound. After butter has become rancid, it can be restored and made nearly sweet by a very simple process. This is, to wash it well in cold water, often changed, and after pressing out the water, salt it new and add a little sugar, say half an ounce to the pound. This will be found to render it much more palateable,

Best Body Copal Varnish for Coach-Es.-This is intended for the body parts of coaches and other similar vehicles, intending for polish ing. Fuse 8 lbs of fine African gum copal, and two gallons of clarified oil (old measure), boil it very slowly for four or five hours, until quite stringy, mix wit h three gallons and a half of turpentine ; strain off and pour it into a cistern, If this is too slow in dryivg,coach makers, painters and varnish-makers, have introduced to two pots of the preceding varnish, one made as follows: 8 ths of fine pale gum anima, twe gallons of clarified oil, and three and a balf gallons of turpentine, to be boiled foar honrs.
Pitch Pinf Mix-TION.--Take two or three good sized pitch pine tene For Consump. put them into two quarts of pure, seft water; boil them in an iron vessel till reduced to one quart, skimming off the turpentime as it rises strain it through a thick cloth; add a pint of molasses or a pound of loaf sugar ; boil it in ; strain it again into an earthen vessel ; add one gill of best Cognac brandy, or such other spirit as may be preferred, and bots tle it; Give from half a wine glass to a full one, as the patient can bear it, three times a day. It is excellent for any cough

## Total Revenue 1850.

The Import and Excise Duties collected in 1850, under the authority
of an Act of the Provincial Legislature, amounted to $81,408 \mathrm{l}: 175$. The sum of $3946 l 144$ derived from Tonnage Duties in support of Light
\{Houses was received at the Treasury-making a gross Revenue of
$85,365 l 119$ carrency.



## Light Duties.

These Daties are levied and allowed under authority of Acts of the Provincial Legislature, and are considered very propere exactions; the amounts su) collected being appropriated to the mamtenance of Light Houses aleng the coast. Under these Acts H. M. :hips of War, and vessels employed as Transports or Storeships for the conveyance of Troops or Military Stores, or otherwise in the service of 11. M. Guverniment, are exempt.
Every ship or vessei registered in the Province, when cleared at any Custom House in the Province, per ton ; 44-5d-a certificate of the payment of which will exempt from any further payment to 31st March following the date of the cerificate.

Steam Vessels arriving within this Province, whether carrying Mails or not (excepting Her Majesty's War S:eamers) subject to the same rate of Light Duty ; to be entitled to the like cartificate and exemption as a foresaid.

No duties payable when the the vessel shall be departiug for sale on her first voyage.

The Commissioners having control of this branch of the public service, expended in 1850 , the sum of $£ 4,723184$ currency; amount of $\{$ duties, \&c. received $£ 4,4819$ 53. The deficiency was paid out of the general revenue of the Province.

Poor Asylum.
On the 31st December, 1850, there were in the Poor Asylum of this City,


Oa the 10th February, 1851, the number of inmates had increased to 344.

This Assylum is maintained at a cost of nearly 3000l. per annum. In 1850 , the amount fell a trifle short of 28002 . - 13501 . of which was borne by the Province at large - 1000l. by the citizens of Halifax, the balance derived from other sources, product of labour in the Listablishineut, \&c.

Sable Island lies eighty miles to the southward of Nova Scotia, and in the immediate vicinity of the Gult Stream. The winter is comparatively mild ; the summer generally very hot. There is great discrepancy between the position given to this 1sland on the old chats and that assigned to Captain Darby, ex-Superintendant. The late Capt Darby was of opinion-and his authority ought to go for much,-that his lather's plan is correct. The difference, which is really frightful, will be seen by a glasce at the following comparative statement-

The different Bars beneath the Sea, however carefully they may have been examined in former times, appear to shifi continually, and ought to be sounded within stated periods of five or ten years. One of these bars extends in a N E by E direction twenty-two miles, and breaks violently in beavy weather. There is also a Bar extending seven miles N W $\frac{1}{2}$ W from the Western Head, with not more than thirteen feet of water on any part of it.

The propriety of erecting a Light House on some point of the Island, has been discussed at different times; and opinion has been divided on the question.

Those who oppose the measure conscientiously believe that a Light House would induce vessels to run for it, which now kee? ciear of the Island altogether, and thus lure them amid shoals and sand bars, that would otherwise be avoided.

It is also urged that a Light Hense would be of little use, as, from the very slight elevation afforded by any solid part of the Island, it could not be seen very far at sca.

As Mr. Cunard, the senior Commissioner of Light Honses, and Captain
Darby, the Commander of the Cutter, both entertain these opinions, the writer urges his own, in view of their great experience, with much diffidence, and yet very strongly advises that a Light House should be erected on some suitable site near the Central Station, upon Sable Island, for the following, among other reasons.

Because vessels not bound for Sable Island, or not driven there by currents, or stress of weather, would no more run for it than they do now. They would keep clear of it.

Because it affords no safe harbor of refuge. Vessels outward bound would
not require a new point of departure, and homeward bound vessels have the main-land all before them.

The received opinion, however, (f most competent judges seems to be, that vessels driven vear the Island would find a Light invaluable. If the weather was thick and they could not see it they would not be worse off than they are now. If seen, it would at once indicate their true position, and it made to revolve from west to east, would show in what direction the Bars lie, and by what course a station could be approached for assistance when required.

## SCATTERI

This Island, in length about six miles, and varying in breadth from one mile, to thue-fourths of a mile, lies off the south-pnd side of the Island of Cape Bremon, and previously to the election of a Light House thereupon, was the scene of frequent and many most disastrous thipwrecks. Between the lsland and the main is a channel known to coasters as the Tickel, the width, very nearly two, or quite two miles, and the water of sufficient dept to make it a convenient and safe paseage for the coal-droghers, who, b taking it, are enabled to avoid the generally rough seas which they woulc have to encounter. in donbling the south east point of Scattari. This island is one continuous barrea rock, covered with a stunted growth of dwarfish fir and heather; it is the resort of vast flocks of the Plover species and curlew. In their annual migrations southward, nunerous companies of the Eider Duck also resort to its shores, and supply the few resident fishermen with abundance of wholesone and nutricions food. Connected with the Light Honse is a humane provision to meet the contingency of a wreck upon the shores of the Island. The present Light House Keeper, Mr. Dodd, is, by report, an energetic man, well adapted to the perilous duties which he is called upon to perform.

## ST. PAUL'S ISLAND

Lies in the mouth of, and directly in the track of ships bound up and down, the Gulf of St . Lawrence. It is wonderful therefore that, many and fatal as have been the wrecks upan its precipitous clifis, they have not bern still more numerons. It is only of comparatively recent date that a Light House has been erected upon one of its most promineat points. Here, as on Scattari, humane provision is made by the Government for the contingency of any wreck oceuring at a seazon when the survivors may possibly be detained long upon the Island. It has been contemplated to build a break-water at some point on its most sheltered side. The project has been pronounced ly competent Judges quite practicable; its desirabieness admits of no question At present its iron bound shore, upon which the surges of the Allantic and the Gulf, in tempestuous weather, beat and break with irresistable fury, is altogether unapproaccable; ad the unhappy bark that is driven upon them is apprised of unavoidable destruction, with little hope of escape for her crew.

The Island affords little or no material shelter for man or brute, being one continuous tald and barren rock, covered with short herbage and braubles which nature has forced, in the heat of midsummer, into slow vegetation In the neighbourhood are some of the most prolific Cod Banks, and, could certain shelter for boats be had, a profitable fishéry might be carried on fioti this now inhospitable rock.

## Railway from Halifax to Quebec and Portland.

## CHRONICLE OF OCCURRENCES.

March 27th, 1850-The Legislative Council by address to the Lieut. Goveruor, request that the attention of H. M. Govermnent may be called to the subject of the proposed Railway from Halifax to Quebec, as in undertaking of great importance to the welfare and prosperity of the Province, and that all constitutional $m$ ans may be used to expedite its commencement.

Oct. 20th, 1850-Sir John Harvey, in a despatch introducing to Earl Grey the Hon. Joseph Howe, requests that facilities may be afforded to that gentleman, as the Delegate of the government of Nova Scotia, for bringing under the consideration of H. M. Goverument, the views of the Provincial authorities, ou the subject of the proposed Railway, for obtaining the necessary funds for the execution of this work, either from capitalists or H. M. Government.
Nov. 25 th, 1850 -Mr. Howe places before Earl Grey, at his Lordship's request, in official torm, a full and forcible statement of the arguments on which, as representing Nova Scotia, he rests his application for the guarantee of the Imperial government; and, in a further communication dated January $6 \mathrm{th}, 1851$, claims that guarantee, on (amongst other grounds) the interest which the Mother Country has in the elevation of North America-the increase of her population-the developement of her resources-the occupation of her wild lands-the extension of her commerce and of her means of easy internal and external communication.
Jan. 23rd, 1851-Sir John Harvey informs the Legislature of Nova Scotia, that the negotiations with the Imperial Government being still pending, he is not prepared to submit any measure with reference to the proposed Railway.
April 4th, 1851--The Assembly pass a Resolution postponing all Legislative proceedings in relation to the Railway, until the return of the Hon. Mr. Howe from London, and intimate their readiness to meet again in Parliament if necessary, at an early period to give their best consideration to the subject.
Mr. Hawes in a commnnication to Mr. Howe, dated 10th March 1851, communicates the decision on his application, to the effect that H. M. Gov't are prepared to recommend to Parliament that the guarantee be granted, or the money required for the Halifax and Quebec Railway, advanced from the British Treasury on certain specified conditions, requiring the concurrence of the Provinces of Canada, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and despatches to the same effect are addressed to the Governors of the respective Colonies, in which it is suggested that a deputation from the Executive Councils of the two Lower Provinces should proceed to the seat of Government in Cazada, for the purpose of agreeing on a measure to be submitted for the approval of the several Provinces and the sanction of the Imperial Parliament.
March 14th, 1851-Earl Grey transmits to the Governor General, and to the Lieut. Governors of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, the correspondence with Mr. Howe; and communicates the decision of H. M. Government; and suggests that a Conference be held at the seat of government in Canada for the purpose of making an agreement, to be approved by the Legislatures of the several Proviaces, and submitted fur the sanction of the Imperial parliament. Mr. Howe, in a Report made for the information of the Gov't of Nova Scotia, dated 4th April, 1851, states that the money required for the construction of the undertaking by Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick wilt be advanced from the British Treasury on the most favorable termsadmitting of the repayment of the whole in 22 years at the rate of $6 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent per annum for principal and interest,
June $1850-\mathrm{Mr}$. Howe, having been deputed on the part of Nova Scotia, to attend the proposed conference at Toronto, proceeds thither, via New Brunswick, inviting public discussion on his route; and, after having addressed several large meetings in that Province, and received the strongest assurances of support and co-o eration there, succeeds in removing objections which had been entertained to this project by a large and influential portion of the inhabitants.
June 21 st, 1851--Igreeably to the suggestion of Earl Grey, a conference is held at Toronto, attended by the Honourable Joseph Ilowe from
