



PEOPLE OF NOTE



George Ade, the newspaper man, whose "Fables in Slang" have made him both rich and famous, was born at Kentland, Ind., on February 9, 1866. He is a graduate of Perdue University, taking his degree in 1887. Ade went to Chicago and entered into journalism. He was on the Record from 1890 until 1900, when he left regular work to give his entire time to the writing of plays. His "Sultan of Sulu" made a tremendous hit, as did also his show "The Sho-Gun." Ade's best work, although perhaps not the best from a financial standpoint, has been in his stories of Hoosier life. Ade lives most of the time on a splendid farm, called Hazelden, near Brook, Ind.
