ON THE SKID OF

Speaker Before Toronto Canadian Club Makes an Arraignment of Canadian Politicians.

"I stood in a hotel some time ago whilst a lady was signing the register, and at the same time I heard a torrent of the foulest oaths I ever had to listen to, oaths and blasphemies proceeding from some members of the house of commons. So long as we allow that to go on so long will we as we allow that to go on so long will we be on the greased skid of destruction."
George Tate Blakstock, K. C., made this remark in the course of an address delivered yesterday before the Canadian Club on "Some Tendencies."
"Democracy works better in Great Britain than in any other country on the earth because it is an evolution, and the old grandee system which governed at one

earth because it is an evolution, and the old grandee system which governed at one time has been broadened out and has become democratic, and you have an aristocratic governing body, while at the same time that body is in constant touch with the democracy." He proceeded to point out how the house of lords, although aristocratic, was yet democratic, because the poorest boy might by industry, perseverance and ability rise to a seat in that high body, and many had so risen.

In the United States the government was probably less liable to sudden gusts of influence by the populace than even that of Canada, because the various States rights were well defined.
