Wingston, Ja., April 9—A proposal was submitted in the legislative council yesterday for representation of Jamaic a at a conference to be held at Ottawa next month to consider trade relations and transport facilities between the Dominion of Canada and the British West Indies.

The entire West Indies will be represented at the conference and an effort will be made to deflect a large portion of the West Indies trade with the United States to Canada. To this end a special tariff law will be formulated, the Jamaican government giving preference on Canadian goods coming here.

PURE VEGETABLE

Butter Coloring For Coloring Winter Butter and Oleomargarine

DIRECTIONS FOR USE: Put the butter or oleomargarine in a bowl and drop on it for each pound ten drops from the bottle of coloring. If using the capsules, pierce one of these and squeeze contents over the butter. Work the butter with a spoon (a large wooden one is best), mixing color in thoroughly, and in a minute you will find it the color of June grass butter. Do not heat the butter before mixing; but if it is left in a warm room for a while before mixing it will color more easily.

Nearly all butter made in the winter time is colored in this way when it is made. This color, which is the same as that used by the creameries, is purely vegetable and contains no harmful ingredients.





An Able Speech.

An excellent speech was given upon the resumption of the debate in the afternoon by Mr. Borodage of Kent. BY ARTIFICIAL BLOOD PALE, SALLOW

London, April 8—Another remarkable achievement by Allied surgeons in the war is described in an article by Prof. W. M. Bayliss, F. B. S., in Nature, in which he tells how a mixture of salt, water and gum was injected into the blood-emptied veins of men to give the heart something to work with until idle blood returned to its duty.

The treatment was used in cases which before the war were unknown to medical science. They were cases where soldiers had not lost any considerable amount of blood through wounds, and yet they had very little blood in their arteries and veins, and sometimes scarcely any. At first doctors and surgeons were puzzled. They did not know what had happened.

Prof. Bayliss explains that the blood had gone out of circulation, into the capillaries, the minute vessels connecting the arteries and the veins. These had "pooled" the blood, leaving the heart to labor on with a seriously reduced supply. In some cases the blood had forced its way out of the capillaries and leaked into the body. The cause is believed to be a kind of chemical poisoning due to a compound formed in injured tissues and known as "histamine."

The new treatment was used in the British and French armies. Many cures were ascribed to it.





land the professional gangster in jail, but there is no way to reform the professional reformer.

The professional politician makes a business—a personally profitable one—out, of politics; the professional reformer makes a mess out of it. Besides, he talks more. Hope of good government does not lie with either, but both are worthy of respect beside the what's-the-user—especially the gangster. He never asks "what's the use?" He values his vote so highly that if he is offered the chance he will vote twice. He can give the answer to "What's the use" down to a decimal point, and that is something the majority of those who vote against him cannot do. Voting is the master key that opens the door to the what's-the-user's factory, office and safe. That is the use and the gangster uses it for precisely that purpose.

Non-voters and men who vote conscientiously at the wrong time and without paying any attention to the right preliminaries are the ones who howl loudest about fool and class legislation, unscientific and confiscatory taxation, incompetence, waste and graft. In their private business they look ahead, study fundamental conditions, plan, organize, hire and fire with a ruthless regard for results. MORE SHIPS YET TO BE HANDED OVER BY HUNS

Six Battleships, Several Light Cruisers, Some Torpedo Boat Destroyers and Submarines.

London, April 9-The surrender of the emainder of German warships under the terms of the treaty of Versailles started on Wednesday when the battle-ships Nassau and Ostfriesland arrived at the Firth of Forth, in tow of German naval vessels. The Nassau, which has been allocated to Japan, is of the dreadnaught class, displacing 18,000 tons. The Ostfriesland, allocated to the United States, is also of the dreadnaught class, displacing 22,000 tons.

The Baden, a new battleship of 28,000 tons, which the Germans tried to scuttle in Scapa Flow, is now in British hands, and has been permanently allocated to Great Britain.

The arrival of the Nassau and Ost-

Great Britain.

The arrival of the Nassau and Ostfriesland marks the first delivery of German naval vessels since the Scapa Flow incident. The opinion was expressed at the British admiralty that the delivery of the remainder of the German vessels which are to be surrendered will now proceed speedily, as there is satisfaction that Germany intends to carry out this provision of the treaty without further aniphling.

Right at the heart of the city's progress and prosperity strikes the new Paving Bill sent to the legislature by the common council and which should be killed by the vote of the people on Monday for the following reasons:

1. It is Wrong in Principle: Streets used by the people of the city as a whole should be maintained by the people as a whole as are the schools, fire, police and other public services.

2. It Departs from Precedent: Already eight miles of permanent pavement have been laid and charged to general assessment, and why should a group of property owners in these streets seek to impose the burden of paving remaining streets of the city

on the abutters in these streets.

3. It Impedes Progress: Home building and expansion of industrial properties will be penalized by the special abutter's tax which is to be imposed at will of the common council on any street of the city.

4. It is Unworkable in Practice:

Widows and the small property owners whose main income is derived from rentals, will find it impossible to make their property pay the increased tax of at least \$600 to \$1,000 on a 40-foot frontage and the city will be obliged to take over these properties or dis-tribute the cost over the remainder of the street, making the burden unbearable.

5. It Increases Rentals Out of All Reason: When the special tax is applied, the land-lord must look to the tenant, and on an average house it must mean an extra \$75 to \$100 a year. And this is in addition to what must be added to the constantly increasing scale of prices and rentals.

6. It is Inequitable in the Extreme:

Under the proposed bill the owner of a house worth \$2,000 would have to pay as much per foot frontage as owner of the most valuable house on the street. Therefore the law is unfair to the poor man and favors the rich, while under general assessment every man pays in accordance with his means.

7. It is Altogether Unnecessary: The present Local Improvement By-law makes ample provision for abutters sharing in the cost of paving residential streets.
