Wilson Backs The Garfield Order

Washington, Jan. 18—America felt the pinch of war, perhaps for the first time, today with its industries idle under the fuel administration's order issued to relieve the coal shortage and release fuel for ships loaded with supplies for the American army and the Allies.

It was stated officially early today that President Wilson is not even considering interfering with the fuel restriction order, and feels that the country

will be satisfied with the necessity for it.

From the flood of applications for exemptions piling in, it appeared that steel plate mills and woollen plants ma king clothes for soldiers' uniforms would receive favorable action, probably being added to the list of exempted works. All the principal munitions plants will be permitted to work at full ca-pacity under the fuel restriction order. As announced last night only portions of

Bernhard continues to argue that the chancellor appears to have withered the answer both from the Reichstag leaders and from the main committee, with whom he had conferred, and that nothing was more significant of the role the Reichstag was supposed to play: "Will the Reichstag play this role?"

Winnipeg, Jan. 18—The third session of the fifteenth legislature of Manitoba was opened yesterday afternoon by Sir James Alkins, lleutenant-governor.
