#### REPRODUCE ROSE GARDEN OF EMPRESS JOSEPHINE

nteresting Experiment at Chauteau of Malmaison - Nearly 200

Paris, July 1- An interesting expe Malmaison, where the famous garden of coses of the Empress Josephine has been reconstituted. The garden was recently pened to visits from the public and 198 varieties of roses were seen in full bloom just as they are supposed to have been in the Empress Josephine's famous garden. It is known that she had a particular fancy for roses, and went to lavish expense to have the finest garden or rose in her day. They were catalogued by M de Mirbel in the year twelve of the revolution, as the accounts state, but the catalogue, which contained the names of more than 200 varieties, has been lost.

M. Jean Ajalbert, curator of the chateat and museum, assisted by M. Jules Graver eaux and helped by the funds contributed by a generous American, has succeeded in reconstituting most of the varieties of Gravereaux, in searching through the records, found still extant 198 varieties or roses which could be identified as those that had been cultivated under the direction of the Empress Josephine. Specimens have been brought from all over France for the last two years and planted in the beds exactly where they were sup posed to be flourishing 100 years ago.

M. Eugene Touchet helped to plan the garden in the valley of the ancient park Most of the roses are trimmed as trees with a single stem, and are now in full bloom. They are labelled with the same names that the Empress Josephine gave them, and some of these names may be translated as follows: "The Loving Sweet heart," "The Tender Beauty," "The Pret ty Sultana," "The Blaze of Love," "The Virgin Parma," "The Great Napoleon." nt has been made at the Chateau almaison, where the famous garden
