Newport, Monmouthshire, England, Aug. 22—(Canadian Press)—There was a recurrence last night, at Tredgar, of the unaccountable anti-Jewish riots which broke out on Saturday night, in which eighteen Jewish shops were wrecked and looted by a savage mob.

The trouble spread to Ebbvale and Rhymney, where Jewish shops also were wrecked. Thirty persons were injured in baton charges by the police.

It is understood that the house is also fully covered but Mr. O'Neil was absent from the city today and the amount could not be ascertained.

The firemen did good work in saving the adjoining buildings from the flames. The house was practically gutted, although most of the damage on the ground floor was done by the smoke and water.


