UNION STREET FIRE

Early Morning Blaze in Boarding House Also Causes Damage in Two Stores

About 3 o'clock this morning fire broke out in the two-story house in Union street owned by P. M. O'Neill and occupied by Mrs. Wallace who kept a boarding house. On the ground floor there are three rooms, one occupied by H. McCarthy as a barber shop, and the other a shoe shining store kept by Samuel Kennedy, a Greek. The fire apparently started in the attic of the house as the roof was practically destroyed.

The blaze was first seen by one of the boarders who was awakened by the thick smoke and the crackle of burning wood. On going to the attic door he found the place on fire. He quickly aroused the other occupants of the house, and they, in their night clothes, Mrs. Wallace had been ill and had to be assisted out of the house. She was taken to a boarding house opposite.

The loss is nearly all covered by insurance, although Mr. Kennedy's loss will likely amount to about \$1,000 as he had a heavy stock and had no insurance. Mr. McCarthy was insured for \$500 with Messrs. Weldon & McLean and Mrs. Wallace carried \$500 with J. M. & C. W. Hope Grant, on her furniture. It is understood that the house is also fully covered but Mr. O'Neill was absent from the city today and the amount could not be ascertained.

The firemen did good work in saving the adjoining buildings from the flames. The house was practically gutted, although most of the damage on the ground floor was done by the smoke and water.

DEATH OF FREDERICK O. BROWN

Much regret was expressed in the north end this morning when it became known that a well known young man, Frederick Osborne Brown, had passed away, after a lingering illness in which he suffered considerably. He was twenty-one years of age and had a wide circle of friends, being very popular and a disposition to make and retain friends. He had been confined to the house for some time and his death was not unexpected. He was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Brown of Holly street, and besides his parents is survived by his sister, Miss May, at home. He was a popular member of the Alexandra Temple of Honor, in which he enjoyed the esteem and respect of his brother members. The funeral will take place from his late home, 37 Holly street, tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock to Cedar Hill cemetery.

OPEN SWITCH TAKES TRAIN INTO TROUBLE

Night Suburban Passengers in Collision Near Island Yard—Train Runs Into Siding and Bumps Freight Cars

An open switch connecting the main line of the I. C. R. with the siding of the I. C. Crosby Co., last evening caused excitement among the 11 o'clock suburban passengers going to their summer homes, for the train which was well filled with people, speeded on to the siding, there and ran into a line of flat cars on which a crew of men were unloading freight. One of the women passengers, Miss Josie Allen, was rendered unconscious and suffered a slight concussion while some men in the smoking car were quite severely shaken up and considerable damage was done to the freight cars, two box cars being knocked.

It was said to be a wonder that more serious results had not followed. The train was going along at a lively clip, when suddenly it swerved from the main line, and sprung over the rails of the siding, on which stood the line of freight cars, almost all of them loaded with mixed freight, molasses or lumber. The crew of men working upon them, on hearing the sharp rattle of alarm from the whistle, were able to jump to safety in time.

The passengers aboard the train heartily commended the prompt action of the engineer in bringing the train to a stop, as well for had he not done so the consequences might have been serious. As it was Miss Allen's mobility injured and medical assistance was needed to revive her, Dr. W. B. McVey working with her in the baggage car to which had been removed, until she was restored to consciousness. She was taken to Fair Yale where she was going on the train. Col. C. W. Jones gave Dr. McVey valuable assistance.

In the smoking compartment men were chatting when they heard the warning note from the engine's whistle followed almost immediately by the crashing into the freight cars. Dr. McVey, Sterling Lordly and F. E. Driscoll were shaken up and received some scratches about the face. Dr. McVey, however, forgot his injuries for the time being, and went to the aid of Miss Allen, who had been thrown violently against the opposite side of a car, hitting her head and shoulders. The midnight express was halted near by on the main line and the passengers were transferred to it and conveyed to their homes.

HIS WIFE DEAD BUT A FEW HOURS, HE IS ARRESTED IN PARK

Patrick Mahoney and Mary Walsh Given Heavy Sentences in Police Court—Two Others Remanded

In the police court this morning four prisoners—two men and two women—were severely punished by the court. Patrick Mahoney and Mary Walsh, arrested yesterday afternoon in Rockwood Park by Mounted Policeman McLeod and charged with being drunk, indecent and resisting the police pleaded guilty to the drunkenness charge, but denied the others. The policeman gave evidence and His Honor gave both prisoners a reprimand and sentenced Mahoney to one year in jail with hard labor—\$5 or two months on the drunkenness charge and \$50 or ten months in jail on the others. The Walsh woman was sentenced to two years in the Good Shepherd's Home. Both prisoners are between fifty and sixty years of age. Mahoney's wife died only yesterday morning. The other two prisoners were John Leary and Miss Boyd who were charged with being drunk in the Old Burying ground. They were remanded. The court told the boys' woman that she was very likely to get a sentence of nine months in jail as she had been out only about a month. Her husband is also serving a term for drunkenness.

The water supply on the north side of King Square shut off this morning at 8 o'clock and will be off for the rest of the day. They were given notice by the water department officials yesterday to lay in a supply for their use today. The work will be rushed and it is expected that the job will be completed sometime this afternoon.
