

A recent Kingston, Jamaica, despatch says:

A high legal authority of the crewn said to-day:

The conditions of modern warfare are so The conditions of modern warfare are so changed that the old rules will require an application more particularly to existing circumstances than on hard and fixed lines.

Great Britain will observe and enforce the principles of the neutral and commit no act favoring the belligerents. As and of the neutral to restrain the act as a common to act.

It is incumbent on the belligerents to respect the severeignty of the neutral duty, and of the neutral to restrain the use of its

and of the neutral to restrain the use of its territory for beligerent purposes.

Hostilities will not be permitted within the three-mile limit of Jamaica, and any Spanish ship so captured could claim the hospitality of Great Britain, delivery up and damages. If, however, the capture was resisted, no redress would lie, the resistance being a violation of sovereignty.

Vessels of the United States and Spain in distress could call at the port of Jamaica and obtain coal and provisions and sufficient repairs to reach the nearest port of the nationality of the distressed vessel.

Coal is contraband if for the immediate or ultimate use of one belligerent against 4.29, 98,

Great Britain will take the view of the treaty of Washington, that a vessel armed but not commissioned and carrying merely a navigating crew could be taken by a hostile commander into a neutral port, to be held by either belligerent, without a violation of neutrality. It would be considered a mercantile act without hostile intent.

Great Britain would follow the Webster principles in regard to raising loans to belligerents, enunciated in the war of Mexico and Texas. Legally the United States and Spain are not bound by the treaty of Paris, and if Spain should seize American goods on English ships Great Britain will object and force Spain to recognize the principle of the declaration of Paris in regard to free ships and free goods.


