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
ST. PETERSBURG, March 16.—Har-rowing accounts continue to be pub-lished of the terrible distress prevail-ing in the districts affected by the

ing in the districts affected by the famine. A letter from a rural judge in the district of Menselinsk, Government of Ufa, depicts the suffering of which he is an eyewitness. He says that, owing to its scarcity, the supply of rye flour has now frequently to be mixed with acorn meal, and that even the latter is difficult to obtain. A crowd of hun-gry people is besleging the Judge from morning until night at his official resi-dence, and similar scenes may be wit-nessed at the offices of the communal authorities. Some of these people are actually forcing their way into his apartments begging for or demanding food. There have been cases of child ren being brought into his office by parents, who said to him: "Feed them yourself, we do not want them to die before our eyes."
