On Wednesday Evening, June 9, 1852.

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REPORT.

THE Committee of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Wesleyan Missionary Society, in presenting their Annual Report, rejoice in the assurances which are afforded that the Divine Blessing largely and unfailingly rests upon the Missionary enterprise. The Wesleyan Missionary Society, in its widely-extended operations in every quarter of the globe, in common with the various other Evangelical Missionary Associations of the age, continues to advance with untiring and undaunted tread in her aggressive march against the powers of sin and hell, pushing forward the victories of the Cross, and multiplying the triumphs of redeeming grace. Nor is it among the least encouraging signs of the times, amidst the fierce opposition of wicked men in other lands, envious at the success of our great Institution, and who are crying, "Rase it, rase it, even to the foundations thereof," that the Lord is still disposing His people to sustain this His own Cause, by their deep sympathy, their earnest prayers, and their liberal contributions; and although within the boundaries of this Auxiliary we are unable to boast of those numerous instances of large-hearted philanthropy, or of that glowing zeal in the work of a world's evangelization by which our Church in the parent-land is distinguished; yet indications are not wanting that our people in these Provinces are coming up to a more just appreciation of duty in relation to Christian Missions, and to the cultivation of a more enlarged liberality of sentiment and action, which will, we doubt not, ere long be manifested to an extent in some good degree worthy of this great and holy cause.

It will be seen that the total amount of subscriptions from the various Branches of this Auxiliary for the past year, is rather in advance of the year preceding; and for the disposition to support this department of the work of the Lord, the Committee offer to the Author of all good their devout acknowledgments, while they commend anew the interests of the Society to the liberal consideration and support of the Christian public.

It will be highly encouraging to the friends of Missions to learn that the recent Anniversary of the Parent Society, was an occasion of more than ordinary interest and profit, affording continued evidence that the Missionary work is the work of God—that the Lord of Hosts is eminently with the Society, and greatly honouring His servants for His own Name's sake.

The various Missions of the Society will now be briefly reviewed in the usual order.

IRELAND.

In Ireland, twenty-one Missionaries are steadily pursuing their toilsome course, and notwithstanding varied and multiplied discouragements, find ample reason to believe that their labour is not in vain in the Lord. The language employed by one of them, in his Annual Report, might be appropriately used by all. "Emigration and removals have thinned our ranks, but indications of good present themselves in many places; and in the name of our God, we will still lift up our banner." In the present state of that interesting country, the staff of labourers might be considerably increased, with the prospect of great usefulness. The extensive Mission of Lucan and Trim, which may be regarded as a fair sample of the whole, is a field which invites diligent culture. Our cause in some of the towns has not been in a better state at any former period. The members generally are growing in grace, and in divine knowledge. The congregations are regular in their attendance, and all seem to feel a deeper interest in the cause of Christ.

The Day Schools are 62 in number, and contain upwards of 3,700 scholars. "Of the good that these Schools are effecting," writes the General Superintendent, "*mentally, morally, and spiritually*, the half cannot be told." These Missions and Scholars are additional to the Society's Schools and Ministers belonging to the regular establishments of the Wesleyan Connexion in Ireland.

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GERMANY.

Gratifying intelligence has been received as to the growing prosperity of the Society's Mission in *Germany*. The number of Mr. Muller's fellow labourers has increased during the year from sixteen to twenty, all of whom are zealously engaged in conducting and extending the operations of the Mission. Many hundreds of persons are regularly enjoying the advantages of religious services, and considerably upwards of 1000 have been admitted to the privileges of Church membership.

Recent advices from Mr. Muller state, that the number of Preaching Stations occupied by him and his assistants is about sixty-seven, and that the condition of the Societies displays encouraging features; but owing to the political circumstances of the Country, the last year has been one of trial and difficulty.

FRANCE AND SWITZERLAND.

Both the English and French Departments of the work at *Paris*, present many encouraging indications. A small addition has been made to the number of the Societies, which, under the circumstances of the past year, affords no small cause for gratifying reflection. At *Calais*, likewise, appearances are favourable. In the French Department there is an increase in the congregations. The English Congregation has lately received a gracious visitation.—From *Bar-le-duc* the Report is highly encouraging. The congregations are good, the hearers serious and attentive; some who were formerly Romanists, have been converted to God; the Protestant youths are stirred up to acquire Biblical information, and other useful knowledge, and are providing Libraries, for themselves by dint of economy. At *Joinville*, the cause is rising in importance, and seven persons have during the year abandoned the Church of Rome. The extensive and important Circuit of *Nismes* has yielded great satisfaction to those who have had the charge of it. The late political commotions have not been permitted to shake the steadfastness of our Societies, and not one member of them has been implicated in insurrectionary movements. A gracious revival has been granted to *Vauvert*, a town about ten miles from *Nismes*. At *Cevennes* the Spirit of God has been poured out, and several have been converted. Prejudice has yielded to better feelings in the public mind, and there is reason to believe that the free access which the Missionaries now have to the Protestant population, will produce very beneficial results.

From the *Higher Alps* the question is urged, "How can one solitary labourer suffice for these multiplied labours and open doors of usefulness?" At *Lausanne* and *Aigle*, the Schools are well attended, and through the children some access is had to the parents. In the *Valleys of Piedmont*, the Missionary has been once more received with the same kindness and affection as formerly.

SPAIN.

The work in *Spain* has two departments, the English and the Spanish. Concerning the former, Mr. Cheesbrough states that the Congregations have gradually improved, and now present a very gratifying and encouraging spectacle. Thirty new members have during the past year been added to the Society; and the attendance of the military on the Sunday Evening Service shows that they take an interest in the word preached. Another house has been opened for Spanish preaching, in which a good number of persons have,

at various times during the year, heard the Gospel in their own tongue. The Schools contain almost as many children as the premises will accommodate, and of the total number of children in attendance more than two-thirds are Spaniards and of Roman Catholic parents.

INDIA.

In India our Missionaries are devoting their energies to their sacred work, laying wide the foundations of the Christian Church, and deepening the impression already made on many followers of Budhu and Devil-worshippers in that heathen Country. Mr. Rippon, the Missionary on the Galle station, South Ceylon, writes as follows:—

My Circuit embraces about half of the Southern province, and extends along a densely populated sea-coast for thirty-five miles; and as far into the Jungle as the imagination can reach, for unfortunately this is the only means I have at present for penetrating there! The people are *in theory* all Buddhists—in practice, all Devil Worshipers. Within four miles of my house there are sixteen Buddhist Temples. In one of these alone there are thirty priests! The whole number of priests in this Circuit is perhaps five-hundred. It is "not by (*human*) might nor by power" that we can prevail against such a host as this! Frequently in the dead of the night I hear the music from the devil dances in the neighbourhood. I have attended these midnight orgies; and it is only by doing so that any person can form an idea of the strength with which this superstition binds down an otherwise acute, ingenious, and intelligent people. Never did a Christian congregation in England listen with more unbroken silence; nor an audience in Exeter Hall hang with more complete absorption of soul on the lips of its most chosen speakers, than these people do on the frantic gestures, and hideous yellings, and senseless incantations of the Devil Priest. To their conceptions, he is penetrating the invisible world, and communing with spirits. His ascendancy over their minds is complete. He is the great intercessor between Devils and men, for the removal of all evil, and bestowment of all good; for the Devil is still the same liar who said of old, "all these things will I give thee, if thou wilt fall down and worship me!" Without the priests nothing can be done.

But on the whole, our prospect is hopeful. Our movements against Buddhism and Devil Worship are on a comprehensive scale, and we have manifest tokens of the presence and blessing of God on our labours. Impressions are widely scattered,—the Gospel seed is sown in many hearts to grow in secret for a time,—convictions are produced,—and souls are saved. It is a cheering fact to my mind that we have had an increase of at least one English member every class-meeting since Christmas; so that I have been obliged to form a new class, which now contains thirteen members. May these be but the droppings before the shower! Seeing that the Conference has placed me over a District containing, at least one hundred thousand souls, I cannot rest satisfied with *ones*, nor with *hundreds*. If, in the course of my life, I should not accomplish all my heart desires, and all the Missionary Committee expects, let it only be remembered that in this vast population I stand *alone*. The most available portion of the Circuit for Missionary effort is within a circle of four miles round my dwelling: but even this contains one hundred and seventy villages, and there are jungle districts where I fear the foot of a Missionary must not tread for years to come.

The Missionary at Royapettah, Madras District, reports as follows:—During the year twenty-eight natives have been received into the Christian Church.

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Michael, who is thirty years of age, by profession a doctor, and learned in Hindu mythology has become a willing disciple in the school of Christ, and exhibits a becoming zeal for the salvation of those around him. His mother and sister are also preparing for baptism. Five Romanists, after proper training, have been received into the congregation at Royapettah. The distinguished feature of the English cause in Blacktown is a gracious work among the younger members of the congregation. In the English Sabbath School the children number eighty-two, and the teachers thirteen. In *Negapatam* the congregations have increased in number, and the attention of the people to the great truths delivered has been very cheering. The Missionaries at *Manargoody* have received frequent visits from respectable natives with whom they have conversed on the things of the kingdom of God, and have been surprised to learn the extent to which the opinion prevails in Hindu Society, that their religion will be overthrown and demolished, and Christianity will be universally established. The Schools, male and female, are in an encouraging state.

In Continental India and Ceylon the Society has 32 Missionaries and Native Ministers; 32 Catechists, 164 Day School Teachers, 6,000 Scholars, about 16,000 persons under the teaching of the Missionaries, 2,000 of whom are accredited Church Members.

The Committee would rejoice to add to the strength of the India Missions, were the means of doing so placed at their disposal, but no increase of Missionaries or augmentation of native and other agencies can be effected without the appropriation of Funds for that special purpose. The Committee indulge the hope that this state of things will not long continue. They anticipate that the advancing knowledge concerning India, as the largest open field for Missions among the Heathen in the whole world, and as the key to the other vast empires of the East, will have an accelerating effect, and lead to larger liberality and more devoted enterprize.

AUSTRALASIA AND POLYNESIA.

The Reports received from Australia and Polynesia are of the most gratifying description. Everywhere the Word of the Lord has free course. The last Meeting the N. S. Wales District held at *Sydney* states, "The whole country is open to us, and new Stations may be formed as fast as our means will allow." Since that Meeting was held, the Colony has been placed in a new position by the discovery of immense Gold Fields, which appear to be both larger and richer than was at first supposed. The effect of this discovery upon the pursuits, tastes, and habits of the population may easily be imagined. It has brought a day of severe trial upon the Churches, in which they will need large and constant supplies of grace to enable them to hold fast and adorn their profession; and in which they and their Ministers have a strong claim upon the sympathy and prayers of the Church at large.

The conduct of the members of our Societies, among the miners at Bathurst, was generally consistent and creditable; and the Government, considering the destitute circumstances in which the gold-seekers were likely to be placed, in regard to religious instruction, had determined to provide a certain number of Ministers for the Diggings, at the public expense, and two Methodist Ministers were so employed.—Eight out of the thirteen Circuits in the Province of *New South Wales* have, during the year, entirely defrayed their own expenses, and brought no charge upon the funds of the Society.

In the Province of *South Australia*, the affairs of the Society wear an equally encouraging aspect. The statistics show an increase in almost every item in the Account, beginning with twelve Chapels, built during the year, in addition to a large new Chapel in course of erection at *Adelaide*. At *Kapunda* about 40 members had been added to the Church,—the same number at *Reedy Creek*,—and at *Gawler River*, *Willunga*, and other places. revivals and conversions had taken place.

To the Committee these tidings are peculiarly seasonable and encouraging, when regarded in connexion with the steps proposed to be taken towards placing these important colonies in a position toward the Society, differing widely from that which they have hitherto occupied. Arrangements are about being made whereby those Missions it is hoped, within a few years, may be rendered self-supporting, and be left, under the general supervision of the Committee, to manage their own local affairs; at the same time affording a guarantee for the maintenance of our great doctrinal and disciplinary principles, and securing the union of our Church in those Colonies with the Conference and Committee, as an affiliated branch of the Wesleyan Connexion. It is believed that such arrangements will greatly relieve the Committee, and tend also to the extension and consolidation of the work in that very important field of labour.

The state and prospects of our Missions in *New Zealand* are such as to demand gratitude, and to excite hope. "Scriptural Christianity," writes Mr. Lawry, "has taken deep root in the native mind, and is generally received throughout the length and breadth of the land." Very few remain in heathenism. Popery makes no perceptible progress among the Natives, as, by God's mercy, the Holy Scriptures were in the hands of the people before the Romish Priests arrived. Almost all the aboriginal families throughout *New Zealand* read the Scriptures, and pray together both morning and evening. As a population, they have a high sense of justice, and, generally, they adhere to the truth: this is the more remarkable, as the very opposite was their character before the Missionaries arrived among them.

Letters from *Auckland* show a steady gradual advancement of all the interests with which the Missionaries there are identified. Three additional places of worship have been opened in the town; the Society increases; and the rising villages around are visited and supplied with Christian ordinances. A Day-school is taught on the Chapel premises. The School for the children of Missionaries and other respectable inhabitants contains nearly seventy children. The Native Institution, at the Three Kings, continues to excite admiration and gratitude. Its admirable adaptation to the wants of the people, and the skill, energy, and patience with which it is conducted, have secured the countenance and liberal assistance of the Governor, who has authorized an expenditure of £600 for the enlargement of the School-buildings.

In the *Friendly Islands*, the good cause is making steady progress.

At *Tonga*, many have renounced heathenism during the last two years, and more than 100 members have been added to the Society, among whom is the great chief *Tungi*. At *Habai*, more has been done by the people for the support and spread of the Gospel than at any former period. A Missionary Meeting has been held at *Lifuka*, at which more than £20 was subscribed in money and produce.

The interesting Mission in *Feejee* continues to prosper. Every department of the work has increased, and in such a manner as to afford a reasonable hope of future prosperity.

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The printing press has this year sent forth the first Grammar in the Feejeean Tongue. A Feejee and English Dictionary is also in preparation. Three thousand copies of a short Memoir of the late Rev. John Hunt have also been printed. In the *Lakemba* Circuit it is reported that books are "purchased with avidity." The School Report shows an increase of upwards of 400 scholars. Several adults have learned to read the New Testament, and the sacred volume is much prized. The state of the societies, generally speaking, affords equal gratification. In *Lakemba*, every town is Christian by profession. The out-stations of this Circuit are favourably reported. An increasing desire for the Word of God is observable, and nearly every member who can read possesses a copy of the New Testament. Later intelligence affords additional reasons for gratitude and encouragement. From *Lakemba*, Mr. Malverna states that, nearly two-thirds of the adult population of that island are members of Society, and that about 800 children are under Christian instruction.

Great are the triumphs obtained by the Gospel throughout these islands. To use the language of the Missionaries, "the Redeemer seems to have claimed Feejee for His own." "We have come up," say they, "to take possession of the whole of these islands in the name of the Lord." May God speed them in their holy enterprise.

SOUTHERN AFRICA.

The greatly disturbed state of *Southern Africa* during the past two years has operated very injuriously upon some of the Missions in those important Districts. There is, however, much cause for thankfulness to the Lord of all, for His special goodness displayed unto His faithful servants and their flocks exposed to peril. At *Cape Town* the general state of the Society is such as to yield satisfaction and encouragement to the Missionary in charge of the Station. At *Rondebosch*, a "neat and commodious Chapel" is occupied by "a devout and respectable Congregation." At the *Diepe River* the Congregation has nearly doubled. At *Simon's Town* the uniform piety of our members, the large and increasing Sabbath Congregations, and the good attendance at the various week-night services, together with a few additions to the Society, call for grateful acknowledgments. A small increase in members and scholars has taken place at *Stellenbosch*; and also at *Somerset West*. At *Khamies-Berg* the Sabbath Congregations were never better, and a greater number than usual have attended the Schools. The Out-Stations are in an encouraging state.

The events of the last year have invested the *Albany* and *Kafraria* District with a painful notoriety, and continue to receive a large share of public attention. War has prevailed without cessation; and on many of the Stations the results have been disastrous. Notwithstanding the causes of regret which present themselves, two facts call loudly for gratitude to God. The first is, that there has been no loss of Missionary life, or desertion of duty on the part of the Missionaries; but amidst many alarms, and much real danger, every man has stood to his post as long as possible. In no case, as far as the Committee is informed or has reason to believe, has there been any cowardly shrinking from the path of duty, any unworthy preference of private and personal over public objects. The other subject for congratulation is the universal and unwavering loyalty of the Societies. As in the last war, so in the present, there is not an instance on record in which a member of any of our Mission Churches, nor (it is believed) a resident on any of our Mission Stations, who has taken up arms against the British Government, while in several instances their fidelity and bravery have deserved sincere commendation.

Nearly every Missionary of every Society labouring in *British Kaffraria*, has during the past year been obliged to fly, some at the hazard of their lives, and some at the sacrifice of their property. For some time it was matter of uncertainty whether the Wesleyan Missionaries at Mount Coke would not be involved in the same fate, but a kind Providence has been their protector, and though not wholly without molestation or loss, they have been able to continue at their post, and to conduct the usual religious services.

From *Clarkebury* the intelligence is favourable. Not a single case of apostacy had occurred; the School continued to be taught; the attendance, notwithstanding the unsettled state of the country, was regular, and the services of the sanctuary were accompanied with an evident blessing. From *Morley* there are advices up to the 10th of December, at which time the people and the Station were in peace.

During the past year the Great Head of the Church has favoured the D'Urban Circuit, in the *Port Natal* and *Anazulu District*, with gracious manifestations of his presence and power. The enlarged Chapel has again become too small, the state of religious feeling has improved, and fifty members have been added to the Society.

WESTERN AFRICA.

The reports from *Sierra Leone*, are highly satisfactory. There has been a large increase of church members, and a manifest deepening of the Work of God. The Missionaries are unanimous in bearing grateful testimony to the holy consistency of their beloved people. Respecting the *Gold Coast* Missions, the latest communications announce that the general aspect of the work, in all its departments, affords the most gratifying encouragement. One of the Missionaries from *Cape Coast* writes—"The Lord appears to be raising up, in all directions, persons who are becoming of great service to the Church. It is pleasing to witness the falling and overthrow of Fetichism, and still more gratifying to behold religion taking its stand on the mass of its ruins, and numbers of witnesses for Christ rising up in the place of Fetich Priests. Divine truth is diffusing an energy, before which, the false teachings of men must pass away." In reference to the Natives, the Missionary adds, "There can no longer be any doubt respecting the high capabilities of their mental powers, the real conversion of many, and their consistent Christian character. It seems likely that the most effective, heart-searching, and successful ministers of the truth of God in this country, will be converted and educated Nations."

WEST INDIES.

In the *West India Islands*, the promised blessing of the Great Head of the Church still accompanies the faithful preaching of the Gospel; although depressing influences of a commercial nature, continue to operate unfavourably upon the extended prosperity of the Missions, and, in addition to these, *Jamaica* has, during the year, experienced the dreadful ravages of the Cholera. Eighteen hundred of our people have been cut off in that Island, by that fearful disease, besides some hundreds who have died from other causes. This awful visitation has had a sanctified effect. A gracious influence has rested very extensively upon the minds of the people, and no fewer than 3,500 persons have been received as candidates for membership at our several Stations in the Island.

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At *St. Eustatius*, the Lord has poured out His Spirit, and a great awakening has been the result. Upwards of 100 persons have been added to the Church.

At *St. Vincent's*, the pastoral and pulpit labours of the Missionaries have been prosecuted with considerable encouragement and success. Many young persons have been added to the Church. Many of the Africans, brought into the Island last year, are regular in their attendance at the Lord's house, and several of them have been publicly baptised. The Missionaries observe with gratitude an onward movement among the people generally, which develops itself in their improved morals, and in their mental and social elevation.

In the *Hayti* District, the past year has been one of peculiar and severe personal affliction to some, and of great and painful trial to all, yet the hand of God has been with his servants for good. At *Port au Prince*, great opposition has been excited against the truth, but the great majority of our people have stood the test, and still "hold fast the profession of their faith without wavering." The dark cloud is now passing away, but there are some who still know what it is to endure persecution for Christ's sake.

BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.

Of the Missions in North America, the most deeply interesting department is that which embraces the Aboriginal tribes belonging to Canada West and the territories of the Hudson's Bay Company, because of the strong claims which they have upon our Christian sympathies, as well as our Christian exertions; presenting, in the new and happy condition into which the Gospel has instrumentally introduced them, clear and resistless evidence of the fitness, power, and utility of the Missionary enterprise in purifying and elevating individual character, in promoting the civilization of entire communities, and in training up well-qualified Native Agents. The two Academies and the several Day-Schools connected with this important Department of the work in Western Canada, are, by the Divine blessing, conferring unspeakable advantages upon the rising generation; and, amongst the many triumphs which the Gospel has achieved in modern times, it is not one of the least important that it has been the means of preserving that portion of the Indian race dwelling in Western Canada, from utter ruin and entire extinction.

CANADIAN DOMESTIC MISSIONS.—At no former period, in Canada, has the work of God in the destitute settlements, presented a more encouraging aspect than at the present time. The Missionaries,—whose labours embrace a vast tract of country in many places but recently and thinly inhabited,—enduring many privations, and subsisting on very economical allowances, continue with unwearied diligence to supply the spiritual wants of thousands who would otherwise have but few, if any, advantages from the ministry of the Word, and the administration of the Holy Sacraments. But if attentive assemblies, powerful awakenings, regenerating grace, and the comfort and edification of believers, are evidences of prosperity, then have the friends of the Society ample occasion for gratitude, that these "Fruits of righteousness" have followed the labours of the "Messengers of the Churches."

Our Missions in these *Lower Provinces* continue to enjoy the fostering blessing of the God of all grace, and His servants rejoice in the unmistakable evidences afforded very generally that their labours are not in vain in the Lord.

Thus have we encouraging and constantly recurring evidence that the great cause of Christian Missions, under the direction of our Body is increasing in the earth, and accomplishing a vast amount of spiritual good. On this account we rejoice that we are privileged in being able to present this year so favourable a Report of the doings of the Parent Society:

CONCLUSION.

In concluding this our *thirty-fifth* Annual Report, the Committee are reminded that by the prospective arrangement made by the last Conference in relation to the Nova Scotia District, dividing the same into two Districts, there exists the necessity for a corresponding division of this Auxiliary; and it is earnestly hoped that this, with other contemplated arrangements will result in increased contributions to the funds of the Parent Institution as well as being greatly promotive of the work of God among ourselves; and that those portions of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island at present destitute of an Evangelistic Ministry, or but very scantily and imperfectly supplied, will richly enjoy at an early period, the blessings of a pure gospel. For these results let our prayers ascend to Heaven, and our liberal contributions flow into the treasury of the Lord.

No doubt can be entertained respecting the Divine authority for Missions, or the obligations of the Church to send them forth. Their aim and success are equally approved and acknowledged. "The Lord works with them and confirms the word by signs following." But they require co-operation and support. In the arrangement of Divine Providence they form a test of our allegiance to Christ. "For He is Lord of Lords, and King of Kings, and they that are with Him are called, and chosen, and faithful." The struggle has begun. The conflict is going on. The Lamb shall overcome, and His dominion shall be universal; but if we would share His triumphs and witness the advancement of His kingdom,—if we would have him "with us," we, as members of His Church, must be "with Him," in principle and purpose and aim, and in the employment and support of those evangelical agencies and means which he has ordained for the salvation of men, and for the manifestation of His own glory.

The Church has embarked in a great enterprise, and has corresponding encouragement afforded her. She possesses promises such as God alone has authority to give: "As thy days, so shall thy strength be." She receives help such as God only can bestow: "My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness."—She has examples such as the Word of God alone can furnish: "In nothing I shall be ashamed, but that with all boldness, as always, so now also Christ shall be magnified in my body, whether it be by life or by death. For to me to live is Christ." Her Members shall receive re-

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wards such as God only can confer;—rewards too great for them to receive in all their fulness on earth, but which shall be distributed at the resurrection of the just, when “they that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament, and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars for ever and ever. The word of promise shall be fulfilled. “For the arm of the Lord shall be made bare in the eyes of all nations, and all flesh shall see the salvation of God.” The oath of the High and Holy One shall be accomplished. “I have sworn by myself, saith the Lord, the word is gone out of my mouth in righteousness, and shall not return, that unto me every knee shall bow, every tongue shall swear.” The visions of Prophecy shall be realized. “And they sang a new song, saying, Thou art worthy to take the book, and to open the seals thereof; for thou wast slain, and has redeemed us to God by thy blood, out of every kindred, and tongue, and people and nation.” *Worthy is the Lamb that was slain to receive power, and riches, and wisdom, and strength, and honour, and glory, and blessing.* And every creature which is in heaven, and on the earth, and such as are in the sea, and all that are in them, heard I saying, *Blessing, and honour, and glory, and power, be unto him, that sitteth upon the Throne, and unto the Lamb for ever and ever.*
