## COUNCIL MEETING FRIDAY EVENING

Mainly Routine Matters Dealt  
With at Meeting.—Reports  
From Electric Light Com.

A meeting of the Town Council was  
held on Friday evening in the Council  
Chambers. His Worship Mayor Andrew  
presiding. There were also present  
Councillors Miller, Alexander,  
Patterson, Quinn, McLean and Goss.  
Minutes of previous meeting read  
and confirmed.

The Town Clerk read the following  
letter from the Town Clerk of Campbell-  
ton:

Bathurst, N. B., May 12, 1914.

Whereas, in response to urgent call  
for assistance, while a disastrous fire  
was raging in the town, on the 28th  
of April last; the Town of Campbell-  
ton, most generously responded im-  
mediately to our call for aid, by send-  
ing firemen, a fire engine and equip-  
ment by special train to our assistance;  
for which they have declined to accept  
any compensations or even pay-  
ment for expenses.

Therefore resolved that this Coun-  
cil take this opportunity of extending  
to the Town of Campbellton, its very  
sincere thanks for the prompt and  
generous assistance given to our Town  
in our hour of need.

Further resolved that the Town  
Clerk forward a copy of this resolu-  
tion to the Town Council of Campbell-  
ton.

Councillor Evans from Police and  
License Committee presented report  
recommending that Theo. Letourneau  
and George Main for one horse truck-  
ing license, and John Tennier for three  
horse livery stable license, be granted  
in accordance with the by-laws. Re-  
port received and adopted.

His Worship presented the follow-  
ing report of the Electric Light Coun-  
cil, which on motion was adopted:

At a meeting of the Electric Light  
Committee held on Saturday, the 16th  
day of May, it was decided to recom-  
mend that the following rate be set  
for Mr. D. A. Stewart's factory for the  
first year of operation, namely 10  
cents per Kilowatt with regular mon-  
thly discounts, up to two hundred and  
fifty dollars, after that amount is  
exceeded, Mr. Stewart is to make fur-  
ther payments for first year.

Also that the firemen in the power-  
house, James Robinson and John Nel-  
son receive a salary of seventy dollars  
per month beginning June 1st, 1914.

It was also decided to ask that the  
Electric Light Department be author-  
ized to purchase Portable Testing In-  
struments for an amount not exceed-  
ing two hundred and seventy five dol-  
lars.

The Electric Light Committee were  
authorized to call for tenders for the  
two boilers in the old Powerhouse, and  
tenders for taking down the old  
building, and report back to Council.

The Fire Protection Committee were  
authorized to purchase 2 large and 2  
small toppers, and 500 feet of service  
wire for installing same.

On motion, Mr. Frank Gorham was  
appointed Engineer of the Fire En-  
gine after which council adjourned.

funeral service took place on Tuesday,  
Rev. T. P. Drumm officiating, and in-  
terment was made in the Rural Cem-  
tery.

Address Presented to Judge Crockett  
on Behalf of Bar

Newcastle, N. B., May 27.—The Su-  
preme Court opened here yesterday.  
Judge Crockett presiding. An ad-  
dress was presented His Honor by  
Hon. L. J. Tweedie on behalf of the  
Northumberland bar. The cases on  
the docket are Geo. A. Stewart vs.  
Dominion Pulp Co., an action for dam-  
ages for death of plaintiff's son in  
the pulp mill last October; M. G. Teed  
and L. J. Tweedie for plaintiff and  
Fred E. Taylor, of Weldon and Mc-  
Lean for defendant. Storey vs. Crock-  
er, an action for malicious prosecution,  
Tweedie for plaintiff; Peter J. Hughes  
for defendant. The first case began  
yesterday and continues to-day.

## FATAL ACCIDENT AT HODGINSIDING

Found Beside Track on Mon-  
day Afternoon

Another fatal accident occurred on  
the Intercolonial Railway on Saturday  
night or early Sunday morning when  
Fred Guitar, a young man about thirty-  
five years of age, met death near  
his home in Hodginsiding, a small  
flag station a few miles this side of  
Jacquet River. Just how the young  
man met death is not known and he  
was not found until late Monday after-  
noon. The body was found lying along-  
side the rails in a terribly mutilated  
condition, it being believed that he was  
struck by a train and met instant  
death. Foul play was also suspected,  
as it is stated that when the young  
man left for his home in Hodginsiding  
from a place farther north, the name  
of which could not be learned, that he  
was accompanied by another person  
who could not be found. It is now un-  
derstood, however, that the person  
whom it was thought was travelling  
with Guitar, has been found and ap-  
pears to know nothing about the acci-  
dent and easily proved an alibi as to  
his whereabouts for the past week. It  
is understood that an investigation has  
been made and that no inquest will be  
held. On account of Hodginsiding be-  
ing an out of the way place with no  
telegraphic connections, it was practi-  
cally impossible to secure all the particu-  
lars yesterday, except that which  
could be gleaned from railway men.

Guitar, who is unmarried, lumber-  
in the winter and it is understood that  
during the past season he has been  
working at New Mills and was enroute  
to his home when the sad fatality oc-  
curred. He was a very good living  
young man, and it is a mystery to  
many how he came to meet such a  
death, and it is not likely that the  
true facts of the case will ever be  
known.

Rev. Mr. Jenner made a few pleasing and appreciative remarks, after which the National Anthem was sung, and the school dismissed.

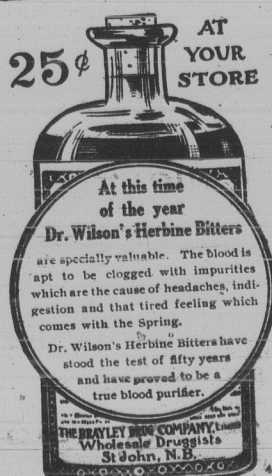
A few of the parents of the children were present to witness the exercises, but not as many as should have been there, to encourage by their presence the efforts of the teachers and children.

Dalhousie, May 26th.—In the absence of your regular correspondent, please publish the following items.

**NEW LIGHTSHIP CARRIES CREW OF 25 TO DEATH**  
Halifax No. 19 Founders on The Treacherous Rocks off N. S.  
Coast in Dense Fog

Liscomb, N. S., May 24.—While the hardy fishermen of Liscomb lay in their beds bawling their hard luck in not being able to get to their lobster traps owing to the dense fog and heavy south seas that so often visit our coast, a grim tragedy was being enacted right on their fishing grounds, when probably twenty-one brave men were fighting a battle for their lives, with no hopes or chances in their favor, for their steamer, the lightship Halifax No. 19, the new lightship built for Halifax harbor, on her way from Glasgow, had stranded on Liscomb ledges, one mile from Liscomb Island, and one of the most treacherous coasts on the eastern shore of Nova Scotia. Nothing was known of this until early Saturday morning, when the S.S. Dufferin, Captain Murdoch, which was cautiously making her way into Liscomb harbor, suddenly ran into a quantity of wreckage, among which the captain saw lifeless bodies. At great risk of getting in the breakers himself, he put out boats and succeeded in recovering three bodies, all three were to be found in that vicinity. By this time the fishermen had put out in their boats and succeeded in recovering four more bodies, making seven altogether.  
The Government steamer Stanley arrived at 7 in the evening, and arrangements were made to bury the bodies at the Methodist graveyard.



### I. C. R. TRACK WORK HAS ALREADY STARTED

The improvements on the Canada Eastern division of the Intercolonial Railway, as forecasted by General Manager Gutelius a short time ago, are already under way.

Mr. Spencer has had a very wide experience as a musical instructor for several of the largest musical productions emanating from New York city.

The following is a press notice:—

Herr Spencer came to this country in 1880 on the steamer L'Amerique with the divine Sarah Bernhardt as her musical director and interpreter. In 1881 he joined the famous Wilbur Opra Company and conducted the orchestra at the Bijou Opera House, New York, where he played the music of "La Mascotte" for 150 nights. Miss Amy Leslie, now dramatic critic of the Chicago News, played the part of Fiametta in that historic production under her maiden name, Lillie West. 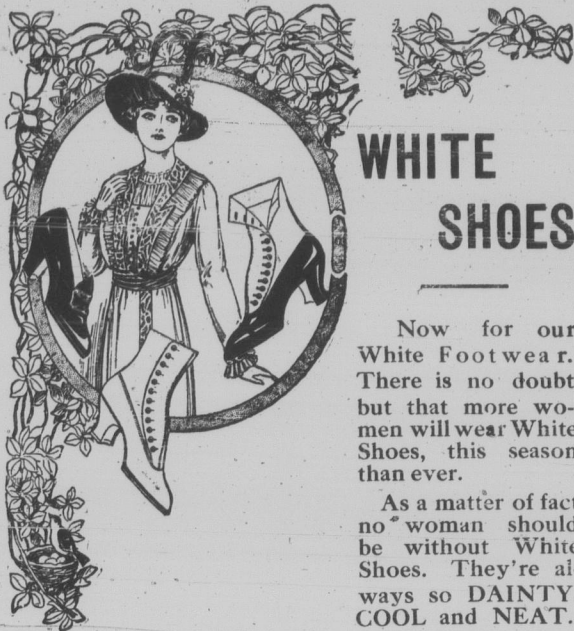

**FRED N. LAVIGNE DROWNED ON DRIVE**

Together With Nine Other Stream Drivers Was Upset Out of Boat

(From the Gloucester Northern Light)

Word was received last week that Fred N. Lavigne, son of Mr. and Mrs. Narcisse Lavigne, a young man well and favorably known about town, had been drowned that morning by the upsetting of a boat on 40 Mile Brook.

The unfortunate young man, who was thirty-two years old, had been engaged early Thursday morning in the moving of baggage from one side of the brook to the other. This had been completed and the boat was returning to bring some of the men over, when it struck a rock and upset, throwing the nine occupants into the foaming stream. There were besides Lavigne, the following men in the boat,—David McLaughlin of Tracadie, Jack Brophy of Blackville, Wm. Ford, Amos T. Lavigne, Wm. Watson, Alphonse Aubel, Theodore Lavigne and Edward Babin of Bathurst. All these but Fred Lavigne, McLaughlin and Brophy were able to make the shore, and these were compelled to hang onto the boat until a better opportunity. They succeeded in clambering back into it, and it went swirling down the rushing river without our pole to guide it. Brophy jumped out when a small stretch of smooth water was reached and succeeded in getting safely ashore. A few minutes after, Lavigne jumped out, but immediately sank and disappeared in the angry waters. McLaughlin hung onto the boat, which continued its wild course down the stream, finally grounding on what is known as Rocky Island, where he walked ashore, and was later taken to the mainland by some of the drivers who had followed the boat along the shore.

About one hundred and fifty men were spread along the brook at the time of the accident, but as there was no other boat and the stream was at extreme freshet height, they were unable to do anything to help the occupants of the boat. The whole force of men immediately went to work to look for Lavigne's body and the dam above where the accident took place was shut down to assist in the search, but no trace was found of it. Up to the hour of going to press the body has not yet been recovered.

A peculiar feature of the tragedy in the fact that Fred Lavigne had a presentiment that he was to be drowned this spring, and in response to this feeling, he refused to work on the river as he has in other years. He went up however, in charge of the baggage, and was engaged driving a team moving the tents and provisions, only going on the water when it was necessary to move these articles from one side of the river to the other. In spite of all his precautions his presentiment was fulfilled, and he met a sudden death in just the way and at the time that he foresaw.

Many of the strong men on the shores of the fatal brook who witnessed the tragedy and heard his frantic cries for help, wept tears in their helplessness, for Lavigne was very well liked by his comrades. The sad accident has cast a gloom over the whole river, and the greater sympathy is felt for his aged father and mother and the other members of the family.

He was unmarried, and leaves besides his parents, three brothers, William, Leonard and Arthur, and two sisters, Mrs. Amos T. Lavigne of Bathurst, and Mrs. Jos. Lavigne of Montreal.

Before the doctors reached the hospital, the young man had succumbed to his injuries, never regaining consciousness. Rev. E. Savage also reached the hospital a few minutes after the young man had died.

Mr. Conlon had come to Moncton on the C. P. R. Monday afternoon for the purpose of attending the Knights of Columbus ball, which was held last evening in their hall, in closing the celebration of the sixth anniversary of the Council.

Quite a number saw the accident and were horror-stricken, one or two young ladies, it is said, fainted. It was just the time a very large number were coming out of the hall after having spent a very enjoyable evening. Mr. Conlon being among the number. It was certainly a sad ending to a pleasant occasion.

**NEW ASSOCIATION OF TEACHERS FORMED**

Teachers Association of Maritime Provinces Formed in Saskatchewan

### CIGARETTES LED TO THEIR RECAPTURE

The Adventures of Two Halifax Bad Boys Who Broke Jail on Two Occasions

Amherst, N. S., May 25.—Frank Wade and Howard Gibson, Halifax lads, who have broken from the Amherst jail on two different occasions, have cigarettes to thank for their present plight. About a week ago, the two young men made a break out of jail, but were captured at a point along the line. Brought back into captivity, they made another escape on Sunday evening, but were recaptured at Oxford Junction on the following day, and brought back, just in time to stand trial before Judge Patterson this morning. The story as told by Wade today was that he became wayward in his Halifax home, and fell in with another cigarette fiend by the name of Harold Gibson. Together the two beat their way to Springhill Junction, where their craving for the weed led them to break into Postmaster MacKenzie's store. Wade was given four years for burglary and two for jail breaking, while Gibson will remain in the penitentiary three years for the first offense, and two for the second, a total of five years.

### ACADIA COLLEGE BUILDINGS BURNED

Fire Broke Out Early on Tuesday Morning and Demolishes Buildings

Wolfville, N. S., May 26.—About one a.m. fire broke out in Acadia College gymnasium. A strong south-westerly wind was blowing and despite the efforts of the firemen the flames made rapid headway. Chipman Hall, the college men's residence, standing about 40 yards to the north, was soon on fire in several places on the roof, and the united efforts of the firemen were soon turned to save this building. So quickly, however, did the fire spread that the whole structure was soon enveloped in flames, and many of the students lost all but the clothes they wore.

By this time the fire was most spectacular, and sparks were falling in showers over the old college building and it was soon on fire in several places. These were promptly extinguished though one which started high up in the belfry was very stubborn and it was feared the whole thing would go. The damage was slight.

The other two buildings were burned to the ground. The gymnasium was insured for \$1,400 and Chipman Hall for \$16,500.

The origin of the fire is not known. By daylight the danger from flying sparks and embers was over.

### BRITAIN KEEPS AEROPLANE SECRET

London, May 20.—It is stated that the Government wishes to maintain the secret of the new safety aeroplane which is the property of the War Department. While this would give a great advantage to the British army aerial service, it is pointed out by some that it would be against the interest of humanity in the conquest of the air. The King is enthusiastic over the new machine. After witnessing a flight at Aldershot he exclaimed: "Why haven't you a hundred of these in the army?"

Col. Eady, Secretary for War, in an interview said the invention of the machine was due to the brains of many men. Four organizations had played a part, namely: the National Physical Laboratory, the Advisory Committee on Aeronautics, the Royal Aircraft factory and experimental fliers.

"The new aeroplane," he said, "is inherently not automatically stable, that is to say its stability depends on the shape, not on any mechanical attachment. The secret can be applied to the monoplane as well as to the biplane. The new aeroplane, which is all British and all the product of British brains, except the engine, has been put to all manner of trials. It has been flown in a gale flung at sideways, and has proved stable in all ways. A novice can quite safely control it in the air, but still the greatest problem of all remains to be solved—that of safe landing. I have flown hundreds of miles, and know that this is one thing that is checking the advance of flying."
