She has since been towed into Yarmouth, with fore and main-masts gone, and no rudder.

There was a very high tide in Bay Verte on Christmas night, sweeping over dyke, filling the marshes, and in several places covering the Post road.

We learn that the Bay Verte trotting course is in prime order, and several matches have already come off. We do not believe our correspondent when he says the time made for one mile was one minute and four hundred and ninety five seconds. Such speed is marvellous.

The Concert at Shelburne on Tuesday evening in aid of the Presbyterian Church was a great success. The Hall was crowded. The performers were Dr. Morton, Messrs. F. Theat, Radlick Robertson, ably seconded by a number of ladies, Mrs. Denoon, Mrs. Best and Mrs. Willer the Miss Theat, Tremblay, and Steadman. The receipts were \$130.

The Westmorland County Lodge held its quarterly Session on Tuesday 26th instant at Petticoe, about 40 representatives and officers and a large number of visitors were present. The returns from 14 Lodges showed a membership of 1275. The meeting was interesting, and a resolution from the thanks of the Lodge to the ladies for petitioning against the liquor and to E. G. Harriman Esq. for his zeal in the matter was passed.

The Marquis of Guelb. Danl. E. Sackles, U. S. Minister to Spain, to a Spanish Senator, named Creight, will probably recall to many minds even in this Province the *escapade* in which the bridegroom figured some ten years ago which made his name notorious at the time. The first wife of General Sackles was a very beautiful Italian lady, the daughter of a music teacher in New York. Being chosen to represent one of the New York districts in Congress, General Sackles took his wife with him to Washington, and there she was seduced by Colonel Key. Sackles discovered his dishonor, and had just obtained from his wife a confession of her guilt, when he observed Key passing the house, and making with his handkerchief the signal appointing a meeting with Mrs. Sackles. Madened by the sight Sackles rushed from the house, overtook Key, and shot him down, discharging into his body several shots as he lay at his feet. He was arrested, and tried for murder, but, *non Americano*, was triumphantly acquitted. To the intense surprise of his friends, Sackles then took back his wife, and lived with her until her death, which occurred four years ago. During the service as a colonel of New York volunteers, obtained rapid promotion, and reached the rank of Major-General of volunteers. He commanded a corps at the battle of Gettysburg where he lost a leg. He was appointed minister to Madrid in 1869 by President Grant, and in consequence of that appointment, resigned the commission as Brigadier-General in the regular army, which he had received. He has, we perceive, arrived last week in the States with his wife.

The house is a splendid mansion, the Prince having laid enormous sums upon it. It was here that royalty basked and enjoyed itself without having its movements planned in the papers.
