

European Intelligence.

ARRIVAL OF THE AMERICA.

The Royal Mail steamship *America* arrived at Halifax on Thursday morning last, with Liverpool dates to the 21st ult. She brought on 32 passengers.

Cotton has been in active demand and prices advanced 4th penny. The sales of the week closed 74,300 bales.

Flour and all breadstuffs were depressed and dull.

STATE OF TRADE.—The Manchester Market for Goods and Yarns, but particularly the latter, has much improved. The stocks on hand are small, and buyers well supplied with orders.

MONEY MARKET.—The English Stock Market has been active at an improvement on last week's prices. The Bank of England's rate of discount is 2½ per cent, whereby private Banks are discounting at 2½. Consols closed on 29th at 97½ to 97½, bid for money and account. The Italian in the Bank had increased to £18,950,187.

Canada Scrip was worth 4 per cent premium.

Sugar was in better request at 6½ advance. Coffee and Tea dull.

The great political event of the week was the defeat and resignation of the Russell Ministry, on the Local Militia Bill.

Lord Palmerston moved that the word "Local" should be perambulatory, not confined to England, Ireland, or Scotland, merely, but to be sent to any part of the United Kingdom where it might be required. On this proposal of Lord Palmerston, Ministers joined issue, and on the division were defeated by a vote of 136 against 125. After which Lord John Russell announced that having lost the confidence of the House he could no longer hold office.

The event was quite unexpected seeing that on the previous night Ministers had been telling majority on Lord Russell's motion of want of confidence arising out of the Carden Birch affair, the number voting on this occasion being 137 for the motion and 222 against it.

All sorts of rumours were afloat at Liverpool prior to the sailing of the *America*, as to who would succeed Lord John as Premier. A coalition between Lord Palmerston and Sir James Graham was expected.

A despatch dated House of Commons, Friday night, to the Liverpool Journal of Saturday, says:—"When the Premier announced his resignation, the greatest astonishment was felt. The members being all in the dark, no one was prepared for what has so suddenly taken place. All is still in a state of wonder; the talk in the House is that the Queen will not have Lord Palmerston, and that the Earl of Derby will at once accept office."

From the same paper:—"Lord Palmerston in moving his amendment, also said the country was in a situation which rendered it liable to war, and our armaments to time of peace was not sufficient, nor did it suit the feeling of the country, but it should be adequate to meet such an emergency. What he wanted was a ready trained force prepared for starting for action on the shortest notice. All objections to the proposal of a regular Militia were founded in distrust of the people, and implied that Englishmen were cheats. Scotchmen, however, and Irishmen were honest. If we could not trust the nation to defend itself we had better give up the idea of defence (immense cheers), and send for Russian or Austrian soldiers. He was confident that the people would answer a proper appeal on the part of the Government, and such an appeal by proving to the world that we were prepared for defence would therefore preserve to ourselves the blessings of peace."

The Times says:—"Possibly the Minister stopped to avoid a fatal blow on the Cape question, and has made his fall with considerable judgment. If saved on the Kaffir Question, he would have been wrecked on the Reform Bill. Lord Palmerston will most likely resign the task of forming a Government to the Protectionist Chief, who has long since proclaimed that his arrangements are made, and that he has only to walk in and take possession, and he has really no choice but do what he can to effect this. Lord Derby will most likely be our Minister next week, he has something in his favor. The new Reform Bill will not stand much in this way."

The Irish Brigade have had their revenge they all voted in the majority and cheered lustily at the result.

The Herald declares that Lord Derby will be prepared to take office "though, suddenly, the event was not unexpected. The Post says that victory was worthy of Palmerston. It was not a party but a National question. The opposition Peers had met at Earl Derby's and agreed to offer the most determined resistance to the new Reform Bill on its second reading in the House of Lords."

IRISHLAND.—The Dublin Evening Post mentions on a questionable authority that some of the Roman Catholic Clergy who had become unpopular on account of interfering against secret societies, had been served with notices to desist. Some of the ablest and most independent of the Presbyterian Ministers have been distinguished by their loud and vehement objections against the landed proprietors in the North of Ireland.

A formidable combination exists, against the payment of rent, and great alarm exists amongst the Landlords.

The Times Herald announces the death of the Right Rev. Dr. McNicholas, Titular Bishop of Achery.

Mr. John Isaac Heard, had been elected for Kinsale, in place of Mr. Benjamin Hawes, without opposition.

INDO-CHINA.—During the great fire at Hong Kong, two Artillery Officers were blown up by gun powder. The firm of D. O. Mackey & Co., of Calcutta, had failed.

Debt £200,000; Assets valued at £95,000.

FRANCE.—The new law for the regulation of the Press has been issued, but is very unsatisfactory. Lord Cowley, the new British Minister, had arrived in Paris.

It is feared by Government that Cuvignier will be elected in several districts.

Various reports prevail of a new Ministerial crisis.

General St. Arnaud is said to be in disgrace because he would not sign a decree for the dismissal of a number of Officers of known Orleanist tendencies.

PARIS. Saturday, 21st Feb.—The Moniteur publishes a decree, calling a "Convention" to be held with the Minister of Public Works, and the Directors of the Northern Railway Company, by which the Company engages to construct at its own expense, four lines of Railway. As a compensation for these additional works, the duration of the concession of the Railway from Paris to Dunkirk, and the concession of the Creil and St. Quentin and Amiens and Bologna Railway, are extended to 99 years from 10th Sept. 1848.

ITALY.—It is said that some clue to the murder of Rossi had been discovered, where by some new light would be thrown upon that horrid tragedy. The celebration of the anniversary of the establishment of a Republic in Rome came off the 9th ult., notwithstanding the efforts of the Government to suppress it.

A Defense Preparations Necessary.—The Paris correspondent of the *Quaker* writes:—"The Duke of Bassano, now French envoy in the court of Belgium, arrived at Brussels on Thursday last. I am able to assure you, on good authority, that one of the demands which M. de Bassano has made on the Belgian Government, is the removal of the monumental lion from the field of Waterloo, and the demolition of the pyramid of mounds of triumph which crowns it. You are aware that soon after the revolution of July, the destruction of the same trophy was talked of as a point insisted on by the Government of Louis Philippe; and when the French expedition returned from the siege of Antwerp, it was expected that they would have taken the lion into their own hands, and hurled the offensive symbol of victorious force from its proud eminence. But they were dissuaded from this violent project by an officer, who suggested that it would be much easier to stamp the trophy with ridicule than to overthrow it. Therefore, he proposed that they should kneel down, the lion's head, and pare his claws. This practical sarcasm was unanimously approved, and the expressive motto for forthwith carried into effect. The application now made by Louis Napoleon for the demolition of the trophy makes me recall his famous declaration before the Court of Peers, when tried for the serious attempt at Boulogne. He then said:—"I present as principle the sovereignty of the people, as system the empire, and as action the retrieval of Waterloo." The two first points have been carried; and it is certain that no means will be neglected to achieve the last. It is a "fixed idea" with the President, and you may rest assured that he will prosecute it with the dogged tenacity which marks his character. Meanwhile, it is ripe that the Prince ridicules the preparations for national defence against invasion which are being made in England."

PORTUGAL.—The British experimental Squadron, under Commodore Martin, has left the Tagus, having been recalled by the Home Government. These ships will form part of a powerful fleet which will cruise in the Channel.

MEXICAN OCCURRENCES.—It is our painful duty this week to record the death of three young men the names of whom were George J. Burton—Benjamin R. Kewell, and Melvin in the 21st year of their age, and William Melvin in the 15th year, all of the Parish of Wakefield.

The above deceased were in the employment of Mr. St. Philip Bolton, who was engaged in the lumbering business on the Nackawic River, where the dreadful accident occurred. They were taken in charge of the camp on Saturday morning the 21st ult., while Mr. Bolton and his eldest son came home for supplies, but who did not return until the following Tuesday, when they found the camp burned down, and the remains of the above three Indians only left to mark the place.

From the post-mortem the poor fellows say when they were first discovered by Mr. Bolton, it would appear that they (with the exception of George Burton) were secretly conscious of their fate. The latter, it would seem took a small chest in his hand, by finding it impossible to escape, fell back into the bunk on his back. His legs hanging over the seat placed in front of the fire, where they were burned. Rockwell lay with his face towards the ground and covered with his hand. Melvin lengthways of the bunk on his face.

In this position were they severally found, and so horribly burned, that it was with difficulty they could be distinguished. The funeral took place in the Freewill Meeting House, at the Victoria Corner on Friday, the 27th ult., where an uncommon large concourse of people were assembled to assist in the last sad rites of the deceased and sympathize with the numerous and bereaved relations and friends.

A Coroner's inquest took place on the bodies, and a verdict in accordance with the above circumstance was returned. (Carleton Sentinel).

THREE RIVERS. 26th Feb.—A dreadful tragedy was enacted last night in the goal of Three Rivers. Three persons were confined in the same cell—two of them under sentence for one week, and the other for a longer term, one of the men had been employed making axe handles during yesterday, and had a small axe as a pattern, which one of the prisoners concealed under his bed, after the three men had laid down for the night he, who had concealed the axe, without any previous quarrel or notice of his intentions, struck the other two with his axe, cutting one open in the side, and wounding the other severely in the shoulder and knee. The latter died in a few minutes. (Quebec Chronicle).

PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT.

March 5th, 1852.

The House went into Committee to-day on the Bill for defining Harbour Masters dues in the Cut Point. A three-hour discussion, progress was made.

The House then went into Committee of Supply. A grant in aid of the Government of £140,000 was granted, and a resolution was passed in favour of the Government, by a vote of 15 to 11.

The Bill to tax Wild-Lands has been thrown out in the Council.

LATE ENGLISH NEWS—RESIGNATION OF THE WHIG MINISTRY.

The news from England, by the Steamship *America*, is important. The Whig Ministry have resigned in consequence of their defeat on the Militia Bill—particulars will be seen in our European summary. Lord John Russell's resignation took parties by surprise, and the question now is "who will be Premier?" The English papers are not divided upon the point. It is well informed circles the Earl of Derby, (late Lord Stanley) is the probable successor to Lord John Russell. Others state that Sir James Graham or Lord Palmerston, are spoken of as probable successors.

The Railway Resolutions, adopted.
We are happy to learn, that the Government Railway Resolutions, have been carried in the House of Assembly by overwhelming majorities! The Government staked their existence upon the measure, and they have been nobly sustained. Where now are the "factious opposition," who would sacrifice the best interests of the country, from local prejudices, and in order to gratify their hostility to men, who can waive local feelings, when the interests of the country require it. We look forward with confidence to the Executive—to carry out the "well understood wishes of the people, as expressed through their representative," and that the Railway will be commenced without delay. We can see no just cause of complaint against the Government—they work hard, and bring forward measures for the benefit of the country, attend to its commercial interests, and promote the construction of Railways. Yet a portion of the press, which is daily becoming smaller, and "beautifully less," make political capital out of all manner of reports, and endeavor to annoy and embarrass the Government, but they have failed—signally failed in their attempts.

The Railway Bill has been under discussion in the Assembly. The first motion was carried by a vote of 25 against 9. The second was carried by a majority of 22 against 10.

The Canadian Ministry have determined to establish a line of screw Steamers to ply between the St. Lawrence and the Mersey, once a fortnight from each port. The Commissioners of Public Works advertise that they will receive tenders up to the 1st of July next, for this service.

THROWING OPEN THE ST. LAWRENCE TO FOREIGN VESSELS.—We observe from the Quebec Gazette, that the Canadian Executive have had their attention engaged for some time past, to the propriety of throwing open the St. Lawrence to foreign bottoms. It is also stated, that a recommendation will be made to the proper quarter, to concede

the free use of the canal and river St. Lawrence to foreign vessels, pending the action of Congress, during the present session, on the Reciprocity Bill.

It is said the British Minister at Washington will be authorized by the Imperial Government at an early day, to communicate this decision to the American Government.

Latest from England.

Arrival of the Steamship ARCTIC AT NEW YORK.

The American steamship *Arctic* arrived at New York on the 8th inst., after a rapid passage from Liverpool. She brings 4 days later news and 20 passengers.

On the 27th, lat. 51, long. 17, passed the European bound East.

Cotton has slightly declined, though quotations are not changed. Flour and Wheat more active.

A new Ministry has been formed in England, with the Earl of Derby as Prime Minister.

Consols closed at 97½ to 97½.

At the last accounts from Manchester, there was a healthy business doing, and market firm with small stocks.

France continues quiet.

Parliament had adjourned on Friday the 27th, in order to allow Lord Derby to complete his arrangements. A dissolution of that body will at once take place, to be immediately followed by a new election.

THE NEW MINISTRY.
Among the prominent members are—Secretary of the Home Department, Mr. Walpole; Foreign Department, Lord Malmesbury; Colonial Department, Sir John Pakenham; First Lord of the Admiralty, Duke of Northumberland; President of the Board of Trade, Mr. Havelock; Postmaster General, Earl of Harcourt; Secretary of War, Mr. B. Russell; Secretary for Ireland, Lord Nassau; Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, Lord Stanley; Chancellor of the Exchequer, Mr. D. A. Milnes.

The Derby Administration is now complete, and a new household has entered into existence, with the same tenderness as the Cabinet. Leaving most of the respectable working Gents in the last before us to speak for themselves.

The steamers *Bay State* and *State of Maine*, came into collision on the 29th ult. in Newport harbor, both vessels sustaining considerable injury. Both steamers were taken to Fall River for repairs. The collision occasioned general consternation among the passengers, but no person was hurt.

The recent advance in the price of Flour, originated in the misspelling of a word. A telegraph despatch from the Continent, was sent to a firm in Liverpool, engaged in the Corn trade, previous to the sailing of the *Franklin* for New York, stating "that the Emperor of Russia had by a Ukase forbidden the exportation of corn to foreign states." A copy of the despatch was forwarded to New York, and flour took a sudden rise there, as it has done here, the holders availing themselves of the intelligence. By the next steamer, however, the matter was explained—it was "corn" and not "corn," that is becoming scarce; the consequence is that flour has again fallen in the States to its former quotations.

The Bill to incorporate the St. Andrews Steam Ferry Boat Company, introduced in the Legislative Council, by the hon. Mr. Hatch, passed that body, and on the 28th ult. passed the Assembly and was taken to the Council, by Mr. Fitzgerald.

James J. Kaye Esq., of St. John, has sent us the Royal Insurance Company's Almanac for 1852, together with a tract entitled "Advantages of Life Insurance considered."

Our thanks are due for a printed copy of the "Report of a Committee of the Fisheries, on the subject of the Tides of the Bay of Fundy." We trust that the Committee's suggestion—that the Legislatures of the Provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia might, during their present Session, make an appropriation to their Lieutenant Governors respectively, of the sum of £150; at the same time praying that they would communicate with the Home Government, requesting them to move the Lords of the Admiralty to undertake the said tidal survey; and intrust to the officer in charge of the same the task of making an early and complete Report specifically upon the Tides and Currents of the Bay of Fundy, at all seasons of the year, will be acted upon by the Legislative, and that an appropriation will be made for that purpose.

The Legislative Council has been principally occupied with the appropriations, and Local Bills as they come up from the House of Assembly. Those grants have undergone

the most searching scrutiny which we yet remember to see made in the Council, and they have generally passed the ordeal. Two grants, one to Mr. Thomas, and the other to Messrs. Small and Hatheway, for the return of duties paid on their Steamers for the support of a Sailor's Fund, have been rejected.

The Bill passed by the House of Assembly for abolishing the Judges' Fees, has also had a full day's debate in the Council, and has been rejected. The cause assigned by several hon. members being, that in repealing the Judges' fees, it also, by a verbal omission, repeals the Fees taken by all the officers in the Province. We understand that the principle of the Bill is to be introduced again in the shape of a new Bill, in the Lower Branch, when of course the informality will be removed.—*Register*.

THE FISHERIES.—Intelligence has recently been received in this city by letters to one of our merchants engaged in the French trade, that the Bannons in the Fishery, by the French nation are to be renewed under more favorable circumstances to the French Fishermen than ever, both as to the amount of the bounty paid by Government, and the countries to which fish may be shipped. It is now settled that the fish may be shipped to any transatlantic ports where there is a French Consul, which will give the right to ship them to the United States, and secure a bounty from the French nation of 10 francs, \$1.50 per Quintal.

From the result of several letters from various commercial French Houses, it is apparent that the commercial and trading causes here the closest continuance in the stability of the French government, and they are making up their minds in the full spirit of their confidence.

The enlargement of the Fishing privileges will greatly increase that business, which is already large, and cannot but reflect, somewhat seriously, the fishing interests of New England.—*Bangor Courier*.

FOREIGN SHIPPING.—We have frequently heard complaints made by some of our mercantile community, that foreign vessels are charged their light and harbor dues according to their register tonnage, instead of compelling them to pay those dues upon the number of tons they would measure according to the British system; in the majority of cases, we learn, the difference being much in favour of the foreigner. As our carrying trade is now thrown open to vessels of all nations, we think it but fair that foreign vessels trading here for freight, should be subject to the same charges as our own vessels, in which they are competing, instead of being favoured, as at present. We trust the Legislature will not break up without enacting a similar law, which is now in force in Great Britain, which requires that the tonnage dues be levied on foreign vessels according to their British tonnage, and not the measurement of the country to which they belong, which is generally very dissimilar to that of England.—*Courier*.

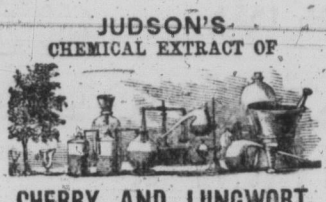

NEW BRUNSWICK.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

The following were adopted as Standing Rules in the Session of 1851:—

37th.—That no Bill of a private nature or petition for money or relief, shall be received by the House after the fourth day from the opening of the Session, both inclusive; and that the Clerk of this House do, one week previous to the meeting of the Legislature, cause fifty printed copies of this Rule to be sent to each of the Clerks of the Peace in the several Counties for distribution, and cause the same to be inserted in the Royal Gazette, and two Newspapers in such County where Newspapers are published.

38th.—That this House will sustain no application for allowances in Teachers of Common or Parish Schools, unless it shall be certified by at least two Trustees of Schools for the Parish where such School has been taught, showing the time actually taught; the Teacher to be licensed—the cause why such Teacher was not certified to the Sessions in the ordinary way, and that such Teacher was compelled to discontinue his or her School on account of any improvidence.
