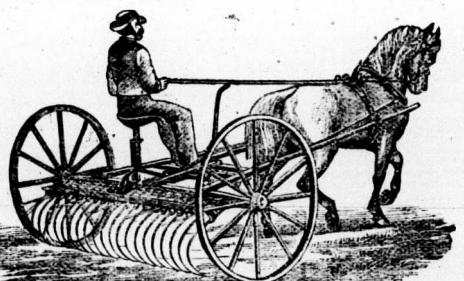

Allison has been appointed preventive officer in the customs for Westmorland and Kent Counties. STOCK SALES.—Nova Scotia sugar refinery stock sold at auction on Wednesday for 83 1/2 cent. Belliveau Albertine and Oil Company bought 10 per cent. One hundred men are employed on the Moncton cotton factory. The Company have bought all the building and stone owned by the Albert Mining Co., at Hillsboro. Hebert & Co., of Tediac, have shipped last week 400 cases of lobsters to the English market. They are valued at \$2,000. They have only been fishing one month. The lobsters are very large and plentiful. A FLECKY BOY.—A Moncton lad, son of J. Duffy, fell into the water off Harris' wharf, on Saturday. He got going down twice he was rescued by William Morley, aged 15, who sprang in and succeeded in swimming ashore with the half drowned boy.
