

THE AMERICAN TARIFF.

Reduction of Duty on Lumber—A Highe Charge on Steel Rails—Cabbage

Reduction of Duty on Lumbor—A Higher Charge on Steel Rails—Cabbage Taxed Three Cents a Read.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—There are conflicting reports as to the progress made with the Tariff Bill. One statement is that the most troublesome differences have been adjusted by the Conference Committee. The contrary statement is that the 40 remaining points of difference in the bill, and that the committee is practically where it was at the outset. As the lumber schedule stands the House has accepted the Senate reductions on sawed boards, planks, deals, and other lumber of hemlock, whitewood, sycamore, white pine and basswood to \$1 per 1,000 feet board measure. The House provision in regard to imposing a duty in addition equivalent to the export duty levied by any foreign country on logs has been restored. The duty on steel rails will probably be \$12 32 a ton instead of \$11 20 as proposed by the Senate bill. Senate amendments on rice and on castor beans, which are made dutiable at 50c per bushel, are accepted. The House rate of 3c per head on cabbages has been restored. The Senate had reduced the duty to it.


