Large, Lively and Enthusiastic Gathering at Delaware.

He said he had been a man of long service in the Liberal party, and as he had been in the trenches for a large number of years the party had perhaps seen fit to place him in a higherposition. "I hope you will forgetme," said Mr. Boston, "and vote for the interests of the country. The principles we advocate are the principles that should be enacted in this country. (Applause.) I am a tariff reformer. (Applause.) We are evidently growing stronger in the House and out of it, and are gaining many converts in the opposite party. "All classes," he said, "should be represented in Parliament—the mercantile, the manufacturing, the agricultural and the professional. Only 550 head of cattle, valued at \$20,000, were sent over the border from Canada in 1891, as against \$1,000,000 worth to Great Britain. "Supposing we had free trade, what is to prevent the American farmers sending their cheap grains to this country? In Michigan, in 1891, they raised 22,000,000 bushels of wheat; in Ontario 21,000,000.

The price in Michigan was 88 cents a bushel, in Canada 94 cents. Hogs in Ontario brought \$4 32, in Michigan \$3 38.

Mr. Chisholm went on to talk about free corn. If they had free corn they ought to have free cattle. That was a logical deduction. Corn in Michigan was quoted at 49 cents, and in Ontario 62 cents. Fat cattle in Ontario sold at \$4, in Michigan at \$294. Under free trade these cheap cattle would be shipped across the river to compete in our market. These same men who wanted free trade now told them two years ago that the only salvation for the country was to impose a tariff of 60 per cent. by assimilating it with that of the United States. London and St. Thomas Reach a Basis of Agreement.

Mr. J. W. Little Cuts the Gordian Knot by Purchasing the Bonds Held by St. Thomas.

[Special Correspondence of the Advertiser by Telegraph.]

OTTAWA, March 15-10 p.m.-At last a asis of agreement has been reached between London and St. Thomas as to the railway difficulty. The Gordian knot was cut by Mr. J. W. Little, who buys up the bonds owned by St. Thomas, amounting to \$38,. 500, and agrees to put up \$10,000 at once.

Mr. Little left for home to-night, accompanied by Mayor Oill, who will certify by telegraph to the representatives of St. Thomas at Ottawa if the financial arrangement is satisfactory before the bill is called again in committee on Friday.

St. Thomas will then withdraw all opposition and the bill as proposed to be amended will be passed.

The chief amendment will be proposed by Mr. Meredith, providing that if there is an arbitration between the syndicate and the Michigan Central as to running powers, the rental to be paid by the syndicate to the city of London shall be taken at the figure of \$24,000 for the purposes of that arbitration only.

AN UNWARRANTED ATTACK. Nearly one-third of the electors of South Middlesex live in South London. It was not the desire of the electors of the sixth ward that they should be dissociated from the remainder of the city for electoral purposes, but the gerrymanderers required that it should be so, and the isolation was effected.

What shall be said of the fairness of a Conservative newspaper that defends the gerrymander, and supports Mr. Gray, the candidate of the gerrymanderers, which ininsists that it is perfectly proper that the people of London South should be voters in that riding, but demends that become that riding, but demands that because they live in the sixth ward their mouths shall be closed in the present campaign.

Such is the argument of the London Free Press, which denounces Messrs. C. S. Hyman and E. R. Cameron, both residents in the riding, as "political barn stormers" and as bullies, because they have the temerity to participate in the discussion of public affairs on South Middlesex platforms? If the Free Press believes that Mr. Gray's candidature can be helped by its attacks on the friends of Mr. Boston, it is very much mistaken. Its tactics are all the more inexcusable, inasmuch as Mr. Gray's special pleaders, Lawyers Chisholm and Thomas, are also citizens of London,

THE PADDED CENSUS.

The manufacturing establishments of St. Marys, Milverton and Mornington, as revealed in the House of Commons, on a question by Mr. Grieve, M. P., show how hard the enumerators worked to earn the conus for every industrial establishment discovered by them. Dressmakers figure largely in the list, along with their apprentices, so do clerks in clothing stores, salesmen in jewelry stores, black smiths, boot and shoe repairers, ashers, carpenters, bakers. One tannery is chronicled as employing one man, there is a picture framing factory with one employe, and the photograph galleries are included in this list of manufacturers.

It is made evident on all hands that the census has been stuffed in every way possible, in order to make appear that if high taxation is not a benefit to the farmers, it at least has helped city and town industries. We in London know that our progress has not been so great, relatively, under high taxation as under a revenue tariff, so that we are in a position to say that the high tax policy has in no sense added to our prosperity. Another remarkable feature of this census

is that while enormous care has been taken to see that every pursuit, near or remote, that could be construed into a manufacturing industry has been counted, and its value given, no such care has been taken in reaching a conclusion as to the great agri-cultural interests. We learn from a Con-servative correspondent at Ottawa that when the question of the census was before the House on Wednesday night the acting Government leader asserted that "it is im-possible to give the total value of capital invested in agricultural pursuits in the Dominion, as in taking the census values were not asked for, quantities only being equired."

Now, why should so great care be taken to magnify one line of industry and to sup-press information regarding the other? Do the combines, which wish to have it anderstood that they alone need the coddling care of Government tariffs and must have opportunities to profit at the expense of their fellows, dictate the census schedules as well as the tariff lists?

MONTAGUE AND M'CARTHY. Certain it is that Dr. Montague would get the applause of a barroom full of partisans away from D'Alton McCarthy. But Ontario is a trifle larger than a barroom, and Dr. Montague is lost in an arena in which Mr. McCarthy can command respect.

The INDUSTRIES. report of Mr. Moylan, inspector of Cana-dian prisons, was again discussed. A statement was read from this gentleman in regard to his report, which alleged that criminals were shipped from Great Britain to Canada. No details from Great Britain to Canada. No details were contained in the communication giving any specific instances of the alleged action of poor guardians in Great Britain in shipring criminals to the Dominion. A resolution was adopted regretting that Mr. Moylan refused to communicate the desired details, and protesting against the use of such language as was contained in his report on the Canadian penitentiaries.



With all the modern improvements should not the cookery of to-day be in advance of that of our ancestors. The supply of food material in

The supply of food material in this country was illimitable, the variety infinite and the quality excellent. But the methods of preparing it were execrable. Her address was thoroughly enjoyed by the large audience of ladies, who certainly were benefited by her remarks.
