



# REINDEER ARE A CODSEND.

Imported Into Alaska to Save Natives From Starvation, but Now the Salvation of Miners.

Washington, Aug. 26.-Some interestng statements relating to the gold region in Alaska and the reindeer experiment there, are brought out in the annual statement of United States Commissioner of Education Harris, submitted today. 



Water Commissioners Give No. 3 Committee Some Pointers

That Are Not Entertained - The Fir Alarm Question Again-Other Business.
