### or Cut Out Heart of Living White O'Reilly and Allenist Evans Take Child by Order of the Witches.

Martin, residing at Alacranes, has made a confession that clears up the witcheraft mystery at that place. which had been puzzling the authorities since early in June, when Luisa Valdes, a white child, disappeared.

Martin says he met Fidel Valladeres, a negro, who is also in custody, who told him that he wanted a white baby for the purpose of procuring its heart and blood to cure his mother's illness, this being the only cure, according to the witches who had been consulted.

After several meetings with Valladeres Martin consented to get a child and enlisted as an aid Victor Navarro, who was living in the Valdes home, Di and who capture Luisa Valdes without her making any outcry. Navarro E stole the child on June 4, placing her in a bag to prevent her cries from being heard. He delivered the bag to Martin and Valladeres, who were waiting for him.

The three men were presently joined by Irene Rodriguz, and all went to an isolated place. Until then, Martin declares, he did not understand that the baby was to be killed, and he protested against her murder, but he desisted upon being threatened with a machete.

Then Valladeres and Rodriguz hanged the baby to a tree and Rodriguz, drawing a knife from her belt, cut its throat and chest, extracted the heart and caught the blood in an empty can. and thrown into a spring.

### ICAN'T COLLECT FROM HARRY THAW

### Steps to Halt Bankruptcy Proceedings.

New York, Aug. 9.—That a determined effort will be made by some at to resist his efforts to have himself adjudged a bankrupt was indicated Saturday after his creditors had recovered from the confusion into which the first announcement of the beginning of the bankruptcy proceedings in Pittsburg threw them. The attempt to head off the bank-

ruptcy process, indeed, is already under way, according to Daniel O'Reilly, of Thaw's counsel in both the murder trials, who announced that he had decided upon the institution of proceedings through which he hoped to collect the amount of his claim for legal services. Mr. O'Reilly announced that he was preparing an application to be presented to the United States court on Monday for a committee of Thaw's estate and person on the ground that Thaw is a legally adjudged lunatic and as such has no right to go into bankruptcy. On obtaining the committee Mr. O'Reilly says he will sue the committee for the remainder of what he claims Thaw owes him. According to his statement, this is a matter of \$3,700 over the \$11,000 stated in Thaw's bankruptcy schedule. He asserts that the \$11,000 and more that Thaw paid him during the trials was largely expended for Thaw's benefit and under his orders.



"I have kept a very careful account of my expenses for the last eighteen months. I know exactly what I have spent and how and why I have spent it. Every dollar is noted in a book that Harry has inspected more than

"No one has any idea what staggering bills came to Harry. When I would see items for tens and tens of thousands I would gasp. I wanted to cut down our expenses and I told Harry during the first trial that I would not use a cab, and I wanted to find a modest and inexpensive place to live in, but he insisted on my spending money and I did, but certainly not enough to cause him to go into bankrupcy. My expenses may reach \$25,-000, but I did not spend all on myself. Some of it I spent on Harry, and I was glad to do it.



While a bill of this nature was being introduced in the chamber of deputies, an anti-absinthe petition was circulated in the senate, where it


The bill introduced in the chambel bears the indorsement of thousands of prominent Frenchmen of all professions-generals, admirals, lawyers, manufacturers, as well as physicians and moralists, urging the passage of

It is pointed out that the absinthe habit and constant increase in consumption have almost doubled in the past six years. Today France alone drinks more absinthe than all the rest of Europe combined. The increase of the habit bears a direct relation to the increase of idiocy and physical degeneration. Belgium and Switzerland have both adopted measures suppressing the absinthe trade within their borders. Since then France has had the cheap absinthe of both these countries.

The worst feature of the present situation is that absinthe is rapidly replacing wine and beer as the beverage of the working classes. A large glass of the liquor is now sold in the poorer quarters for two sous, making it cheaper than any other form of


