ALLIES PREPARE MONSTER DRIVES BY AIR SERVICE

Henderson Assures That Dom-- Inance Now Held Will Be Kept.

TO END OF STRUGGLE

Fear Expressed That U. S. Standardization May Ham-

London, Oct. 27.-Major-General David Henderson, who is retiring as head of important "special duty." in an interview with the Associated Press, said: "I shall not say much to you about the plans of the British air service for the immediate future. That would be giving information that the enemy is very anxious to obtain. The Germans are acutely alarmed over the preparations that the Entente Allies are making for the air war next year. They are under no illusions about it and they are bending every effort to counter it by a stupendous program on their own side. But we have had the upper hand of them in the air from the very beginning and feel sure, especially with the help of the United States, that our mastery will grow stronger notwithstanding their efforts.

"The British flying corps is from seventy to a hundred times larger today than it was at the start of the war and we have made this tremendous augmentation at the same time that we have been carrying on a war that involved heavy losses and continual replacements from the very first day."

Asked whether it were true that the British casualities in air training had increased considerably in recent

Asked whether it were true that the British casualties in air training had increased considerably in recent months, Sir David said: "The total number of our training casualties increased heavily, but that was mainly due to so many more men training. It must be admitted, however, that the actual percentage of casualties in training also increased slightly owing to the fact that our training has grown so much more comprehensive.

Looping the Loop has come to be almost a kindergarten exercise in air training, and the men training to be a fighting pilot must practice the sidestip, the tail-slide, the nose-dive and other aeronautics of a most complicated character, until he is able to do almost anything with his machine.

"Actual field experience is most valuable training for the airman." Sir David continued. "No bravery or native skill can compensate for a lack of experience and training in actual war. The best airmen in the British army, speaking generally, are those who have been at it the longest. For instance, one of our squadrons contains eighteen men who have downed 200 enemy machines in six months, and won a victory over that superb German airman, the late Lieut. Vosse. The leaders of that squadron are men who have had long experience at the grantest damage to the enemy."

In connection with the American air program Sir David warned against the danger of standardization in aircraft, and expressed his anxiety that the American plans may not be permitted to hinder the present work of the British air service, which is depending to a considerable extent on materials and training machines ordered in the United States.

TURKS RETREAT AS **BRITISH MOVE ALONG**

London, Oct. 27.—"On Tuesday Turkish columns, moving on both banks of the Tigris, from Terkit, approached our positions at Samara (on the Tigris above Bagdad)," says an official report from the Memopotamian front. "The Turks retreated up the river during the night without fighting, on the advance of the British."

GRIP OF CANADIAN FIGHTERS

British Front in Belgium, Oct. 27 .- (By the Associated Press.)-Poelderhoek Chateau, on the Ypres front, which the Britsh entered yesterday, was in the hands of the Germans today. Hard fighting continues.

The terrible condition of the ground prevented as much of an advance yesterday as was desired. Nevertheless the main purpose of the attack-occupation of the Bellevue Spur-was achieved.

CANADIANS DIGGING IN.

The Canadians today are digging in across the neck of the Bellevue Spur west of Passchendaele, the dominating vital position. Yesterday the Canadians were compelled by a counter-attack to relinquish some captured ground on the crest of the spur, but they fought their way back, resisting another counter-attack last night.

FRENCH KEEP ADVANCING.

Paris, Oct. 27 .- Continuing their offensive in Belgium, French troops have captured German trenches north of the objectives reached yesterday, the war office announces.

COUNTERS FAIL.

London, Oct. 27 .- British troops have made further progress west of Passchendaele, east of Ypres, during the night, says the official statement from Field Marshal Haig today. Two German counter-attacks were repulsed during the night, and the ground gained yesterday was consolidated.

British Fliers Attack Every Time Enemy Machine Seen in Air, Whether Outnumber ed or Not, Declares Premier Airman in Address to Canadian Club - Rousing Welcome Accorded Modest "King of the Air."

Major William A. Bishop, V.C., D.S. O., M.C., of Owen Sound, was given a rousing reception when he addressed the Canadian Club at luncheon in the Tecumseh House today. Extremely modest, Major Bishop told his hearers of the inside workings of the airman's work at the front, in an unvarnished and matter of fact way, which brought home, far more eloquently than any florid description could, the reckless coolness and bravery displayed by the British birdmen in France.

The very fact that he ignored this or glided over that incident of daring, told those present more strikingly than any words could of what stuff he and his brother aviators are made.

Following the toast to the King, Major Bishop was welcomed by the president, J. H. Fowler, and as he rose to speak he was greeted with three rousing cheers.

HOPELESSNESS OF GERMAN CAUSE DESPITE COLLAPSE OF RUSSIA

Germans Have Been Incapable of Sustained Effort in West, Where, Military Critic Insists, War Is Bound To Be Decided.

By Frank H. Simonds

Author of "The Great War," "They Shall Not Pass." [Written for The London Advertiser and the New York Tribune-Copyright 1917-The Tribune Association.]

The campaign of 1914 in the west ended on the 11th day of November with the repulse of the Prussian Guard before Ypres. The campaign of 1915 flickered out with the termination of the allied offensives in Champagne and Loos in the first days of October. The campaign of 1916 ended with the British success at Beaumont-Hamel on the 13th of November. We are then rapidly approaching the date which will see the end of the operations of the present year. It is conceivable that there will be more activity this winter than in the two preceding winters. Secretary Baker, in a recent statement, has foreshadowed a winter campaign. Yet it is essential to recognize that the weather conditions in Flanders, where the main attacks must be made, since the British are there, are such that in all previous great wars and in the present war in the past three years it has been necessary to give over active operations from November until April.

The present is then perhaps an appropriate time for reviewing the fourth campaign of the war, and since the fourth campaign has been the main opera-tion of the war a review should serve to indicate the premise of the conflict up to the present moment.

Looking backward for a moment, it will be recalled that the first great campaign in the west saw the German offensive broken at the Marne, with the dislocation of all German strategical combinations for the immediate destruction of French military power, and saw ubsequently the utter defeat of the German second drive directed at Calais and intended to gain control of the channel ports. Thereafter Germany was planed down to the trenches from Nieuport to Switzerland, and while still possessing superior numbers, supprior, material and superior reserves, These two great conflicts, tunch will make the 1914 campaign in the west forever memorable, ended in substantial victory for the Allies; since one of the German attacks was broken and rolled back for many miles and the other stopped almost at the point of its origin before Ypres.



It is said that during two years while working on his favorite invention to reproduce music, he heard upwayds of 16,000 musical compositions of wide range, from grand opera to ragtime, making his criticism or noting his approval of each from the phonographic standpoint.

He is quite deat, owing to the boxing his ears received from an irate train conductor the time when the young news butcher, who was to be a great inventor, indirectly almost burned up a rallway car. 



AMERICAN EMBARGO ON CORN IS MERELY SPECULATION BAN

Importers Can Secure Grain for Legi-

timate Uses Says Communication. The board of trade is in receipt of a stating that the embargo recently placed upon the export of corn from the Inited States into Canada is intended to prevent speculation in this commodity. Canadian importers may, however, obtain a supply sufficient for their present requirements by making application to the food controller's office for an import license. They are asked, however, not to apply for more than is urgently needed to cover a period of from 30 to 60 days, until such time as the new corn on the market.

The food controller has received the assurance of the United States food administrator that every effort will be put forth to expedite any shipments of corn to Canada which have been recommended by them. The vendor of corn is obliged to make application to the United States export administrative board for a similar export license.

Prospective importers of corn in the London district can secure the application forms, which the importer is required to fill in in duplicate, at the office of the London board of traje. assurance of the United States food
