



Tortuous Streets Full of Little Shops Some Big Ones-White Houses With Red Roofs.

London, Sept. 6.-When the weekly the crowds of strangers who have with hot indignation. thronged the village have mostly departed Oberammergau settles down again to its ordinary workaday life. writes Archibald Marshall in the Mail. It is a fascinating place. One calls It a village because it is impossible to think of it as a town, in spite of Its 1,650 inhabitants. It seems to be built anyhow, and although I have been walking about it for nearly a week I hardly yet know where I am if I lose sight of certain well-known landmarks. The houses are white, with deep-browed red roofs. Many of them are gayly painted, not only as to their woodwork and with quaint devices around windows and doors, but with pictures, sacred and profane, and one of them has the whole of its wall space decorated in this way with frescoes done a hundred years ago by a great master in the art. The tortuous streets are full of little shops and some big ones, in most of which carvings are displayed for sale, and in this festival year there are temporary booths besides, for the sale of postcards or other things that the modern traveller has need of. The rocky mountains, clothed with dark pines and still in part snow covered, rise on either side, and on the summit of the highest peak is an enormous wooden cross so far above you that it looks as if it were made of match-

Courteous and Gentle-Mannered. As you walk about the streets and the country roads almost everyone you meet hails you with a "Gruss Gott!" and the men and boys raise their green, feathered hats. They are the most courteous and gentle-mannered people I have ever met, and I think the most truly religious. soon get used to the long hair of the men, even when you see it on the road-sweepers. This morning I passed Barabbas sweeping a road as I walked out into the country. He was smoking a long china pipe, and he looked up. "Gruss Gott!" with the mildest expression. The true Oberammergauer never cuts his hair. When the "Passion Play" was interrupted in 1870 by the Franco-Prussian war those who were liable for military service had to go, but they were allowed to keep their hair long. Nineteen of those who were to have taken part in the "Passion Play" never came back.

It is worth while staying in Oberammergau for a day or two before or after a performance, if only to see the players going about their daily work. You recognize a girl who serves you in a shop—a smiling German fraulein with her fair hair neatly platted—as "Guardian Angels," when she wore a robe of gold and purple over her white, girdled garment, and her hair fell from beneath her crown to below her waist. # FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE BURIED

People,

In all simplicity and quietness the body of Florence Nightingale was buried in the churchyard at East Wellow. It was all as she had wished. After the long years of self-effacement following upon that splendid memory it was the due and proper end. Pomp after death would have been out of tune indeed with the life that went before. Soon after the hour when in St. Paul's all kinds of people, the representatives of the nation, were sorrowing and remembering, half a dozen men of the foot guards were carrying coffin from the train in Romsey station to the hearse. Behind the wreath-laden coffin a few plain carriages followed, and this processionif procession it must be called—set out on a five-mile journey to the tiny church of East Wellow, the church where she worshipped when she was a girl. Here she was laid, a few score of country-folk looking on, mourning, as few in London could do, a familiar friend. In London her name was already a legend bright in remoteness, but in Romsey and the lovely country round it there are many men and women who new her well. Romsey is as gray abbey. These conditions lasted for three weeks. The collecting had been stopped, awaiting developments. Then the dogs were removed to the steep, bare of Oxia in the Sea of Marmora. This uninhabitated island and its small flat neighbor, Plati or Bulwer's Island, are visible from the city. Bulwer's Island, by the way, was the notorious habitation of the singer of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty, and the ruins of his fine castle are still there.

Oxia is effectively described by Lew Wallace in the second chapter of "The Prince of India" as seeming in the summer ever ready for spontaneous combustion, so hotly does the sun radiate from its bare surface. And this is the place, without water or shade, and indeed without even space to lie down, so steep is the island and so sharp its surfaces, where the dogs are today dying by hundreds. cleansing of the city has been going on, and the unmerciful suffering of the animals has been allowed to continue in spite of violent protests. The inhabitants of the summer resort Princes' Islands and of the capital in general have been wrought up over the danger of disease from the dying animals. Even if this danger is exaggerated or groundless the smell from the carcasses at Oxia is carried out to sea for a mile or two with enough solidity to strike terror to any passing
