Ottawa, Dec. 5.-The work of many ranches of the Government service is dealt with at length in the annual report of the department of agriculture sued today. Regarding the dairy ndustry it is noted that there has been a remarkable increase in pro-duction and a heavy increase in the creage of corn. The better yield of nilk per cow, reported from many sections, is attributed to the selection and weeding out process following upon cow testing operations. Farmers to the number of 48,385 availed themselves of free samples and united in the seed testing experiments with highly beneficial results.

During the year copyrights to the number of 3,197 and patents numbering 8,037 were issued.

The county rate amounted to \$76,859 80, and other items of note were Notes discounted, \$92,000; criminal justice drafts, \$7,011 41; Government grant to good roads fund, \$12,420 74; and Government grants for public schools, \$21,430 33.






