Restrictions Are Placed on Use of Public Utilities in Some Districts-No More Bunkering of Foreign - Owned Vessels in American Ports-Government Looks Forward to Early Settlement of Strike.

Washington, Nov. 7 .- Curtailment of passenger train service, discontinuance of bunkering of foreign-owned vessels at American ports, restrictions in some places of the use of public utilities, and appeals for coal from various cities as the strike of approximately 425,000 bituminous coal miners today rounded out its first week, gave the nation further indications of the distress in store should there be a protracted suspension of mining operations. Other disarrangements of the country's routine were expected today, with little change in the general conditions surrounding the strike itself.

Government agencies still remained hopeful that developments tomorrow at Indianapolis, when the motion filed by attorneys for the United Mine Workers of America, asking dissolution of the restraining order issued last week by Judge Anderson, will be argued, might point

the way to an early ending of the strike.

ONTARIO WILL BE INCREASED

Amount Set for Special Subscriptions Was Easily Secured.

BOOST OF \$15,000,000

Organizers in Various Districts Confident of Raising Additional Sum.

Toronto, Nov. 7 .- A new objective of \$50,000,000 in special subscriptions for Ontario will likely be set, the first objective of \$35,000,000 in specials for the province having easily been exceeded. Telegrams from the organizers of the various counties and cities are coming in and, with the exception of one or two who feel that they have exhausted the money giving capacity of the big men of their districts, all these telegrams speak enthusiastically about the chances of making good on the new objective of \$50,000,000 Half of the sixteen divisions of Ontario

Half of the sixteen divisions of Ontario went over the top when the province won the honor colors. Northern division, with 160 per cent of objective, has the lead easily. In this division is situated much of the mining and steel industry of the province. Newcomers in the honor list are the city of Hamilton with \$6,725,000 raised from large subscribers, and the Bay of Quinte division, which today has 106 per cent of its objective, and two days ago had but 4 per cent. Advocates Use of Airships For Treating Tuberculosis

London, Oct. 24.-The employment of airships as sanatoria for the treatment of tuberculosis and other diseases is advocted by a doctor who was attached to the British air force during the war, according to the Globe. The patients, it is pointed out, would be able to live for several days at a height of about 5,000 feet, enjoying complete rest and breathing air as pure and invigorating as that of any of the famous mountain resorts, which only the rich can afford to visit. 

In all the Toronto districts today the canvassers reported a marked increase in the number of small subscriptions. Their total for the day was \$1,651,500. Information from various sections of the province and also from the West is to the same effect. The severe weather in the West for several days seriously handicapped the canvassers, but the conditions for getting around are better now, and results much more satisfactory. Edmonton is rolling up a big total. Up to Tuesday night subscriptions there amounted to \$1,230,620 from 2,892 applications.

Halifax is well on towards the \$4,000,000 mark. According to a telegram received at Ontario headqarters today, the Halifax total was \$3,431,200.

So far the employees of 134 industrial establishments in Ontario have won the Victory Loan honor banner.

OUR GREAT LAKES SAILORS.

This is the time of the year when any day may chronicle serious disasters on the Great Lakes. These great inland waters, so beautiful in the summer months, and so much the delight of holiday travelers, become wild and dangerous when the middle of September has heave their waters. For the last three months! of navigation on the lakes (for boats often sail until the middle of December) there is need of the utmost vigilance and most skillful seamanship on the part of the master who would pull his boat through. With fogs, snowstorms, wild gales of wind, rocks, shoals and magnetic disturbances, eternal vigilance is the only source of safety and even at that there is no fall that

does not exact some toll from the lake shipping. Salt water sailors marvel at the skill with which lake captains handle their huge vessels in the narrowest passages, and under the most dangerous conditions. It is a very different matter fighting a storm on Lake Superior to fighting it on the Atlantic. There is no need to make comparison, because it is a stiff proposition in both, but with rocky shores never far away on the northern lake, the master cannot allow himself to be beaten far out of his, track. The shores of Lake Superior have dashed many a fine steamer in pieces and others have disappeared on its wide expanse with never a hint of what overtook them. Strange things happen on Lake Superior. Message From King to Governor-General Calls for Observance of Event.

nsion of all normal activities for a ried of two minutes on Tuesday, iod of two minutes on Tuesday, vember 11, the first anniversary of mistice Day, is the desire of His tjestiy King George, as expressed in cable from Lord Milner, secretary state for the colonies, to his extensive the governor-general. The of state for the colonies, to his excellency the governor-general. The message, which was read in the House of Commons tonight by Sir George Foster, acting prime minister, follows: "London, Nov. 6.—I am commanded by His Majesty the King to send you for immediate publication the following message, which is addressed to all the peoples of the empire:

"To all my people: Tuesday next, November 11, is the first anniversary of the armistice, which stayed the world-wide carnage of the four preceding years, and marked the victory

ceding years, and marked the victory of right and freedom. I believe that my people in every part of the empire fervently wish to perpetuate the memory of that great deliverence, and of those who laid down their lives to achieve it achieve it.

"To afford an opportunity for the universal expression of this feeling it is my desire and hope that at the hour when the armistice came into force,

the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, there may be for the brief space of two minutes a complete suspension of all our normal activities. During that time, except in the rare cases where this might be impracticable, all work, all sound, and all locomotion should cease, so that in perfect stillness the thoughts of everyone may be concentrated on reverent remembrance of the glorious dead.

No Elaborate Plan.

"No elaborate organization appears to be necessary. At a given signal which can easily be arranged to suit the circumstances of each locality, I believe that we shall all gladly interrupt our business and pleasure, whatever it may be, and unite in this simple service of silence and remembrance.

"This will be published in the press here tomorrow morning. Arrangements are being made for the general observance of the two minutes' silence at 11 o'clock next Tuesday. Trains will be stopped on the railways, traffic on the streets, ships as far as possible at sea, and every effort will be made to get work suspended everywhere in schools, shops, mines and factories and to insure complete silence.

"His majesty hopes that your min-

schools, shops, mines and factories and to insure complete silence.

"His majesty hopes that your ministers may be willing to arrange for a similar observance.

"It is, of course, impracticable, owing to distance, that the ceremony should sychronize throughout the Empire. It is, therefore, suggested that 11 a.m., local time, should be adopted everywhere.

JEW IS FINED \$200 FOR KEEPING WINE FOR SANCTIFICATION

Magistrate Sympathizes, But Has No Discretion Under the O. T. A.

LINDSAY, Ont., Nov. 6 .- The first case brought by the Ontario License Board against a Hebrew for having 'home-made" wine in his possession was that of the crown against a Lindsay man named Applebaum, tried here say man named Applebaum, tried here today. The defendant was convicted and fined notwithstanding that Rabbi Jacob Gordon of Toronto was a witness in his behalf. Applebaum runs a junk shop and has his dwelling in connection with the shop. When a "spotter" for the license board, named Lewis, walked in he saw a barrel which the defendant sald was not hidden from view and which he had admitted to Lewis contained home-made wine that was being used for religious purposes. Rabbi Jacob Gordon of Toronto gave evidence to show that according to the Law of Moses, which was the Jewish law, good Hebrews had to have "old pure" wine for sanctification purposes on Saturdays and Sundays and particularly during the Passover. He admitted that in Toronto wine for such purposes was as old as seven years and consequently 35 per cent alcohol; also that for the last Passover he had secured an order from Chairman Flavelle to use "pure" wine.

No Substitute.


If a Jew were poor and could not buy wine he must even sell his garment to secure the wine, the rabbi said. There should be no substitute, not even watered wine, unless the "old pure" wine could not be secured.

The prosecuting lawyer admitted that in his opinion Applebaum was innocent of any intent to break the law.

The defendant's lawyer said Applebaum was simply living up to his Jewish belief, and could not see why he had been singled out for prosecution any more than a member of any other religious denomination partaking of the sacrament at which wine was over two and one-half per cent alcohol.

Magistrate Bradford said his sympathy was entirely with Applebaum, who was simply living up to his religious belief, but the act was explicit and he could not do otherwise than fine him the minimum of \$200 and costs today. The defendant was convicted

The restraining order was issued last Friday, and the hearing on a temporary injunction, petitioned by the Government, will be next Saturday.

The motion says the exigencies of the war have "ceased progressively," and points out that the complaint does not allege that the common lot of the miners will not be improved by a new wage agreement. wage agreement.

COAL MINED IS **BUT A THIRD OF** THAT CONSUMED

U. S Government Taking More Drastic Steps To Protect Public.

SHIPPING IS AFFECTED

Coal Supplies For Bunkering Foreign-Owned Vessels Stopped.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6 .- Still hopeful that court developments at Indianapolis Saturday might point the way to an early ending of the coal striks, Government agencies nevertheless put forth renewed and more determined efforts oday to protect the public against distress almost certain to result from a protracted suspension of mining opera-

Realizing that the country is burning three times as much coal as the mines are turning out, the railroad administration, the great distributing agency, through its recently created central coal committee, took drastic action in ordering that the supply of coal to foreign owned ships in American ports be stopped immediately. With calls for assistance from com-

munities suffering from a coal shortage growing more numerous, the railroad administration turned loose every available car to meet the appeals made for

Eliminate Train Service. Orders went to regional directors of he nation's railroads from Director-General Hines to eliminate train service

General Hines to eliminate train service where absolutely necessary in the public interest, but it was officially announced that no general curtailment of service was contemplated.

The discontinuance of foreign tonnage bunkering was the first general step taken by the Government since the coal strike began last Saturday toward curtailment of transportation. The central committee made it plain that American-owned ships and tonnage under erican-owned ships and tonnage under the American flag would continue to receive coal supplies, but that all other vessels, as the situation now existed would be compelled to await the end of he strike

The committee's action is similar to that taken by Great Britain during the recent strike of British coal miners. Officials would not predict the result of the order as the amount of foreign tonnage now in American ports dependent on coal supplies from this country was not known in Washington.

Land Traffic First.

It was apparent that the central committee considered that precedence must be given to all land traffic in the matter of fuel distribution before even American ships would be accorded bunkerng permits. Priority regulations would be observed "to the letter" in dividing the coal stocks, members of the com-mittee said, as the supplies of coal on hand and in transit "will just about be able to take care of domestic demands and necessary ocean transportation."

Before leaving Washington tonight for Indianapolis, Assistant Attorney-General Ames, in charge of the Government's injunction case, declared there was no change in the Government's

was no change in the Government's policy toward the strike, and that he would endeaver to obtain a renewal of its temporary injunction.

Little Change.

Reports from agents of the department of justice and from miners and operators showed little change in overnight conditions, except that operators claimed 44 union mines in operation in West Virginia, a gain of 32 over last Saturday. Officers of the American Federation of Labor and repu over last Saturday. Officers of the American Federation of Labor and representatives of the miners denied the reports and asserted that advices showed no crumbling of union forces anywhere in the bituminous regions. There were rumors, apparently eman-There were rumors, apparently emanating from high sources, that the injunction hearing set for Saturday might go over for one week without prejudice to either side. Equally positive were rumors that Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, would make a personal pers, president of the American Federation of Labor, would make a personal appeal tomorrow to Attorney-General Palmer for withdrawal of the restraining order and all court proceedings on assurance that if this were done the strike could be settled and the men put back to work in the mines in 48 hours.

The Last Word.

Mr. Palmer was out of the city, but the statement by Judge Ames that the Mr. Palmer was out of the city, but the statement by Judge Ames that the Government would not compromise the strike, which it held illegal, was accepted as the last word on the subject.

The dismissal of all court proceedings asked for today by the unions would make it possible, labor leaders said, for the two sides, through their full scale committees, to negotiate a new wage agreement at one sitting. Refusal and issuance of more drastic orders directing heads of the miners' organizations to resume operations, would mean, these officials said, a long-drawn-out struggle.

Government officials took another look at the stock reports, and, while these indicated coal enough to meet immediate needs, the fact stared them in the face that the daily consumption was around 10,000,000 tons, while the daily output had been reduced by the strike to about 3,500,000 tons. It was easy for a man to figure, they said, how long present stocks would last, assuming the bins were filled for an average run of 30 days.



THE PROBLEM

Begin at any number or figure in the extreme left hand column that you wish. Starting in this column you may go either up or down, or to the right, until you reach the extreme right hand column. Then you are to turn and go back, going up or down, or to the left. This is shown in the little illustrative chart below.

The problem consists of encircling the figures, the sum total of which will be the highest. Each section of the chain must consist of either three, four or five circles before it follows another By section is meant three, four or five circles in a straight line. In determining the number of circles in each section, count the last circle in any one section as also the first in the next section. Fo instance, in the small chart below, the fifth circle in the first section is also the first circle in the second

In returning to the left, the circles must not run directly adjacent to those you drew the first time across. That is, allow at least one line of figures to extend between any two sections of the chain. To illustrate this, you will notice that there is a row of figures, between the third and fifth sections of the chain in the small chart. It is not permissible for the corners to touch obliquely. This rule is made to avoid any confusion that may arise in verifying the charts if two sections ran immedi ately alongside of each other.

THIS ILLUSTRATIVE CHART AND EXPLANATION

The above chart is shown to give contestants a better idea how to proceed. Starting in the upper lefthand corner, the first section contains five circles; the second, 4; the third, 3; the fourth, 3; the fifth, 4; and so on. In starting the chain, as well as in finishing, five circles appear in the extreme left-hand column. If for any reason a contestant prefers to start right out to the right, instead of going up or down, or wishes to end his reason a contestant prefers to start right out to the right, instead of going up or down, or wishes to end his chain without having more than one circle in the extreme left-hand corner, he may do so. Or he may have either three or four circles, either at the start or finish. At the turning point in the extreme right-hand corner he may have either three, four or five circles. OTTAWA, Nov. 6 .- Another clear-cut ntimation that the Unionist Governwill not carry on should the House impose upon it the burden of providing additional gratuities for returned men came from Hon. J. A. Calder, chairman of the special soldiers' committee, in Parliament tonight. The cer, chairman of the special solders committee, in Parliament tonight. The minister, after remarking that it was only fair and proper that the Government should state to the House its policy and take a definite stand on questions involving large expenditures, said that the members should vote as they saw fit. But he added that the point was that if the members signified their disapproval of the Government's stand by voting down its policy "then another Government would have to carry on."

The majority of the members heard from today appeared to favor Major Andrews' amendment to the motion for the adoption of the report of the committee's proposals. They did not all indicate how they would vote, however. The number of Government members who have so expressed themselves, combined with uncertainty as to what the attitude of the Opposition members would be, was clearly causing anxiety around the corridors of Parliament to-

night.

The Pros and Cons.





As a result of today's meeting bylaws will be submitted to 17 municipalities affected at the January elections.

Today's meeting, called by the commission, was presided over by Mayor Mercer. Sir Adam Beck said Ontario lacked transportation, and that he came before this meeting assured that the system proposed was the best. Electric lines in the United States had been investigated, estimates on revenue had been obtained from experienced trafficmen. He predicted that the extension of hydro radials would have the result of reducing the cost of power to districts served by them.

Sir Adam said it was absolutely necessary that the country should take over the G. T. R. system.

R. system, and with politics eliminated from the management and honest men put in charge, government lines would be able to compete with the C. P. R. It was not the intention of hydro radials to parallel G. T. R. branch lines, but only those which the commission was satisfied would pav. He predicted great success for hydro radials and said everybody wanted to travel on the road that gave the best service and cheapest fare as had been demonstrated with the London and Port Stanley line, which was making demonstrated with the London and Port Stanley line, which was making

The Toronto terminal of the hydro radials, he said, would be almost as large as the present union depot and further, he said, ample market facili-ties would be provided for agricultural and fruit products with an interchange of traffic with all steam roads. "I care not what party I belong to," he said, "but I believe it is right to give these men (referring to the U. F. O.), a chance. This is no time for strife and only by production can we reduce the high cost of living.

FORMER NOBLES OF GERMANY SUING FOR RETURN OF ESTATES

CASSEL. Germany. Nov. 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—Two Germans, formerly of the nobility, who have been deprived by the new regime of the greater part of their estates, have been obliged to sue the new governments for restoration or reimbursement. They are the Prince of Waldeck and Pyrmont and the Duke of Coburg-Gotha.

The former principality of Waldeck and Pyrmont is now governed by the Diet in Arolsen, where the prince owned before the revolution two castles and a vast domain of forest. After vainly offering to buy these from him, the Diet confiscated all the prince's property, promising to pay him what the courts should determine to be a fair price. property, promising to pay him what the courts should determine to be a fair price.

By one stroke of the pen the commissioners who now rule the new Free State of Gotha, confiscated the property of the Duke of Coburg-Gotha estimated to be worth 65,000,000 marks, and this without offer of remuneration. The commissioners who were Spartaciats took forcible possession of the ducal buildings, estates and bank accounts, and, in 24 hours, the duke was stripped of everything he owned.

The other portion of the duchy, Coburg-Gotha, has reached a financial agreement with the duke.

Both prince and duke have sued the new governments. In the case of the duke the court which sits in Gotha has obtained a legal ruling from government attorneys that confiscation without remuneration is illegal so that the duke is likely to recover his money or be paid for his property. After all, life for dukes, princes and other nobility in Germany today is unhappy.

Vienna, Ever Gay, Now Mad Whirl of Pleasure-Seekers

Berlin, Nov. 5. — (By Associated Press.)—Vienna, ever a gay city, is now more superficially gay than ever, owing to the illicit traders who have profited by the war, and now are spending their ill-gotten gains, writes a newspaper correspondent from the Austrian capital, Vienna, says one of these writers, is "dying to music," Describing the scenes in the dance halls and pavilions and gambling rooms, the writer says that nearly all the people demonstrate a desperate demand for youth and enjoyment, and adds that "this sickly whirl of enjoyment bordering on self-destruction" produces a frightful effect on the sober-minded people of the city.
