We Have Too Much Government. John F. Sinclair has concluded his series of

eleven articles on "Canada in the Making," which have appeared daily on this page. In his final article he draws a number of conclusions He is a student of world conditions of sufficient standing to cause his deductions to be seriously

Mr. Sinclair considers two things, Canada's debt and her ability to carry or discharge it Growing out of these comes the verdict that the Dominion should cut expenses, not only at Ottawa, but at every point where there is a body that has the power to levy taxation. The list includes the federal parliament, provincial legislatures, councils of cities, towns, villages, townships and counties. All these bodies possess powers to tax the people, and they exercise these powers. It is estimated that the combined taxaion of these bodies amounts to \$90 per capita each year, or for a family of five \$450.

But the case of Ottawa is the one under review just now. The net debt of Canada in 1914 was \$235,000,000; in 1923 it was \$2,453,000. spends 57 cents is for a war debt; there was nothing paid off during the war.

Mr. Sinclair believes that Canada has too great a governmental machine for the number of people in the country to pay the bills, and in that view we are inclined to concur.

Canada has a cabinet composed of the premier and eighteen cabinet ministers, four of them without portfolio. A cabinet minister in charge of a department receives \$14,000 per year and certain allowances. The number should be reduced, probably to nine or ten.

The House of Commons has a membership of 235 members, and the number will be increased to 245. In salaries alone that means almost a million dollars. The more members there, the greater the service required to look after them. Instead of adding to the membership of Commons, Mr. Sinclair believes better results would be achieved by cutting the representation in half. He holds that its fitness would not be impaired by such an operation, and that it would be just as representative of public opinion as it is today.

Turning to the Senate, he finds 96 members there at \$4,000 a year, and concludes that the number is too great. He would halve the representation there, leaving 48 in the upper chamber. When they are at it, why not reduce it to 32, one-third of the present number? All these things would lead back to changes in the British North America Act, but that is no reason why they should not be attempted. If today we find that the country has too cumbersome and expensive a system of government there is no reason why it should be continued simply because the British North America Act provides for it.

In addition to the large organization Ottawa the provinces maintain nine distinct legislatures with 543 members. They are distributed as follows:
