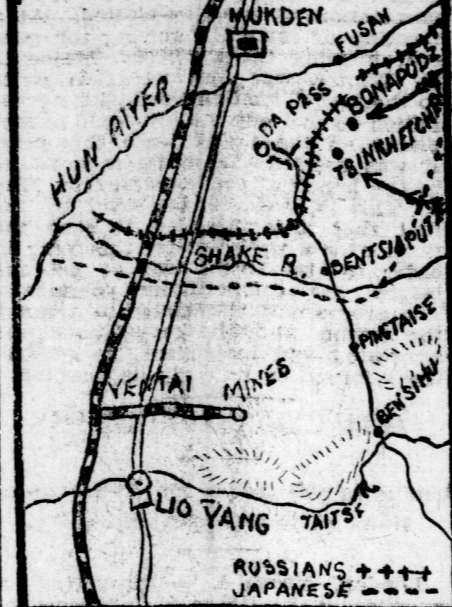

RESIGNING MINISTER SIFTON MAKES STATEMENT TO HOUSE

Is In Entire Harmony With Government Except on Educational Clause of Autonomy Bill.

PRIME MINISTER ANNOUNCES THE RESIGNATION

Ottawa, March 1. — The announcement of the Hon. Clifford Sifton's resignation from the cabinet, because of the educational clause in the Northwest autonomy bill was made in the House of Commons this afternoon.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's statement was brief and to the point. He said: "I have to inform the House that my colleague, Hon. Mr. Sifton, has resigned his position in the Government as Minister of the Interior."

"Dear Sir Wilfrid—After giving my best consideration to the capital on Thursday afternoon last, I immediately took occasion to read carefully the speech which the Prime Minister had delivered during the debate on the bill."

"My Dear Sifton—I received yesterday your letter of same date, whereby you tender me your resignation as a member of the Government."

Mr. Sifton's Statement. The Minister of the Interior arose immediately and spoke as follows: The statement made by the Right Hon. Prime Minister necessitates a very short explanation on my part.

PARENT'S NEW CABINET

Meets and Prepares for Opening of Quebec Legislature.

Quebec, March 1.—A meeting of the provincial cabinet was held yesterday at the Parliament buildings, which was attended by the Premier, Hon. Mr. Parent, Messrs. Archambault, McCorkill, Robitaille and Monet, and Nemese Garneau, who was previously sworn in by the Lieutenant-Governor, as Minister of Agriculture. The latter addition completes the Parent ministry, except that a certain number of the present acting Minister of Colonization and Public Works, Auguste Pessier, M. P. for Rimouski, who is the prospective Speaker of the House, had a conference with Premier Parent and his ministers this morning, and will be in charge of the Speaker's department. The cabinet council was in session until nearly 2 o'clock this afternoon to complete business before the opening of the House, which included the adoption of the speech from the throne, etc.

THE BISLEY TEAM

Men Will Be Picked at Once and Leave Earlier Than Usual.

Ottawa, March 1. — At the annual meeting of the D. R. A., held there today, the executive officers of the association were all re-elected. At a meeting of council following the general meeting the secretary, Major C. N. Winter, was instructed to write to the first 25 men on the Bisley aggregation to find out if they could accept places on the Bisley team this year. It was decided that answers must be in the hands of the secretary by May 1. This is rendered necessary by the fact that it is intended to send the team over a week earlier this year in order to give them time to practice before the competitive commencement. The programme committee to arrange the coming annual competitions was appointed and instructed to publish the information as early as possible.

OBJECTIONS FRUITLESS

Uncle Sam Disposes of Representations as to Cuban Reciprocity.

London, March 1. — Answering a question in the House of Commons today Earl Percy (under secretary for foreign affairs) said he regretted that the British representations at Washington regarding the injurious effect on British trade of the reciprocity treaties between the States and Cuba had been fruitless, owing to the fact that the United States held the view that the most-favored nation clause did not relate to privileges granted to third powers in return for specific concessions.

UNDER MARTIAL LAW

All Polish Provinces Now Have it in a Modified Form.

Warsaw, March 1, 2:50 p.m. — The Governor-General of Poland today proclaimed a partial state of siege in the Governments of Kalisz, Lublin, Kielce and Lomza. A similar condition prevailed in the remaining six Provincial Governments all Poland is now governed under a modified form of martial law. The military jurisdiction does not give specific reasons for the action taken, but it is due to the general unsatisfactory condition of the railroads and the fact that the Silesia Railroad is ended, Train service both north and south of Warsaw has been resumed. The strikers obtained higher wages and other concessions.

THE MCALL WORK

London Branch Doing Its Share to Further It—Officers Chosen.

The annual meeting of the London branch of the McAll Mission was held in the schoolroom of St. Andrew's Church on Monday afternoon. The report of the secretary reviewed the operations of the branch during the twelve months, and stated that the membership remained about the same, several new names being placed on the roll, while a number of others had been struck off owing to removals from the city. The branch is able to send \$100 to aid in the work being carried on in French Canada. Officers chosen for 1905 are as follows: President—Mrs. J. H. McMechan, First Vice-President—Miss Seabrooke, Second Vice-President—Mrs. (Rev.) J. J. Ross, Third Vice-President—Mrs. W. MacKenzie, Treasurer—Mrs. F. E. Leonard, Secretary—Miss Hannah Little, Literature Secretary—Miss Boyle.

Parlor Car for Pup

New Haven, Conn., March 1.—Lady Highball, a prize Boston terrier, bought last week at the Boston dog show by Frank F. Doolittle of this city, for \$1,200, came to New York last evening in a parlor car. She had pneumonia, and special permission had to be obtained from the railroad officials for Pullman car accommodations for the patient. She was dressed, in a specially made sweater and swathed in silk. A dog doctor came with her. There is an improvement in her condition today.

A Towing Feat

San Francisco, March 1.—The Standard Oil Company's steamer Atlas has arrived from New York with barge No. 10 in tow, thus completing the longest tow on record. Both steamer and barge were laden with oil. Seventy days were occupied in the trip. In the North Atlantic the six-inch steel cable used as a towline parted, but a new cable was substituted within an hour. The entire distance traveled was 13,900 miles.

The Manufacturers' Excursion.

Toronto, March 1.—One hundred and eighty-eight persons will sail on the excursion of the Canadian Manufacturers to Great Britain in June next. The time for receiving applications for berths expired today, and the secretary said the above number had been received. This may be augmented a little by belated applications, but the latter will have to be accepted by special arrangements at the steamship company.
