## **BIG FLOODS** IN STATES

Fourteen Persons Are Drowned In City Of Pittsburg

OUT OF EMPLOYMENT

Pittsburg. March 15.—The greatest flood in the history of Western Pennsylvania. West Virginia and Eastern Ohio, was experienced last night. At 7 o'clock the water reached a stage of 34.6 feet at Herr's Island, and 34.3 feet at Market street. The waters continue to rise steadily about two-tenths of an inch an hour.

At the head waters, the rivers are stationary. This crest of the flood is expected here. About midnight 35 feet was recorded, 13 feet above the danger mark.

At 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon the 50 miles ice gorge at Parker, Pa., broke, and it is moving toward the city. The immense gorge in the Clarion River also had started down stream. Both gorges, however, are old

stream. Both gorges, however, are old and the ice is soft. On this account their arrival is not expected to cause

much damage.

The whole lower down-town district

The whole lower down-town district is under skiffs.

At the depot were thousands of people, a chaotic mass of humanity shouting and pushing in their effort to board these trains for Allegheny or the many suburbs adjacent to the city. Patrolinen in large numbers endeavored to bring some kind of order out of the situation, but without avail.

Trolley, elevator and telephone service was demoralized in different sections. Electric light plants in many downtown buildings were out of commission and candles or gas light was being used.

Fourteen Dead Already. Within the last 36 hours, fourteen fatalities, directly due to the flood,

have occurred.

The damage to perishable goods and property in the Pittsburg district alone will amount to \$1,000,000.

At Connellsville, Pa., the damage to the coke region is estimated last night at \$2,000,000.

More than 100,000 persons are temporarily out of employment. The flood directly affects over 2,500,000 people.

All railroads entering Pittsburg are crippled. In the suburbs of Aspinwall, Sharpsburg, Etna and Millvalle, more than 500 families are living in the second storers of their homes.

Hundreds of persons are marooned in Pittsburg. Restaurants have been besieged all evening by persons unstile to reach their homes, and every room in the hotels and boarding-houses have been engaged. There are not sufficient accommodations to take care of the people compelled to remain here.

BILL TO PERMIT CO-OPERATION IN CANADA BEFORE HOUSE.

Mr. Monk's Interesting Statistics Upon an Economic Question That Is of Interest to Every Man and Weman in the Dominion-Plan is Popular Abroad-What Has Been Done on the Continent.

That the twentieth century would be the century of co-operation, just as the nineteenth century was that of the joint stock form of association, was the opinion of no less an authority than Mr. Gladstone, and in view of the bill that Mr. Monk has introduced in the duced in the Dominion Parliament, the subject becomes one of more than academic interest to Canadians. The measure provides for the creation and organization of co-operative associations among the farming and labor organization of co-operative associations among the farming and laboring classes of the country, and was first introduced at the last session of the House, when a strong speech was made by Mr. Monk. It made no progress last session, but has been again introduced, and this year it has been read a second time, referred to a special committee, and, if reported favorably, will become a Government measure. The purpose of these cooperative associations is simple. They are composed of people of limited means, who pay into the association a certain amount each week, and have the privilege of borrowing small sums from it, on security satisfactory to the other members.

In Belgium, where the lot of the laboring man is harder than in any other European country, the co-operative idea is a new one, but it has very rapidly become popular. In 1894 there were 286, representing a membership of 13,000, and to-day there are 2,000 societies. In the Netherlands there are 1,450 societies, in Austrio, 10,000; Italy, 4,000; in Hungary there are nearly 400,000 members. In short, in every European country where the co-operative idea has been introduced it has proved immensely popular to the working people, and has been a great blessing to them.

Pratt, from whose work on the subject Mr. Monk was able to quote with

"There may not be in England, Wales and Scotland so large a pro-portion as in Ireland and in various Continental countries of those very small cultivators to whom the loan of five of six pounds from a co-opera-tive bank would be a great personal convenience. A certain demand for such facilities there undoubtedly is on the part of laborers and very small producers, and such demand the coproducers, and such demand the co-operative bank association would with adequate support, be able to meet. But a wider basis than this is re-quired to meet the wants of farmers, who would want to borrow more sub-stantial sums and might find it an inestimable benefit if they could ob-tain them from a concerning scale tain them from a co-operative credit bank. \* \* \* In almost every agricul-tural district of Great Britain the farmers or cultivators of the smaller class we practically in the hands of comnession men or brokers, who advance money to them before their cops are ready, and afterwards get the produce at substantially less than its legitimate value, because of the financial obligations which the growers incurred towards them at a time when they were recorded.

Stamping Out Usury.
It would thus appear that the establishment of these banks would tend to stamp out the pest of usurers and later on in Mr. Monk's speech was given a concrete example on this feature of the co-operative society. He quoted from Mr. Pratt's book an experience in establishing one of the societies in a European village. When the purpose of the scheme was ex-plained to the villagers they were deplained to the villagers they were us-fighted, and at once set about the work of organization. No sooner had

they done so than the local Shylocks they done so than the would call all announced that they would call all loans of the members. This would have meant ruin to many of them, as have meant ruin to many of them, as practically the entire population was indebted to the usurers. The propagandists, however, were equal to the emergency, and applied to the central union, with the result that sufficient funds were advanced to buy the villagers' discharge from the usurers. The society then proceeded without any further trouble.

Well Worth Consideration. On account of its effect on usurers alone, the co-operative idea is worth serious consideration; but it has many other good features. Of these there may be mentioned the convenience to borrowers and also lenders of small amounts at small rates. to borrowers and also lenders of small amounts at small rates of interest; and the encouragement of habits of thrift and saving in those districts where the societies are established. It is to be hoped that the subject that Mr. Monk has brought to the attention of the Parliament of Canada will receive the careful attention that its importance demands.

HE SAILORS STILL MISSING

Searching For Bodies.

Toulon, March 14.—Minister of Marine Thomson arrived here yesterday from Paris. The roll of the battleship Jena, on which the disastrous explosions occurred Thesday, was immediately called, and 407 men replied to their names. Those of the crew who are uninjured are quartered temporarily in the naval barracks. Twenty-four officers and engineers are also reported to be safe, and besides, there are 44 of the crew lying in the hospitals seriously injured. As the officers and crew numbered 630, it will thus be seen that 155 are not accounted for. But the naval authorities consider it most probable that a large number of those have sought refuge with relatives or friends in Toulon.

Entire Town In Mourning.

The entire town is in deepest mourning. Crowds are gathered at the gates of the arsenal and docks awaiting the amouncement of the names of the dead. Hundreds of despatches asking for details of the disaster have reached naval headquarters here.

The Minister of Marine upon his arrival here consulted with the port admiral, after which he proceeded to the scene of the disaster. All around the Missiessy drydock were strewn pieces of shells, and the store sheds and other buildings were pierced in many places. Cordons of troops were drawn up on the quays near the hull of the Jena, where relay parties searched for bodies. Fire hose played all night on the unsubmerged portions of the battleship, whose interior had been completely flooded.

About 4.50 o'clock yesterday morning a freight train entered on the bridge, but had not got further than the second pier when it suddenly gave way. Before the engineer, fireman or a brakeman on the front part of the train could realize what had happened the bridge went down, carrying the engine, trainmen and five freight cars with it.

So rapidly had Deer Creek risen during the night that it had attained a height of 16 feet instead of the normal, from 4 to 6 feet. So great, too, was the force of the current that one of the five freight cars, heavily loaded,

A bottle of earbolic acid was afterwards found, which it has been proved the deceased purchased, but there is no evidence of her having taken any. The affair is wrapt in mystery and an inquest will be held. It is stated the girl had been threatened several times.

New C. P. R. Steamers.

Montreal, March 14.—The Canadian Pacific has practically decided to build two new steamers for the Atlantic service, to take the places of the Empress of Ireland and Empress of Britain, which, it is understood, will be transferred to provide a faster and better service on the Pacific.

This would release two of the present Empresses from the China and Japan line, and it is proposed to put these on the Australia and New Zealand route.

The new vessels, it is reported, will 20 knots an hour—possibly 22 or 23. This will mean a great development in the north Atlantic. New C. P. R. Steamers.

Tugboat Sinks; Five Drowned. Pittsburg, March 14.—The tow boat Cruiser, one of the largest in the coal shipping trade on the Ohio River, is reported to have gone down near Zwickley, about 20 miles down the river from this city. Five of the crew are reported drowned.

## ATTACKS LAND BILL:

Mr. Greenway Opposes Restoration of Pre-Emption Rights.
Ottawa, March 15.—Mr. Oliver yesterday moved for a second reading of his bill to amend the acts respecting public lands. The bill covers 52 printed pages. The salient feature is section 27, restoring pre-emption rights, so that a settler may acquire a second homestead, and in some cases it would appear, a third homestead also.

The first speech against the bill come from Mr. Greenway (Liberal, Manitoba). The bill passed in 1892, providing for a second homestead had been injurious to the West, he said. He was astonished to learn now that a third homestead would be granted those who had made their entries prior to 1889. He believed that with a 160-acres of land any man could settle down and acquire a competence.

"I can think of nothing more detri-

settle down and acquire a competence.

"I can think of nothing more detrimental to the interests of the people of Western Canada, especially to the Province of Manitoba, and the eastern part of Saskatchewan, than to put upon the statute book a law like this."

Belong to the Country.

Mr. Foster drew attention to the fact that the criticisms of Mr. Greenway were not replied to by any member on the Government side of the House. It was pointed out to Mr. Oliver that it was a cheap business for a Minister under modern conditions ver that it was a cheap business for a Minister under modern conditions to reflect as he had done on a statesman who made the most they could out of conditions thirty years ago. These lands belonged to the whole country but under the bill only a tavored portion could get the benefit of the gift, and these were the settlers who had received a gift of 100 acres of land. Magnificent opportunities were opened up by the bill for political manipulation and corrupt deals.

Premier Wants Information.
Sir Wilfrid Laurier criticized the course of the members who had attacked the measure on its second reading, but yet had not divided the House upon it. The principle of the bill was simple that of giving preference to the people now in the West over all newcomers. He would express no view on the question. His desire was to hear members from the West discuss the measure in detail.

R. L. Borden said that the speech of the First Minister showed that he had already made up his mind on the pre-emption clause of the bill. He should advocate making land records open to public examination, especially in regard to timber limits. They should be sold only by public competition.

NOT ENOUGH FOR ONTARIO.

Interests of Province Threatened-Aylesworth's Figures Wrong. Toronto, March 16.—"I think a Minister dealing with a matter of such international importance—one on which a treaty is pending—should be better informed."

So said Hon. Adam Beck yesterday morning, discussing the bill in the Dominion Parliament regulating the export of electric power, and having special reference to the reported statement of Hon. A. B. Aylesworth that the demand in Cauada was only about one-tenth of the 400,000 horse-power being developed on this side of Niagara Falls.

Ontario's Bir Needs.

"I cannot understand why he should make it," continued Mr. Beck. "The Hydro-Electric Power Commission at this very moment has applications from the districts dependent upon Niagara Falls for the supply of their electrical energy for over 100,000 house-power. I firmly believe that the City of Toronto alone, within five years, providing the price is reasonable, will require the whole of the amount mentioned by Mr. Aylesworth as covering the present demand in Canada, viz., of 400,000 horse-power. According to present agreements the companies must have available for use in Ontario when requested 200,000 horse-power.

Available on Demand.

Mr. Beck added that the question hinged on whether the Dominion Government adopted the recommendation of the International Waterways Commission and enters into a treaty to limit the amount of water taken for power purposes. Unless the com-panies were instructed he feared the Americans would get the benefit of the power generated. "The proposed treaty," concluded Mr. Beck, "should provide that all the power exported should be avail-able in Ontario upon demand."

HUDSON BAY RAILWAY.

Hen. Frank Oliver Says Government
Considered the Matter Urgent.
Ottawa, March 15.—The following
announcement was made by Hon. Mr.
Oliver yesterday:
"The Government is fully convinced
of the propriety of giving the Northwest an additional railway outlet by
way of Hudson Bay at the earliest
possible date. The Government believes that with the increase in production of the West, now in progress,
such an additional outlet will be urgently needed as soon as a railway can
be built, even if it were commenced
at once.

ently needed as soon as a railway can be built, even if it were commenced at once.

"At the same time it realises that public opinion throughout Canada could scarcely be expected at the moment, in view of the great obligations already incurred in connection with railway enterprises, to sanction the additional obligation that would be incurred by providing immediately for the construction of a railway to Hudson Bay, unless special provision were made to meet that obligation.

"It believes, however, there will be no objection from any quarter if the funds accruing from the disposal of pre-emptions in the three prairie provinces, under the terms of the proposed land bill, shall be considered as a provision in place of the land grant stated in the act, to meet the burden upon the credit of the Dominion as a whole, that must be assumed at an early date—if not immediately—if a railway is to be in operation to Hudson Bay in time to meet the urgent need that is now in plain sight for an additional and shorter railway made from the matrice to tide veter.

CURZON BEATS ROSEBERY.

London, March 15.—Lord Curzon of Keddleston, former viceroy of India, was elected chancellor of Oxford University yesterday by 1,111 votes against 430 cast for Lord Rosebery.

#### THE SPHINX

Nothing by Which We Can Accurately

Tell its Age.

The great sphinx of Gizeh bears no inscription by which we can tell its date. In 1816 Caviglia, who in modern times was the first to clear away the sand, found between its paws a stela of the reign of Thothmes IV., and therefore it was believed that the sphinx was carved by that monarch. But in 1858 the excavations of Mari-ette uncovered a stela bearing the name of Cheops, on which is a reference to the sphinx. The inscription is evidently of a late period, but is sup posed to be an exact copy of an an cient carving, and the translation seem ed to place the sphirx earlier than the pyramids and consequently to prove it the most ancient piece of work in the world. Still there remained four lines carved on the base which could not be read, but M. Daressy deciphered them, and it appears that the inscrip-tion is in two parts. In the earlier lines there is no mention of the sphinx but the lines which date from the Persian occupation mention the repair of the sphinx. There is, therefore, nothing by which we can tell the date of the monument, and the only evidence we have is the headdress of the Colossus. Its hood is ornamented behind fashion which only existed toward the end of the twelfth dynasty in the reigns of Usurtesen III. and Amenem het III. As this family showed much zeal for the god Harmaklin, whose por-trait the sphinx is, it is probable that the monument is the work of Amenem-het III.—London Globe.

#### SUICIDE OF ANIMALS.

Bereaved Retriever Mother Places Her Head on a Railway Line.

Are animals capable of premeditated and skilfully planned suicide?

The question is raised by the strange death of a dog at Crofton Park Station, England.

Bess, a large retriever bitch, was owned by Mr. Hayward, a horticultural builder, whose house adjoins the station. A short time ago she gave birth to a litter of five puppies, and four of these were subsequently taken away.

"With the loss of her little ones the dog seemed to lose all spirit, and would scarcely take any food," said Mr. Hayward's foreman. "She was let loose at midnight on Wednesday, and shortly before two we heard that she had been decapitated by the 1.22 down train.

"Whether the dos's act was dalib.

she had been decapitated by the 1.22 down train.

"Whether the dog's act was deliberate is a most point. But on the testimony of a passenger and a railway employe, Bess deliberately put her head on the line and waited for the incoming train."

A porter named E. Forder told how he found the body.

"I did not see the animal on the line," he said, "but when the train drew up I was told a dog had been run over. I found the head 15 feet from the body, cut off as if by an axe. The trunk was intact.

"I have had to remove the bodies of many dogs killed on the line, and in every case they have been terribly erushed and mutilated in trying to run away from the train.

"To have been decapitated as this dog was, the animal must have kept perfectly still, with its head resting on the metals."

A HOUSEHOLD HINT.

Dainties That Are Made With the Whites of Eggs. There are many dishes which are rendered richer and more delicate by the omission of some or even all of the whites of the eggs. All kinds of custards and milk puddings, for instance, are enormously improved by following this plan. At the same time it frequently becomes something of a prob-lem how to utilize successfully the whites thus left over. The conscience of a careful cook will not permit her to throw them away, and yetalt de-

mands thought to discover dishes which call for the use of whites only. Nevertheless there are a good many such recipes to be found, in which they not only serve a useful purpose, but give the impression of quite a lavish ex-penditure in eggs. Where ten or a dozen whites are at hand an angel cake becomes a very econ

Angel Cake.—The whites of eleven eggs, a cupful of flour, a cupful and a half of powdered sugar, a teaspoonful of cream of tartar and the same quantity of essence of vanilla. the whites till very stiff, sift the flour and sugar and cream of tartar together, putting them through the sieve four times, then lightly and gradually shake them into the whites; add the vanilla. Pour into an ungreased tin and bake for forty minutes in a very moderate oven, leaving it in the tin

This same cake may be made to do duty as a dinner sweet by serving it



as a charlotte. If stale, it should be liberally sprinkled with sirup flavored with a little maraschine and the center

filled with whipped cream. Apple Souffle.—Pare, core and cut up eight medium sized apples, stew them with a little water until the consistency of marmalade and sweeten to taste. When smooth and well cooked lightly whisk in the stiffly beaten whites of six eggs. Turn into a souf-fle dish and cook thirty minutes in a moderate oven. To gain variety in serving this souffie it may be baked in a case made of rice.

Coddled Apples.

Apples are a great boon to the house-hold in winter, when fresh foods are scarce, and new ways of preparing hem are many and varied. ancestors appreciated apples quite as much as we do today, more so, per-haps, because foods were so scarce in cold weather.

Among old recipes is one for coddled apples. For this pare and core the apples and boil them in clear wa-ter until tender, with lemon peel and a small stick of cinnamon. Now remove the apples and add the sugar and when dissolved return the apples and boil a few minutes longer.





London, March 15.—The incident involving Governor Swettenham of Jamaica and Rear-Admiral Davis, U. S. N., at the time of the Kingston earthquake, was brought up in the House of Commons yesterday in a hypothetical question by Jesse Collings, Liberal-Unionist, member for the Berdesley division of Birmingham, who was in Kingston at the time of the disaster.

The question brought out from Foreign Secretary Grey a hearty tribute to the American admiral.

Mr. Collings asked if it was in accordance with international law and international etiquette for an admiral of a foreign country to hand an armed force in a British colony without the permission of the governor. The Foreign Secretary, in reply, said:

"No, and I may add that no such rights were claimed in the incident referred to. What I am convinced of is that while, in the presence of such a catastrophe, there was a certain amount of misunderstanding, the American admiral was inspired by single-minded motives and a desire to relieve suffering. Any other construction placed on his action is most unworthy and antene."

Mr. Collings then asked if the fact did not demand that, in opposition to the governor, armed troops were land-ed, when there was no cause or war-rant for such action, but the Foreign Sacrestary said.

## POINT SCORED BY DELMAS

Abe Hummel Not Allowed To Produce Mrs. Thaw's Affidavit

#### EVELYN LIED TO THAW

New York, March 15. When the Thaw trial opened yesterday morning Abraham Hummel was recalled to the

Abraham Hummel was recalled to the stand.

Delphin M. Delmas immediately began his argument in reply to District Attorney Jerome as to the admissibility of the evidence Hummel has to offer regarding an affidavit Evelyn Nesbit is said to have made. In this affidavit, the district attorney stated Wednesday, Miss Nesbit asserted that Thaw had beaten her when she refused to sign papers charging White with her ruin, and swore that the charge against White was not true. In his argument Mr. Delmas said: "We still contend that this witness was acting as attorney to this girl. It is not for him, by his word, to deny that such a relation existed. However, we will reserve that objection."

we will reserve that objection."

Appeals to Jury.

Mr. Delmas then turned to the admissibility of evidence contradicting the statements of a witness made out of court. He said he had not objected to Mr. Jerome's address Wednesday, as he trusted "to the fair-mindedness of the jury, which is my only protection."

Mr. Delmas finally asked that the court rate out Hummel's testimony as improper and having no bearing on the case.

The judge upheld the contention of Mr. Delmas.

A Long Question.

After repeating to Dr. Flint the same question which Mr. Delmas put to the experts for the defence and having him say that Thaw was sane, on the basis of the facts therein, District Attorney Jerome had read to the witness the prosecution's hypothetical question, which contains some 15,000 words and which required one hour and eighteen minutes in the reading, Dr. Flint again said, without qualifications, that Thaw knew his act was wrong and is therefore liable for murder in the first degree under the statutes of the State of New York.

Jerome's statement that the taking of evidence would be concluded by tonight has been abundoned, and those concerned in the case again look to April I as the earliest date for closing the long drawn out trial.

Damaging Assertion.

Abcaham Hummel was on the stand again yesterdsy. Before Delmas could object to a question put to him by Jerome, the witness got into the record the statement that Evelyn Nesbit told him that she had informed Harry Thaw in Paris in 1903 that Stanfood White positively did not harm her.

Delmas at first moved to have the question and answer stricken out from the record, but, when the district attorney seemed about to consent, the chief counsel for the defence insisted that the answer stand.

Hummel's further testimony was halted until Mrs. Evelyn Nesbit Thaw can again take the stand to testify as to whether or not Hummel was acting as her attorney when she made the statements to him which were afterwards embodied in the affidavit.

Both Jerome and Delmas were irritable yesterday and had frequent clashes. The strain of the trial is palpably telling on everyone connected with it.

It was reported last night that Jerome himself may be called to the witness stand in sur-rebuttal by the defence. The purpose, it is said, is to question him as to certain actions lying against Abraham Hummel, who was a witness yesterday.
