



SYORE IN EPWORTH CRURCH-YARD.

THE incident enguved is one of greater interest probaby than any in the ife' of the great founder of Methodism; it is laid in Epworth in Lancashire. The many associations of this place with the Wesley family, mark it as especially suited for the site of a commemorative and historical picture. Samuel Wesley, after leaving South Ormsby in consequence of the affronts offered to him by the Marquis of Normanby, was presented to the Crown Rectory of Epworth, by way of acknowledging the great service he had rendered to the cause of Protestant Christianity, and of the Prince and Princess of Orange. Here he labored for my years, "attentive to the conduct of a who were under his care, so that every one in his parish became an ebject of his concern." Here, too, John was born, here he assisted his father as curate; here the bones of the venerable Samuel were aid down to moulder in the dust; and here, on the evenings of eight successive days, John Wesley himself "not being permitted to preach in the church," stood on his father's tomb and cried aloud to othe earnestly sitentive congregation, "By grace are re saving through faith."

One of these has incidents has turnished the artist with his subject. John Wesley was at this time June 1742) in his 30th year and had attained to much of that vigor and powerful carnestness which characterized his preaching during many years of zealous and devoted labor. "I stood" he says in his diary, "upon my father's tombstone." The artist has surrounded him by a crowd of listeners—"prattling childhood and hoary age." Amongst them are the old servant, and the two or three poons of women, with whom he held his interesting conversation on entering the town, and who gave him so comforting a response to his question, "whether there was any in Epworth in earnest to be saved?"
