From without there was no hope. The English consul urged an immediate surrender, and the consul of France, M. de Vasseur, whose generous sympathy with Venice and her sons had hitherto led him to hope that some means of rescue might yet present itself, now acknowledged that nothing remained save to submit or perish. Manin had maintained the principle of resistance as long as the slightest hope was left. But to inflict useless sufferings on a noble and generous people, sufferings that could terminate only in the complete destruction of the city, was opposed alike to his principles and his feelings. Tommaseo, listening only to the d sense of honour, urged defence to the last man, to the last ounce of powder, to the last morsal of bread; but Manin felt he had had confided its destinies to his care, which still hung upon his words with a confidence, a devotion, scarcely equalled in history. On the 16th of August, therefore, he convoked the representatives of the people. The debate was long, earnest, and melancholy: it was at length resolved to confer full powers on their president to capitulate with the enemy. Manin did not immediately make use of these powers. He feared lest by opening negotiations precipitately he should show the Austrians that Venuce was at their mercy.
