PROGRESS OF THE WAR [February 8 to February 14]

THE week under review furnished the news of outstanding importance concerning hostilities on land or at sea, if we except the submarine attacks on merchant vessels; and only minor changes were effected at any point on the far-flung battle fronts.

In the Western campaign, where much cannonading and trench-warfare formed the most conspicuous features of the week, the British were able to make a further advance on Espinosa; and this constitutes the only considerable change in this front during the seven days' period.

Scant news was supplied concerning the Eastern campaign, though active hostilities were maintained at several points in the Alps district, and in the vicinity of Drinik, the severest fighting occurred, but no decisive or important results followed therefrom.

The week witnessed no changes in the Caucasian campaign, and, apparently, there was not much activity in consequence of the severe weather. In Mesopotamia the British continued their successes on the Tigris, and had more closely invested Kut-el-Amara.

From Egypt news was received of the final suppression by the British of the Senusi tribe which had given so much trouble since the beginning of the war. The week was without news of the progress of the campaign in East Africa.

No important news transpired concerning hostilities in the Balkan campaign, and apparently activity in Macedonia was chiefly restricted to cannonading. The Austro-Italian campaign was prosecuted with great vigor at many points, but the scene of the greatest activity was east of Gorizia, where the Austrians took some trenches from the Italians who, however, subsequently regained them.

Italian activity included a raid on P. with sea planes, which did considerable damage to this Austrian naval bases and the planes all returned safely. No naval engagements were reported authoritatively during the week, but the German submarine campaign was prosecuted with undiminished ruthlessness, though, fortunately, with a decreasing number of victims.

What influence they have ever had on their party's principles and procedure is not apparent. One of them, at least, is not a Dominion Government appointment at an early date.

As to the opposition candidates, Mr. Todd needs no introduction, he is as well known throughout the County as any man in it, having represented it at Ottawa for a number of years. His capacity for discharging public duties is a matter of record. Mr. Lawrence is well known and most esteemed in the eastern part of the County, and is now serving a term as Mayor of St. George.

Mr. Gillis is one of the best known and most respected merchants on the Island of Grand Manan, and has no need of the BEACON'S sponsorship. In referring to the fourth opposition candidate we would say, unreservedly, that we give him our unqualified support. Mr. Burton M. Hill is a young, though already distinguished, member of a family that has long been identified with public life in Charlotte County and the Province.

He is a graduate of the University of New Brunswick, has gained much reputation in his profession of civil engineering, and is possessed of ability, tact, and urbanity, so that his success in life is more than reasonably assured. Mr. Burton M. Hill has been at least one vote in St. Andrews, that we can guarantee.

DUKE OF NORFOLK London, Feb. 11.—The Duke of Norfolk, ranking member of the English nobility, and the foremost English catholic, died in London today. The death of the Duke was rather sudden, the first announcement of his illness having been made on Saturday. Prayers were offered to-day in the leading London Catholic churches for the repose of his soul. The heir to the dukedom, the Earl of Arundel and Surrey, who is eight years old, will inherit an estate estimated at \$300,000 annually. TO THE ELECTORS OF THE COUNTY OF CHARLOTTE Gentlemen: At a large and representative convention of the supporters in Charlotte County of the local government, we were unanimously nominated to contest the constituency in the interests of the government in the election to be held Saturday, February 24th. In appealing to you once more for your support, we confidently place before you the record of the government for the past eight years, and of three of our number as your representatives. We feel confident that the splendid record of achievement of the government has commanded your approval and will meet with your endorsement at the polls. The government is fully cognizant of the opportunities that will face New Brunswick after the war, and has prepared legislation well designed to secure for the province a good share of the immigration. The classification of our crown lands and the examination of our forest resources is already well advanced and will be of lasting value and benefit and the whole plan constitutes one of the most advanced steps yet taken by any Canadian province. The government's scheme for land settlement by returned soldiers and all others who may turn their steps to New Brunswick after the war, has already received the endorsement of the British press as most advanced and practical. The Valley Railway is being pushed to completion. A commission is already at work on the Workmen's Compensation Act, which will work to the great advantage of the working men of the province and is a most commendable government undertaking. The establishment of technical schools, where the young men may be trained for successful industrial life will be of great value to the youth of the province. An accurate appraisal of the water powers of the province is soon to be undertaken, and every detail of our public life and public resources is receiving careful attention. The government has the strongest and most efficient measure yet devised for the prohibition of the liquor traffic. The careful attention to roads, bridges and other public services of the province which has characterized the work of the government, will, we feel confident, meet with your approval at the polls. The new plan of capitalizing the revenue from licenses of motor cars by issuing bonds for over Five Hundred Thousand Dollars to be expended on the roads in the Province, which bonds with interest will be wholly paid by the owners of motor cars, should especially appeal to the general public.
