Inbound ships from the United Kingdom are averaging 4,500 tons of freight for discharge at Vancouver. Outbound they take about 4,000 tons per vessel. Last year the average outward tonnage was practically the same while the inbound was only about one tenth of what it now is.

Announcement has been made that a Government wireless station is to be erected on St. Paul's Island, which stands in the entrance to the Gulf of St. Lawrence, off the most north-easterly point of Nova Scotia. Two Government wireless espineers have arrived there and are making arrangements for the erection of the station.

A record run between Winnipeg and Quebec was recently made by a special Canadian Pacific train when passengers from the Orient were, through delay caused by landslide, in danger of missing their connection with the C.P.S.S. "Empress of Scotland" at the eastern port. The train covered the 1,579 miles in a little over 36 hours, whereas the schedule time for trains between these two cities is 53 hours. The passengers had crossed the Pacific on the C.P.S.S. "Empress of Russia" and were taking advantage of the 21 day Orient-to-Europe service of the Company.

The United States has invested in Canada \$2,500,000,000, according to the Bankers' Trust Company of New York, which has just completed a survey of Canadian industry and the amount of United States capital invested. Of the total sum invested, \$1,200,000,000 is in bonds, and the remainder in farms, mortage of the company invested, \$1,200,000,000 is in bonds, and the remainder in farms, mortgages, small businesses, industrial enterprises, banking and private loans. It is computed that more than 200 branch factories were opened in Canada by United States concerns in 1919, and a great number in 1920 and 1921, and that late in 1922 the number of these came to 700.



## Here and There

Vancouver as a grain pert has gone over the top and is assured of achieving the 15,000,000 bushel objective set for the 1922-1923 crep year, according to statistics issued at the Vancouver Merchants Exchange.

A Canadian Pacific Railway train, over half a mile long, left Oshawa for New York recently. The train was composed of 52 flat cars, each carrying from four to six automobiles, and was the first solid train to leave Oshawa for New York.

Making the heaviest loading since the big crop year of 1915, grain loaded on the western lines of the Canadian Pacific Railway from Sep-tember 1st, 1922, to March 7th, 1923, inclusive, totalled 118,565 cars. This is 16,000 more cars than were loaded during the corresponding season of last year.

While in mid Pacific, the wireless eperator of the Canadian Pacific Steamship "Empress of Russia" was in touch with the Leafield wireless station in England, and received a number of news items. "The ether waves were evidently carried across the North Pole, as we were on tha other side of the world," said Captain A. J. Hosken, commander of the liner.

An Owen Sound deputation which recently interviewed Canadian Pacific Railway officials in Toronto, urged the building of a line from Owen Sound, through Meaford and on to Collingwood and then on to a point on the Sudbury line near Coldwater. The officials are reported to have been interested by the suggestions made by the delegation.





Immigration returns of the Canadian Government for the first five months of the present year show a one hundred per cent increase in immigration from the British Isles over the figures for the same period of last year.

The 1923 apple crop of the Okanagan Valley will amount to 4,620 cars according to the estimate of W. T. Hunter, district horticulturist. This is an increase of 20 per cent over last year and a record for the district. The apple crop for Kootenay and boundary districts will approximate 380,000 boxes.

A new high record of production was established by Canadian newsprint mills during May with 110,252 tons, an increase of nearly 10,000 tons over the month of April and 15,750 over May of last year. The daily production in May was 4,084 tons, the highest in the history of the Canadian industry.

Following the opening of the Banff-Windermere Motor Highway, Lieutenant Governor Nichol of British Columbia and Randolph Bruce were honored by the Kootenay Indians who made them an honorary chief and full chieftain of their tribe respectively. The Indian celebrations were held at Invermere in the beautiful Windermere Valley.

Several new air stations are to be opened in Ontario and Quebec in the near future for the purpose of extending the forest area to be patrolled by airplanes. A base is to be established at Ramsay Lake near Sudbury, and from this point all Ontario work will radiate; operations being carried on at Orient Bay, Remi Lake and at least two other substations not yet announced.

If the Canadian wre-war experts of flour are considered as 100, the Dominion's average export total between 1921 and 1923 can be considered as 207. Comparatively, pre-war exports of the United States being rated at 100, its present export is at the rate of 147. This indicates that Canada has more than doubled her export trade in flour while the United States has increased its trade by 47 per cent. Before the war Canada exported 3,832,000 barrels, while at present her exports average 7,885,000 barrels a year.—"Journal of Commerce."

Airplanes attached to the On-tario Forestry Department are now equipped with radio sending appa-ratus so that they can keep in con-stant touch with the chief and other

Canadian Pacific agents in Brit-ain recruited nearly five thousand men for work in the harvest fields of Western Canada and, through lack of steamship accommodation closed their doors on as many more who, attracted by the special har-vest rate, sought to enter Canada.

The branch lines program of the Canadian Pacific Railway carried out this year will bring into operation on the prairies a larger mileage than any one year since 1914. Of the 431 miles of line under construction. 281 miles will be ready for handling grain in the Fall, and of the balance, 115 miles will be ready for steel by the winter freeze-up.

Dawson City recently celebrated the twenty-seventh anniversary of the discovery of the Klondyke. 



# Sportsmen Organize to Block Forest Fires



All' is the warning being sent to sportsmen in many parts of Can-ada this month by the Canadian ada this month by the Canadian Forestry Association, of Ottawa, a voluntary society of 13,000 for-est engineers, sportsmen, editors, farmers, lumbermen, pulp and paper, executives, clergymen and

tast year Canada experienced 5,000 forest fires, nearly all caused by persons who receive the maximum benefits from the use of the forest. So severe has been the national loss from careless humans that Quebec has closed her forest areas to all travellers throughout the entire outing season unless they first obtain a per-mit from a public official such as mit from a public official such as a fire ranger. This provision places no hardship on the careful traveller but at the same time keeps a record that will be valuable in case prosecution for carelessness with fire becomes neces-

One of the finest camping and fishing districts in the Dominion last year presented a fearful showing of 500,000 acres of forest destroyed as the consequence of 113 fires let loose by campers, fishermen and others on holiday shermen and others on holiday ins.

The experienced sportsman has ang since learned that a camp re, or cooking fire, is never safe

The experienced sportsman has long since learned that a camp fire, or cooking fire, is never safe in a forest unless placed on rocks or gravel and built as small as possible. He also knows that to extinguish the fire completely requires two or three pans or palls of water and a shovel or two of earth, and that no fire should be abandoned while there is the large of smoke or fire.

of earth, and that no fire should be abandoned while there is the sign of smoke or fire.

The driving out of game birds and animals and the wholesale destruction of the haunts of game fish has proceeded at such a rate that all the sportsmen's organizations from coast to coast are making special provision this year to enlist every outdoorsman in a fire preventive campaign.

The lighted cigarette requires particular attention for it carries fire a long time after being thrown away and has destroyed many hundreds of miles of forest that cannot be replaced for a century or more. Some Canadian forest owners prohibit the use of cigarettes by their woodsmen. Cigars, not so commonly used, are equally a forest foe when strict precautions are not taken.

Lighted matches thrown into brush or on pine needles or on dry moss have a large share of blame.

So potent are these apparently trifling sources of confagration that many experienced fire rangers and forest engineers and woodsmen never smoke while on the trail and reserve their "pipe" for
