## Fuel Commissioner Warns Ontario of Great Seriousness of Coal Trouble Now Impending

### Outlook at Present Moment Gives Cause For Grave Anxiety Says Mr. Harrington, Fuel Commissioner

At the present moment the outlook for the coming coal year gives cause for grave anxiety, and calls for prompt and efficient action if a serious shortage of fuel is to be avoided.

There is only one way out of the difficulties for Ontario industry—immediate action. Do not await a rise in prices or accumulation of securities, neither will materialize.

These are extracts from a statement on the coal situation issued yesterday by H. A. Harrington, Fuel Administrator for the Province of Ontario. Mr. Harrington says in his statement that there exists a shortage of bituminous coal throughout the United States of sixty million tons. This means, he says, to make up this shortage is insistent, and when price restrictions are removed tomorrow it will be for the purchaser not a question of price, but of coal.

Twenty-eight million tons of coal will be required to be transported by navigation this summer to the head of the lakes, says Mr. Harrington, and with the removal of the export embargo millions of tons must be shipped to tide water for export to Europe. The export to six million tons short of bituminous coal, though 35,000 tons should come daily, only 20,000 tons are actually

arriving. Ontario's season requirements, he estimated, will be eighteen million tons.

**LABOR SHORTAGE LIKELY**

Mr. Harrington proceeds: "The miners celebrate April 1 each year as a general holiday in commemoration of the inauguration of the eight-hour day; there is no assurance as to the number returning to work on April 2. Illinois fields producing 15 per cent of the entire output, announce an "unavoidable suspension" on and after April 1 for an unstated period. This means a curtailment of production at a time when every ton is required."

Mr. Harrington says the U. S. railroads concede that the maximum car supply will be sixty per cent, requiring double the exertion of normal service to move the coal required which he says, is a task beyond human power to complete. Consequently, for Ontario, he counsels immediate action.

The anthracite situation, Mr. Harrington says will develop the same features, though in a lesser degree. "The demand in the United States and Ontario consequent upon the salute depletion of stocks will be continuous. Never before has there been a greater need of the fullest co-operation between the consumer and the dealer."

### Wilson Would Force Turks From Europe

#### ARGUMENTS STRONG FOR THEIR EXPULSION FROM CONSTANTINOPLE

WASHINGTON, March 31.—Vigorous expression of President Wilson's opinion that "the often expressed intention of the allies that the anomaly of the Turks in Europe should cease" should be carried out in framing the Turkish treaty, characterized the American rejoinder to the recent Allied note transmitting information to the status of treaty negotiations.

While the strength of arguments for retention of the Turks in Constantinople was recognized, the note said, the American government believes that "the arguments against it are far stronger and contain certain imperative elements which it would not seem possible to ignore."

The American rejoinder was handed to the French ambassador here on March 24th for transmission to Premier Millerand and made public tonight by the state department on advices that it had been delivered.

### ANNIE BALLOK AGAIN ACCUSED OF A B.O.T.A.

In police court today Annie Ballok, a Russian woman, was accused of having liquor illegally at her home.

The woman said she had the liquor in her home but it was for their own use.

Chief Greene said with a search warrant he went to her place and found a quart bottle of liquor hidden behind some old clothes in the kitchen.

Evidence was also submitted by the chief to show the woman had previously been committed for B. O. T. A.

The woman was told to come back to court tomorrow morning.

Miss Emma Wilson and Miss May Ferriotti of Buffalo, who have been visiting Mrs. William McCarthy, Academy Street, returned home last night.

### One Brother Dead, Second Found Dying

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., March 31.—James Courtney was found dead in bed and his twin brother, John Courtney, seriously ill with pneumonia, yesterday morning in their hermit-like quarters in the rear of their brick block on Niagara Street, between Third and Fourth Streets. Both of the Courtneys are well over 70 years old and came here from Toronto about 50 years ago.

The two men had been ill for several days, and this morning John himself barely able to crawl over the floor, found that James was dead. He managed to attract the attention of neighbors, and Dr. W. H. Hodge, was summoned and said that James had been dead for several hours. John's condition is such that little hope is held out for his recovery.

The brothers for a number of years ran a shoe store on Falls St. but a few years ago sold out and built the block on Niagara St. where they have since lived in two small rooms in the rear. They had few callers, and lived the life of recluses, although it was known that they had plenty of money. Coroner Harry R. Emsie is investigating the death of James.

### 15 Children For Adoption At Shelter

The Children's Aid Society held a meeting last night in the court house and received reports from Agent Boyle and the secretary.

They expect to be able to use part of the new wing of the shelter within two or three weeks.

There are at present 18 children in the Shelter, 15 of whom are wards of the Society and are candidates for adoption in good homes. Three other children are there merely as boarders.

### MACASSA IS THE FIRST BOAT IN AT TORONTO HARBOR

When the S. S. Macassa of the Canada Steamship Lines put out of her dock on the east side of Yonge street yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock with her Canadian ensign at the stern, whipping in a very stiff southwest breeze, "Toronto's waterfront yawned and showed signs of awakening from the long winter's sleep."

In charge of Captain Corson many times winner of the Harbor-master's hat, awarded for first bringing in his boat to Toronto harbor in the spring, and loaded with fifty tons of freight collected yesterday and today the Macassa headed for the Eastern Channel. She could not take the Western Channel, as this is not to be opened until May 23rd. Bounding the eastern channel, the Macassa headed for Hamilton, after awakening the slumbering waterfront with row long blast from her siren.

### Firemen Say They Were Promised 25 P. C. Increase

As stated by The Journal yesterday the firemen are by no means satisfied with their wage increase as granted by the City Council last Monday night.

They say that at the secret session held in the fire hall, Ald. Graves, chairman of the finance committee distinctly promised them that the increase would be 25 per cent anyway.

### Deputation to Toronto Assured of Highway Hamilton to Queenston

The deputation from the city and county which waited on the Minister of Highways yesterday at Toronto, were given assurance that their request that the Q. and G. road be made part of the proposed provincial highway, would be granted and that permanent pavement of some sort would be used on it.

Hon. Mr. Riggs told the deputation that the part of the highway from Hamilton to the Niagara River, was one of the most important of his whole. The road will run on Queenston, and there may or may not be a branch to Niagara Falls.

### Public Library Board Does Routine Work

A special meeting of the library board was held last night with the following members present, A. M. Watts, E. C. Nicholson, W. J. Robertson, C. A. Hesson, D. C. Hetherington and Mayor Lovelace.

A deputation from Knox Church interviewed the board regarding repairs to the fence at the rear of the library property and after some discussion the matter was left in the hands of the Grounds Committee to deal with.

### Commission Orders Trunk For Waterworks

At a meeting of the Water Commission last night a petition of property owners on Woodburn Avenue and Stuart Avenue for extensions of mains was granted and the superintendent was authorized to construct a 4 inch main on Woodburn Avenue from Queenston Street to Hydraulic Raceway and a 6 inch main on Stuart Avenue from Lake Street to Bruce Avenue with a fire hydrant on each if requested by the City Council.

The superintendent was ordered to buy 100 service boxes and 12 valve valve boxes.

The tender of the Canada Brass Co. of Galt, for brass goods was accepted. Tenders for motor trucks from local firms were received and the superintendent and chairman were authorized to examine and purchase the truck most suitable.

Accounts amounting to \$28,524 were passed.

**MAPS OF EUROPE**

The new maps depicting Europe as it emerged from the war are expected to arrive in the city soon, to be distributed free among the schools. As the new Ontario geography will not be ready till September of next year, 40,000 copies of the new maps will be sent to the schools of the province.

Educationalists are awaiting with much interest the arrival of these maps, none of which have reached here as yet. Copies will be sent direct to the principals of the collegiate institute, while the school inspectors will take care of the supply for the public and separate schools.

### Canadian National Railways Operated at a Loss of Just \$14,000,000 During Past Year

OTTAWA, March 31.—The Canadian National Railways operated at a loss of \$47,000,000 during the fiscal year ended on March 31, 1919, according to the first annual budget submitted to the house of commons today by Dr. Reid, minister of railways.

The budget shows the loss divided as follows: Canadian Northern, \$6,500,000, and International Railway and Transcontinental, \$7,500,000.

In addition there were fixed charges of \$19,000,000 to be met.

Operating loss on G. T. P. \$5,500,000.

Fixed charges on G. T. P. \$3,500,000.

Out of every dollar earned by the roads, Dr. Reid said, 78 cents went in wages to the employees. Operating expenses increased from \$84,000,000

virtually to \$108,000,000. These advances were due largely to increases in wages under the McAdoo award, he explained.

Construction during the present year, he said will be limited to the completion of the lines in the West. No more work will be done for the present on the Hudson Bay Railroad.

An increase of 25 per cent based on last year's earnings as favored by the board of management, would approximate \$80,000,000. Dr. Reid stated. Any such increase for government roads also would have to be granted the Canadian Pacific, he said. He declined to decide as minister of railways, whether a general increase should be granted to show a surplus for the government lines, saying he would leave the question to the house and people of the Dominion.

### Assistant District Attorney Exonerated of Bribery; Free to Start Inquiry

NEW YORK, March 31.—The extraordinary grand jury, investigating the conduct of three assistant district attorneys filed a presentment in the state supreme court late yesterday exonerating Assistant District Attorney James E. Smith charged with alleged bribery contained in a case found in Mayor Hylan's files.

The grand jury reported that the charge of which Assistant District Attorney Smith was exonerated originated in a letter, sent by Mayor Hylan to the Police Commissioner, Enright on March 12, 1919. The letter said in part:

"There seems to be a common report around town that Rothstein, the gambler, gave \$20,000 to a lawyer who was formerly a magistrate which the report goes, was divided up equally between an assistant district attorney and a magistrate. However, this case against Rothstein was dismissed."

"Testimony taken by us," the presentment said "has clearly identified

the case referred to as that of Arnold Rothstein, arraigned on a charge of felonious assault on January 23, 1919 in the seventh district magistrate's court and discharged by the presiding magistrate on January 28, 1919. The other persons referred to are Emil Fuchs, formerly a city magistrate; James E. Smith, an assistant district attorney; and Francis X. McQuade, a city magistrate.

"In the investigation of this charge," the grand jury added, "we have exhausted all sources of information available to us and we have not found that the common report described in the above extract from the mayor's letter has any foundation whatever in fact."

This presentment exonerating Mr. Smith of the only charge officially against him before the extraordinary grand jury, it was explained, gives him a clean bill of health and will permit him to proceed immediately before the regular grand jury with his investigation of alleged police department irregularities.

### Teamsters Working for Gov't on Q. and T. Road Asking \$1.50 an Hour

The teamsters who are employed on the Q. and G. road, which has been taken over by the Government are asking a raise in pay. They want a dollar an hour for the team, and 50 cents an hour for the driver. Their request has been made through Frank Greenlaw, M. P. P.

Hon. Mr. Biggs said the demands would not be granted as it was excessive and sooner than pay out the province's money that way he would order the work stopped at once.

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**CANADA'S RAILWAY PROBLEM**

There is but one fair way to meet the annual cost of the national system of railways and that is by raising rates. The loss last year in operation was fourteen millions of dollars on the C. N. R. National Transcontinental and the Intercolonial. The whole deficit on the National System for the year was over forty seven millions. This loss will have to be made up out of the taxes. There can be no other way to raise it but for the present and future years the citizens who use the road in one way or another are the ones who should pay for its cost.

It often happens with a privately owned enterprise that when it seeks to raise rates there is an outcry just as occurred in the United States when the railways there asked for increased rates, but when the Government took the roads over it suffered a loss of hundreds of millions at the rates in effect under private ownership. It is an old but sound principle that two and two make only four.

**Growth Shows Desire To Extend Army Work**

Commissioner W. J. Richards, chief of the Salvation Army in Eastern Canada, has completed his fifth year in that capacity. During that time the Army has seen one of its greatest periods of usefulness. This period takes in the "war years." The great war had been under way since August and new problems presented themselves to the organization when he assumed command. These problems required a large measure of initiative to overcome. The task of rendering the highest and most efficient service was shouldered and Canada paid tribute to the success which attended those efforts by over subscribing the amount asked for during the Red Shield Drive.

Commissioner Richards is a forceful man. He is a man of few words. He believes in doing things. During the five years, more than 11,000 persons are recorded as having sought salvation. Notwithstanding the losses due to war, there are today nearly 2,000 more names on the Membership Roll than there were in this territory five years ago.

In July, 1915, Canada East was separated from Canada West, the dividing line being Port Arthur. Ever in view of this, there are now only forty one fewer officers in active service in the Eastern territory alone than there were in the combined territories five years ago.

In the Field Report two very striking indications of financial growth are given. In 1914, the Self-Denial total for the combined territories was \$48,726. In 1919, for Canada East alone, it was \$75,591. Harvest Festival returns have been doubled.

**C. N. R. WILL NOT ELECTRIFY LINE!**

"The rumors in connection with the electrification of the roads operated by the Canadian National Railways are unfounded, so far as the general system is concerned," said President D. B. Hanna yesterday. "We have taken over the railway known as the Toronto Eastern Railway, and also some other lines, and we have an agreement with the Hydro to sell these roads to the Hydro Commission, and when taken over by the commission they will naturally be electrified. This also concerns that line known as the old Central Ontario Railway, where passenger traffic is far in excess of the freight transportation, but this applies to that section only, not to the Central Ontario Railways in general, some people have understood from my speech to the Canadian Club in rockville.

"So far as the increase in rates is concerned, we are simply marking time awaiting the decision of the United States Interstate Commission of Railways," he said. "The Railway in that country has practically agreed that the railways are entitled to an increase, and it has been our policy so far to follow generally the United States in that matter." Mr. Hanna said he did not think that the increased motor traffic would have any effect whatever on the traffic on the railways.

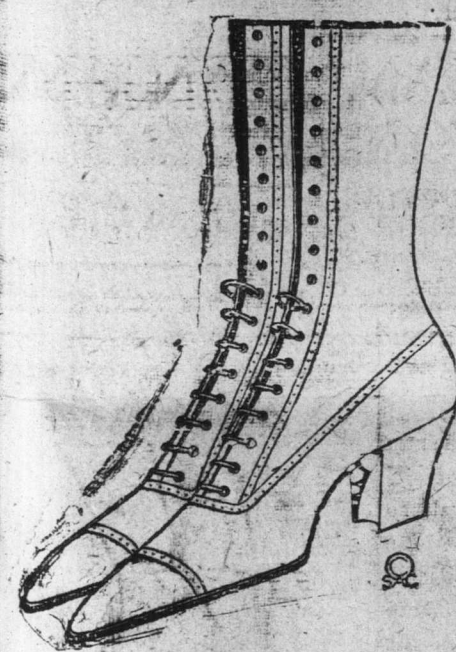

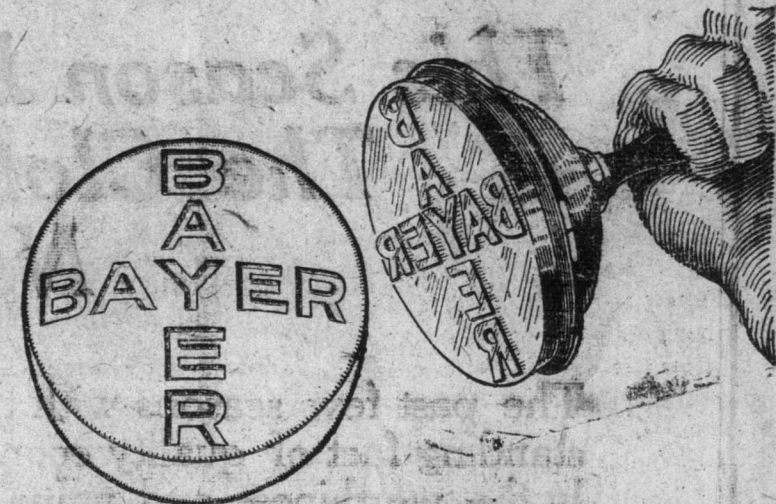

### Yank's Girl's Letters Cost Him His Wife

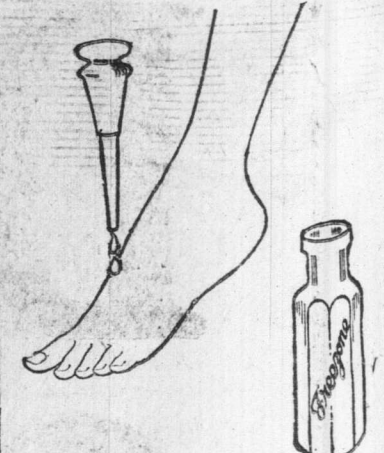

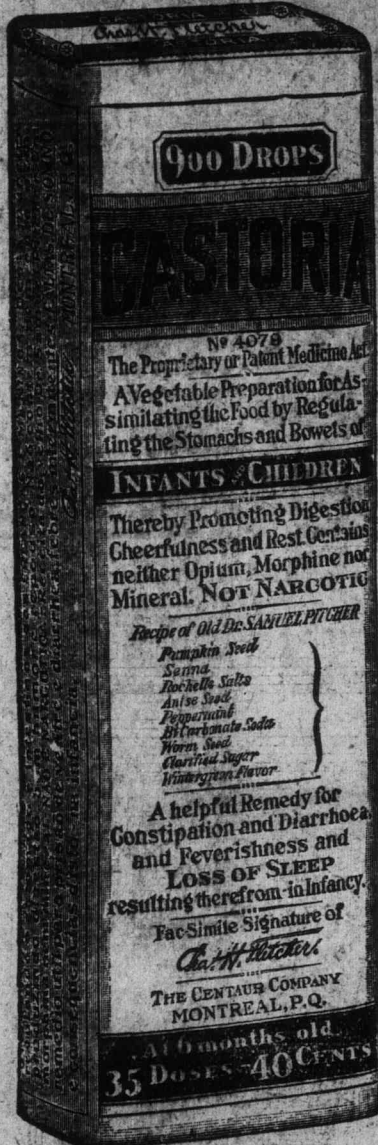

Col. H. S. Cooper (Northwest Toronto) has introduced a bill in the Legislature amending the Noxious Weeds Act. Instead of notifying the owners of vacant lots by letter that weeds are to be cut on their vacant lots, his amendment would have notice published in a paper and action allowed ten days after the notice appears.

Grace Golt, a trained nurse, was awarded \$75 per week alimony, and directed to prepare findings in her suit for divorce from Henry H. Golt, proprietor of business schools here and in Niagara Falls, N.Y., by Judge Dudley in a special session of the Supreme Court in Buffalo. They were married February 18, 1919. Adultery was the ground for the application for divorce. The co-respondent is a local woman.

The Canada Steamship Lines, through an official of the company, announced yesterday that their new passenger steamer for the Niagara run would very probably be constructed in Toronto. The steamer will be 420 feet in length, over 100 feet longer than the Cayuga, and will have a capacity of 4,000 passengers. It will be the second largest passenger steamer on the Great Lakes, and will be the largest passenger steamer ever constructed in a Canadian port if built in Toronto.

The assignment of The Toronto World after publication for 41 years is another evidence of the difficulties with which newspapers have to cope today with constantly rising costs. The paper manufacturers are by their prices and methods crowding out of business the industries that have helped make them rich, or as The Toronto Globe puts it, they are "killing the goose that lays the golden egg."

A rising tax rate is one of the easiest of all things for the Editor of The Standard to justify and explain. It is apologetically a wise thing to convince the people that the Board in which he sits has done very well in only adding on three and a half mills. Ireland's woes are many and the efforts of English statesmen, to meet them are futile. It is hard for one race to see through the glasses of another.

The Civic Budget for 1920 is a splendidly prepared document in the way of tabulated estimates. It is unfortunate that every ratepayer could not have a copy laid on his breakfast table. It would give him some idea of the work that aldermen have to do for him—gratis, except for criticism. The statement of Hon. Dr. Reid as published in The Journal yesterday should move the City Council to negotiate again for the north end belt line, the Lake Street extension and the new station.

By a negative policy by which an arrangement with the N. S. & T. Rly. was turned down last December the city loses \$3,000 a year in revenue.
