Daties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sis-

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price

Duties-Must reside upon the home stead or pre-empfion six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has oxhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Dutles .- Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.






